IN "Acquitted," the feature of the Columbia bill, the Triangle company introduces a new ingenue, Bessie Love. D. W. Griffith, who has a reputation for picking successful motion picture actresses, declares that she has the personal charm and mentality that makes her a "comer." In "Acquitted," she has a part that well suits her personality.

"Acquitted" is the story of an innocent man's suffering as a result of an unjust arrest. John Carter (Wilfred Lucas) is bookkeeper of the Home Insurance company of Booneville. His boyhood chum, Ira Wolcott (Sam De Grasse), has become the president of the firm. One night Charles Rider, the cashier, and Carter are doing some extra work on the accounts. The night watchman tries to borrow money of Rider to buy cocaine. While Carter is in the vault, the watchman grabs a bunch of bills, and in a struggle with Rider, kills him. Carter finds the murdered man and calls up the police. Carter is arrested on suspicion and put through the third degree. Through the efforts of Ned Fowler, a reporter who is courting Carter's daughter, the bookkeeper is freed. The watchman confesses his guilt. Carter finds that Wolcott won't hire him on account of the notoriety he has gained. The Carter family is reduced to destitution. Easter Sunday comes around. Carter writes a note saying that he has gone to a hotel in the town to end all. Nellie, the bookkeeper's little daughter, goes into a yard and picks a handful of white lilies. Wolcott, the owner of the place, talks to the child and finds she is the daughter of Carter. He accompanies her to her home. His eye lights on the note. With the child, he hastens to the hotel. The bookkeeper has turned on the gas, but recovers on being taken outside. Wolcott's sympathies are aroused and he promises Carter his old position.

A Keystone, "Love Will Conquer," starring Fred Mace, is the added attraction. A special feature is a Pathe Travelogue, showing wonderful sun-sets and twilight scenes in the land of the chrysanthemum.

"New York," adapted from A. H. Woods' famous Broadway success, starts a four-day run at the Majestic today. Florence Reed heads the cast. The chorus girl's mother comes to collect money, and when King refuses, she tells him that the boy was not his own and threatens to tell the world of his ridiculous position. The effect on King is amazing. He is glad the boy was not his son. He goes to his wife, who has become a mother, and a touching reconciliation follows.

Widow for Star Sues for Damages

James Young Alleges Louis J. Selznick Has Alienated Affections of Mrs. Kimball Young; \$100,000 Asked
New York, Feb. 10.—James Young, who filed in the supreme court action for \$100,000 damages against Louis J. Selznick, charging him with alienating the affection of Clara Kimball Young, Mrs. Young, who is a well known motion picture star, recently sued her husband for separation and the return of \$25,000. She contended he borrowed the money from her. Within the last three weeks Selznick, who is her business manager, organized the Clara

Kimball Young Film Corporation—a \$1,000,000 company—to feature her in the "movies." Young charges Selznick used the contract with Mrs. Young to induce her to leave him. Selznick and Mrs. Young deny her allegations were alienated. They assert she left her husband because she was dissatisfied with his treatment of her.

Three Story Building Is Blown Up in Play

Six Weeks Required to Construct Edifice; 25 Sticks of Dynamite, Three Kegs of Black Powder Used
A sensational explosion involving the destruction of a three story office building took place recently at Inceville. It took six weeks to build the structure, in the construction of which structural steel and concrete were used lavishly. Three hundred people rushed out of the building in all directions just before the charge of dynamite and powder was exploded. Twenty-five sticks of giant powder and three kegs of black powder were used in the destruction of the building. There was a terrific shock and tons of steel, concrete and timber were hurled in the air and the ground was covered with debris for hundreds of yards. Nine cameras, protected by heavy timbers were used to snap the big scene and every detail was faithfully reproduced. Thomas H. Ince, assisted by two of his sub-directors, Raymond B. West and Walter S. Ward, issued directions to the men of players that took part in the panic scene just before the blowing up of the big structure.
