ALLIES ATTEMPTED TO STARVE GREECE INTO WAR, SAYS SKOULOUDIS

Premier Declares Nation Will Not Allow Herself to Be Forced From Stand Taken.

Berlin, via Sayville, March 1.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Skouloudis of Greece is quoted in the Berliner Tageblatt as accusing the entente powers of attempting to starve the Greeks into rebellion against their government.

"Do you consider it possible to force people to give up their neutrality by pressure with bayonets?" M. Skouloudis asked the Tageblatt correspondent. "Whoever believes that the Greeks will abandon their king does not know the Greek character," he continued.

"Between the first and tenth of January the entente powers tried to move the Greek people to rebellion against their government by attempting to starve them, but the Greeks lived on vegetables and fruit."

"The entente then understood that not only the Greek army but a majority of the Greek nation endorsed the government's policy. The entente therefore changed its tactics and allowed the Greeks regular rations."

M. Skouloudis declared that Greece hopes for and desires an offensive against Saloniki, "because the occupation of Saloniki weighs upon every Greek like a nightmare."

According to the correspondent, he expressed certitude that if the Bulgarians enter Greece for purposes of war they will not hurt Greek feeling.

Finally, he declared, emphatically: "At all events the world will see that Greece does not give up her neutrality and that she will not allow herself to be forced by events or by arms."

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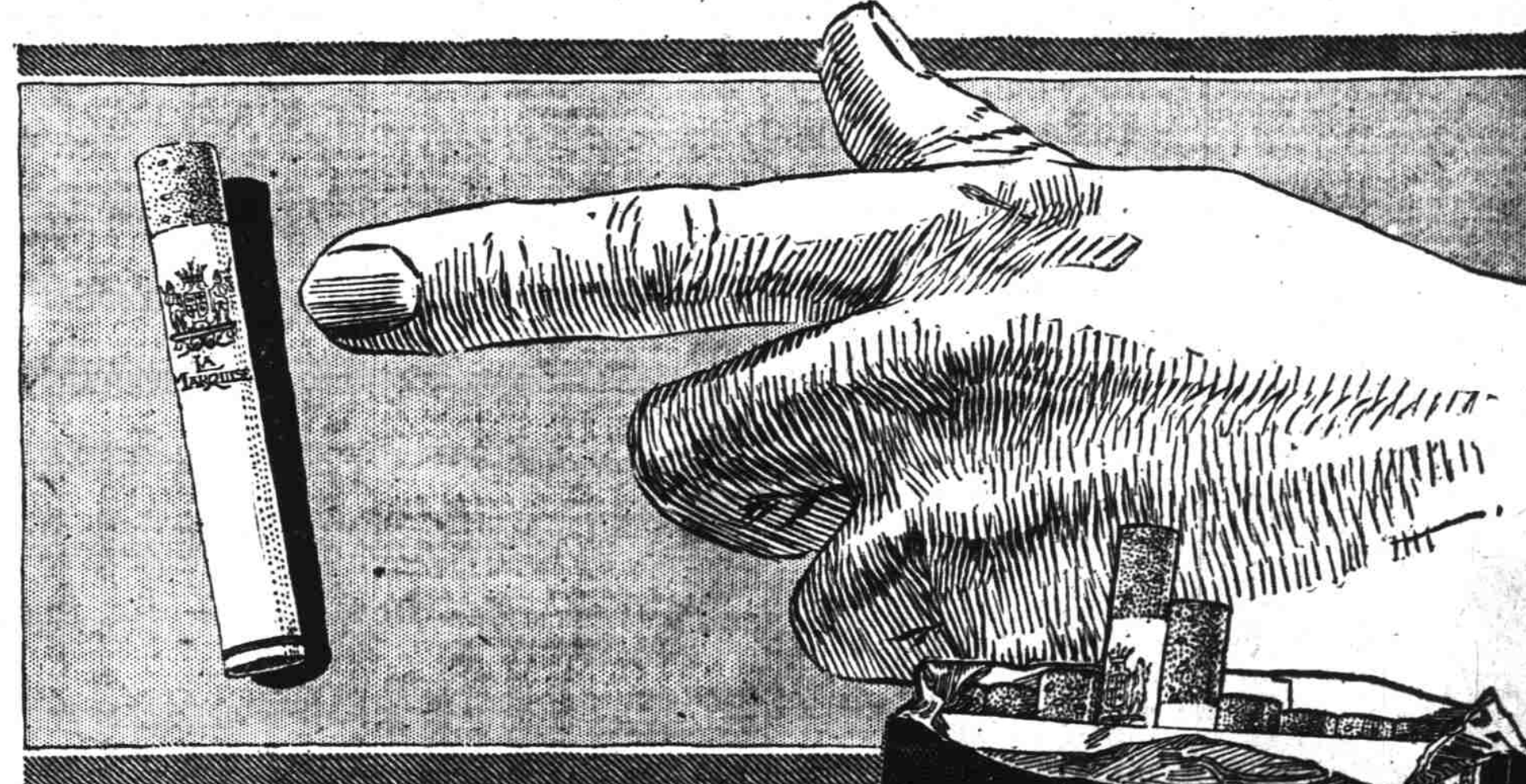
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
