

SOUTHERN BOXERS IN HURRY TO ENGAGE IN BUSINESS, SAYS FOX

Frisco Featherweight Says Mittmen Realize Necessity of Industrial Lives.

CARROLL STUDYING LAW

Old rival of Fox is swapping punches with jurisprudence staff—Plans to settle down soon himself.

Jimmy Fox, the clever California featherweight who is in the city to entertain Billy Mascott over the air round Tuesday night, says that San Francisco is almost dead of the first string of boxers, who are seeking fame and fortune from the lakes to the gulf and from the Rockies to the Atlantic.

"I took a trip east myself last year and fought three battles in Philadelphia," said Fox yesterday. "It is easy for a clever fellow to box there. I didn't go on a ring campaign, but mainly to see the country. That's mainly why I am up here. I surely like to travel, as much for its educational advantage as its pleasure. If I get away with Mascott I may linger here for a while, open to meet all comers at my weight, but I intend to see even more of the country than I have."

"The four round game was very good in San Francisco and most of the stars of the days before the anti-boxing law are boxing regularly. Some of the old fellows are coming back and getting away in great style. Of those who boxed up here five or six years ago, the fans may be interested in knowing how they are getting along."

Carroll takes on Blackbarn.

"Take Jimmy Carroll, who was very popular here, for instance. He is studying at Hastings Law college and the first thing we know will be a full-fledged lawyer. Jimmy is one of the most energetic boys in the boxing game. Besides studying for the law, he is an expert electrician and stage mechanic."

"Carroll has a three months' vacation from college, starting in May, and says he may take a trip through the Northwest to do some boxing. He has been boxing regularly every week in San Francisco and before I came north they wanted to match him with me again. We have had three bouts and the honors are even, a win each and a draw. Carroll is a hard man to beat, for he is full of fight all the time."

"Monte Attell and his brother Caesar are running a social club and gymnasium in San Francisco and making money."

"Frankie Edwards has started boxing again and has been beating some good boys."

"Guy Lee, who hails from this section, is managing a light and a heavy-weight. He suffered an injury to his eye and is not boxing any more. He is a first rate machinist as a vocation."

"Abel Tabet is a plumber. He has quit the ring and is in the plumbing business. Lanny Webster is in business in Los Angeles, and Frankie Conley, who got his beating at the hands of the late, is around Milwaukee. He sure was one tough bird."

"Most of the boxers down there who have any brains are getting into business as fast as they can, for unless a fellow can catch the eye of the promoters, they might as well quit the game for it is a precarious one."

"I think I'll quit myself soon. I had an excellent chance to go into business when I was in Butte, where I made quite a bit, but the wanderlust was on me and I wanted to get out and see the country before I settled down."

Fox is an unassuming little fellow who has made a large number of friends already in his short stay here. He is a hard worker and loses no chance of putting himself in good condition. Condition, he says, is three-fourths of the bout.

Several shooters new to this territory will be among those present.



