New York, Jan. 29.—The climate of the east and west seems to be reversed at present, for while we read of blizzards and extremely cold weather on the Pacific coast, here it is mild and almost springlike. On March 19 the garden will be the scene of an affair which promises to be the largest of its kind ever held. It is to be a bazaar the entire proceeds of which will be for the benefit of the German and Austro-Hungarian war sufferers. Fifteen hundred men and women are on the committee, and the fair will last 11 days. There will be 500 booths.
