

WINGED M ATHLETES HAVE CHANCE TO WIN RING AND MAT TITLES

Preliminary Boxing Events Are Enlivened by Free-for-All Tussle.

FINALS ON TAP TONIGHT

Albert Beyers Has Chance to Win Two Titles; Hamin, Clark and McCarthy Looked Like Winners of Events.

A free-for-all mixup following the disqualification of Forest Detamore, a 115 pound boxer of the Spokane Amateur Athletic club, in his bout with Louis Goidy of the "Winged M," enlivened the first night's program of the Pacific Northwest association boxing and wrestling championships at the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club last night.

Enraged because of Dranga's decision, Detamore made a couple of passes at Dranga, who at one time, for the benefit of the Spokane boy's knowledge, was the lightweight champion of the Pacific coast.

The real feature of the evening was the double victory of Albert Beyers of the Multnomah club. Beyers won a hairline decision from Lloyd Madden in the welterweight class and then trimmed Earl Baird of Seattle, in the lightweight class.

George Davis of the Butler's school stepped out of his class to meet Van Bontag and lost a close decision. Davis should have been entitled to another round.

In the wrestling events, three bouts were decided by falls, two on decisions and one by default. In the match that was defaulted, Earl Wells of the M. C. A. injured his wrist after three minutes of grappling with George McCarthy.

The remainder of the preliminary events will be decided this afternoon and tonight the finals in all events will be staged. Arrangements have been made to take care of a big crowd. The same officials will handle tonight's events.

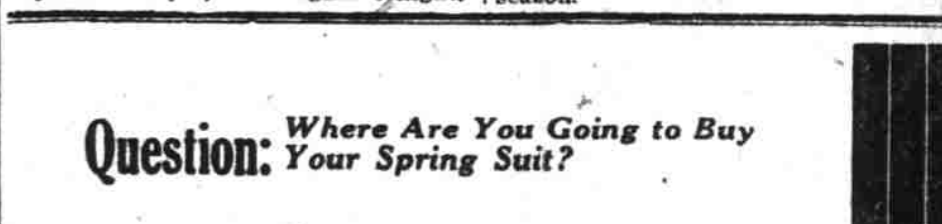