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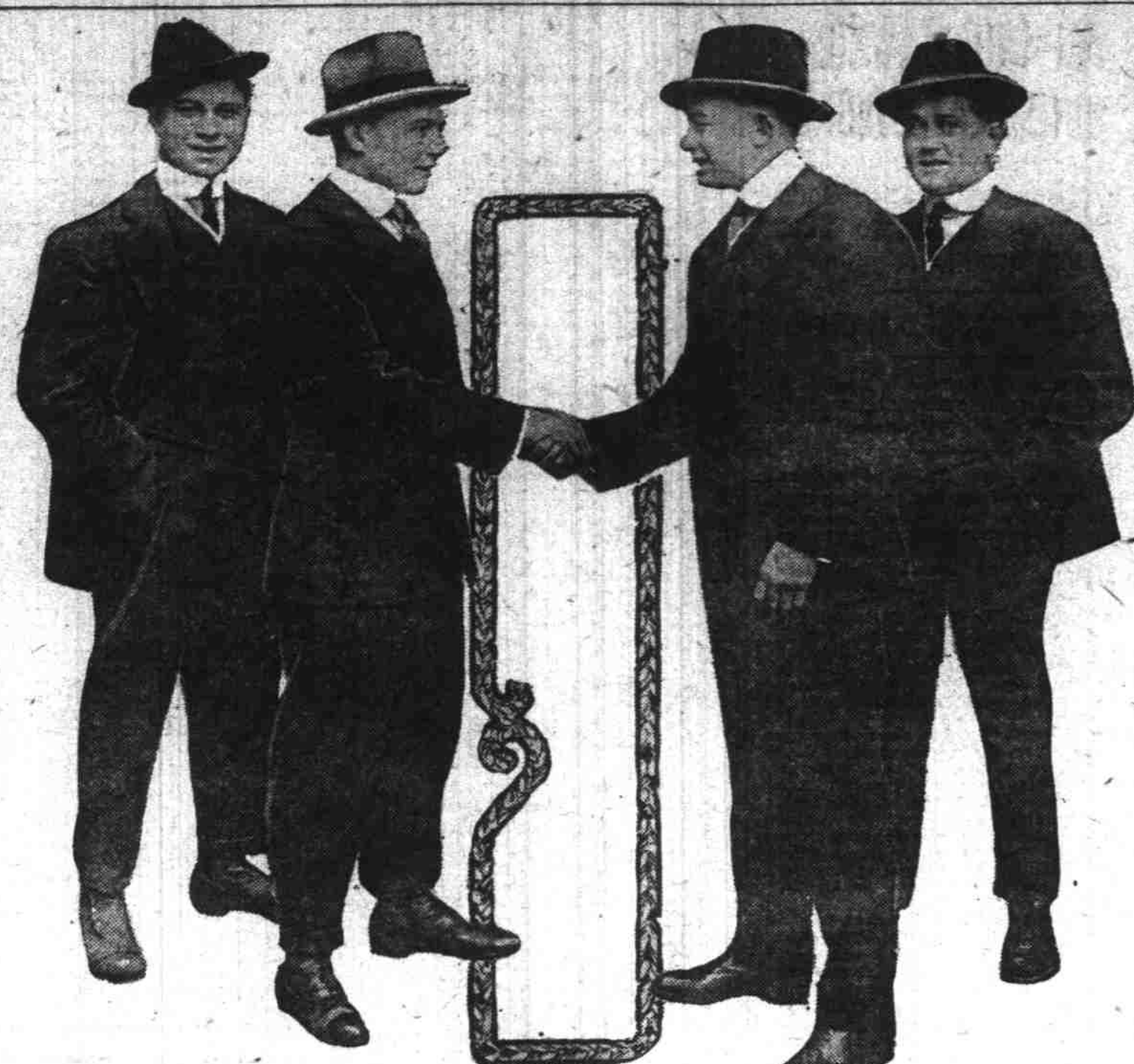
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CRACK FEATHERS WHO WILL BOX BEFORE PORTLAND FANS

OREGON DESIRES TO ADOPT BRACE OF MODERN IDEAS

Would Eliminate "Professional Coach" and Play Basketball in the Afternoon.

Hugo Bezdek, physical director of the University of Oregon, who has been sojourning at the metropolis for the past two days, unleashed a couple of ideas the state university would like to see adopted by the Pacific coast and northwestern conferences.

"Down at Eugene we are fostering an idea that will get away from the 'professional coach' system of athletics," said Hugo the first. "We hope that it will go through."

"We would like to see each college employ coaches who may become members of the faculty and remain with the colleges throughout the year. This would undoubtedly place athletics on a higher plane, for it would eliminate the dictation of schedules by coaches employed for a few months at a time in any particular branch of athletics. The athletic instructors would then have the interest of the whole college at heart instead of their own individual selves. The colleges are coming to this, and the northwest is coming to this, and the first to adopt it."

"Another idea we have at Eugene is to play the basketball games from 4 to 6 o'clock in the afternoon. In playing at night, as at present, the basketball man cannot eat later than 4 o'clock in the afternoon, or he may have to wait and eat after 10 o'clock at night. If he does this his food enters his stomach when he is in a highly nervous state and he is not able to get to sleep earlier than 1 or 2 o'clock in the morning, if he is particularly nervous. This is dangerous to the digestive system and is dangerous to the general health of the player. If we played all of the games in the afternoon it would be far more healthful than to present and that is what we are striving to have adopted."

FAIR DIANAS BECOME IMPORTANT PART OF TRAPSHOOTING CLUBS

Sport Is Fascinating One Which Does Not Place Any Strain Upon Nerves.

PROFICIENCY IS SHOWN

Women Show Great Aptitude in Use of Gun When Once They Become Familiar With It.

Trapshooting inspires courage, promotes health, increases bodily vigor and resistance to the ill flesh is heir to. It creates poise and self confidence, making body and brain pull together and improves the vision. These are a few of the many reasons why so many women are interested in the development of the sport. A few years ago there was but a fair sprinkling of women interested in trapshooting; now the number of fair Dianas who visit the traps reaches into the thousands.

It is a fascinating sport without placing any strain on the nervous system. In fact, trapshooting strengthens the nerves. It combines sport with fresh air and sunshine and saves many doctors' bills. Women physicians and nurses recommend the sport as a health tonic, and if the patients follow the advice given there will not be much need for the physician, and the nurse.

Following the organization of the De Nemours Gun club, the first of the women's gun clubs, two years ago, it was predicted that within a few years every club worth while would be called upon to provide for women shooters, and the prediction has come true. No gun club is complete now unless there are quarters for the fair Dianas. In some places the women form their own clubs and conduct them separately, but in many places they are conducted in conjunction with the men's trapshooting clubs. There are several women's gun clubs in the 350 organizations in Canada, and the women of Wilmington, Chicago, New York, Youngstown and Minneapolis have organizations that do credit to those cities. In Spokane, Wash., the fair shooters have formed a women's auxiliary to the Spokane Gun club.

