An Everyday Cake Here is a simple and inexpensive cake that can be varied in many ways with different frostings and icings. It looks a little nicer baked in a tube pan, but will be equally as good baked in a square loaf.

K C Gold Cake By Mrs. Janet McKenzie Hill, Editor of the Boston Cooking School Magazine.

1 cup butter; 1 cup sugar; yolks of 4 eggs, beaten light; 1 cup flour, less 2 level tablespoons; 2 level teaspoonsful K C Baking Powder; 1 cup milk; grated rind of 1 orange.
