

COUNTY COMMISSION WANTS TO OPERATE THE ROCKPILE ITSELF

Plan to Cooperate With City Meets With Strong Opposition at Meeting Today.

"FREE" LABOR NOT LIKED

Roadmaster Disapproves Declaring Rock Produced by Prisoners More Costly Than by Private Labor.

Cooperation between the city of Portland and Kelly Butte quarry by prison labor met with strong opposition when discussed before the board of county commissioners this morning. The city, through George L. Baker, commissioner of public affairs, has made a proposition to the county to take over the quarry and to operate it with prison labor. Mr. Baker desires to put city prisoners to work producing rock for park improvement. In the county jail there also is a big force of able-bodied men doing the same work. Mr. Baker desires Sheriff T. M. Hurlburt is especially desirous that these prisoners should be put to work for the county. The county commissioners back Mr. Hurlburt in this plan.

Year Opposes Plan.

J. B. Yeon, roadmaster, however, is strongly opposed to the operation of Kelly Butte by "free" labor. That is he objects strenuously to the work done by prisoners and the cost therefore charged up to the road fund. William Etchell, superintendent of quarries, together with Messrs. Baker, Yeon and Hurlburt, attended today's session of the board of commissioners to present their views on the question. Apparently, Mr. Yeon is the only person who is in favor of the labor plan. The question was not settled today, but will be taken up at the next session of the board. The county commissioners are unanimously of the opinion that county prisoners should be put to work.

HEIRS ASK AN ACCOUNTING

Former Guardian Is Defendant in Suit in Circuit Court.

Heirs of C. A. Marshall today are asking an accounting in the justice of the peace court of Mrs. Nellie Gustafson, formerly their guardian. George Ames and Lavina A. Marshall are plaintiffs. They allege that at the time of the death of their father, in 1905, Mrs. Gustafson was appointed as guardian of the eight minor Marshall children; that she induced George and Lavina, before they became of age, to sign over to her a deed to their shares in a valuable ranch in Clark county, Washington. Mrs. Gustafson is alleged, paid less than \$200 for this property and sold it for more than \$2000. It is the contention of the heirs that the transaction was without the consent of the courts and therefore is illegal.

DEFENSE OPENS ITS CASE

Cannermen Claim Indians Have Not Used Fishing Rights.

Indians of the Warm Springs and Yakima reservations, who have been thronging the upper corridors of the federal building for two weeks, were conspicuously absent this morning when Judge Wolverton called for a resumption of the government's suit to restrain Beaufort Brown, the Dallas canneryman, from interfering with their fishing rights. The government had rested its case Saturday, and Judge A. S. Bennett, leading counsel for the Indians, began introducing testimony to show that as a matter of fact, the Indians had not exercised their alleged treaty rights.

HEAVY LOSS IS ALLEGED

One Sheet of Contractor's Estimates Overlooked in Making Bid.

That the Herzog Iron Works lost more than \$15,000 on its contract in connection with the construction of the Multnomah county court house is the purport of an affidavit made by Phil W. Herzog and filed today with the board of county commissioners. Mr. Herzog explains this loss by stating that one sheet of his estimates on the work was overlooked when his bid for the work was filed. It cost the Herzogs \$44,332 to complete the work. Their bid was \$28,500.