As women become more interested in trapshooting, the proficiency of a great number becomes more marked. For the 10,000 targets that Mrs. M. T. Topper shot at the American Trapshooters' club at the past year she averaged 86. Mrs. Frank E. Butler (Annie Oakley) has been recognized as one of the best shots in the country for several years, and Mrs. L. G. Vogel of Detroit has been holding her own with the best traps for several years.

In the 1915-16 season of the Interstate Trapshooting association, Mrs. Ade Schilling is discovered among a number who shot at more than 20 targets. She broke 2115 of the 2120 shot at the past year's season. Mrs. Schilling is but 4 feet 11 inches in height, and because of her smallness of stature attracts unusual attention on the part of the men. She is a native of Minnesota. She has been married with men. She hails from San Jose, Cal. In the recent Pacific coast handicap shoot she scored 9 breaks out of 250 targets, while Miss Meyers broke 19 out of 200 targets. During 1915 Mrs. Schilling shot at more than 3000 targets and averaged a shade better than 88. Mrs. Schilling still looks like a child.

There were two other women shooters who figured in the interstate averages in 1915—Mrs. B. P. Remy and Mrs. J. L. Gilliam. Mrs. Remy shot 2033 out of 2630 targets for an average of 77.37, while the latter broke 1601 targets in 2185 thrown for an average of 73.27. Mrs. Remy is only a few of the women who became quite prominent by their performances in 1915. Mrs. A. H. Winkler won the championship of the Chicago Gun club, the highest trapshooting club in the country. Therefore, Mrs. Winkler must be given credit for being quite proficient with the gun. One can't shoot a trapshooting club in the country without breaking the targets. It is one sport in which the true ability of the contestant can be figured on the score sheets. Another woman who won a club championship in 1915 was Mrs. O. L. Garl. She broke 237 in 280 trials at the Birmingham, Ala., Gun club, and she captured the high average prize as well.

Excellent Scores Made

In the last West Hogan shoot Mrs. Frank Remy participated in quite a number of the competitions and made excellent scores, once breaking 184 and twice breaking 180 in 200 thrown targets. Mrs. B. P. Remy in last competitions has three times broken straight strings of 25; once she clipped 24 in 25; twice she broke in 25, and once she broke in 20. All of which must be considered excellent shooting. Chicago boasts of an excellent shot in Mrs. A. R. Gill. She is good for 90 to 100 targets. Mrs. Elizabeth Moulton shoots with the Glen Willow Gun club in the Philadelphia Trapshooters' league, and she generally figures in the first 10 in the scores. Mrs. Moulton recently won one of the Outdoor Life trophies. Mrs. Harry Harrison of the Riverside Gun club, Rochester, N. Y., had the best run of any woman shooter in the last West Hogan tournament. Mrs. Harrison is so enthusiastic about the sport she has organized a school for women shooters at the Riverside club.

One of the most enthusiastic of the fair Dianas is Miss E. J. D. Harrison of the De Nemours Gun club of Wilmington, Del. She has been shooting nearly three years and has organized the first gun club for women in the United States. She is a devotee of trapshooting among women and recommends it to all members of the fair sex who wish to take up an interesting and inexpensive pastime for the great outdoors.

If the Olympic games could be held in Berlin this year, America would have been represented by a magnificent team of women, but as it is impossible to stage the affair in Berlin, the women will appear at the Olympic games in the United States. This will be the first time in the history of trapshooting that women have been allowed to participate in a grand international event. It is hoped that these days the suffrage question will be settled, and if the women

Dr. J. G. Sweetland, former coach of the Willamette university football team, and now with the Hobart college, will probably be selected to succeed Dr. E. J. Stewart, who will be the athletic director of the University of Washington next September. Sweetland is considering an offer made him by the Oregon Agricultural college, along with the Hobart college, as though he will accept the O. A. C. position.

It is believed that President Kerr, of O. A. C., who is en route to the east, will try and make arrangements to have a conference with Dr. Sweetland. Sweetland should be able to develop a strong team at O. A. C. in view of the fact that he has turned out wonderful eleven at Willamette and Hobart with only a limited number of players.

A four-year rule similar to the one in effect in the various collegiate conferences in the United States will be in effect at the Multnomah club football circles from now on, if the suggestion made by Manager Martin E. Pratt is approved by the board of directors.

Manager Pratt is of the opinion that football fans, like baseball fans, are anxious to see new players in action, and he thinks that it would be a big boost to the game, and would encourage the young players to turn out for the eleven as they will have some chance of making the team.

A coaching system will be inaugurated at the club next fall.
