ROLY-POLY MAIDEN WITH MANY GURGLES IS HIT AT PANTAGES

Dorothy Vaughn Exudes Fun in Job Lots; Bill Throughout Has Plenty of Laughs.

Dorothy Vaughn is a roly-poly maiden, with fun in every ample curve of her rotundity. Her voice is full of merry gurgles, and her songs are witty and set to rollicking tunes.

Dorothy is one of the favorites on the Pantages bill, which opened yesterday afternoon in the city. There is nothing on the bill that is remarkable for its excellence. Rather, the program is not up to Pantages standard. But there are plenty of laughs, and at least one number—"O'Neil and Wamsley, with a line of 'hokum' nonsense"—made a big hit yesterday.

Weather Has Moderated Though Mercury Shows 45 Below Zero; Was 60 Degrees on Monday Night.

Dawson, Y. T., Feb. 1.—(P. N. S.)—Train service on the White Pass & Yukon railway, which has been snow-bound since January 18, was resumed today. Trains traveling from each end of the line left Skagway and White Horse with the first mail that has been moved over the line in two weeks.

Yukon territory has experienced January 20 the coldest weather it has known for three years. The thermometer dropped to 60 degrees below zero and hovered near that mark for several days. The weather has moderated somewhat, and the thermometer registers around 45 degrees below zero.
