

WITNESS TELLS WHY BRANDEIS IS OPPOSED BY GREAT FINANCIERS

Enmity Engendered Because of Advocacy of the Oregon Law for Working Women.

Washington, March 2.—(I. N. S.)—Joseph Walker, former speaker of the Massachusetts assembly, testifying in chief of Louis D. Brandeis, in the course of his investigation of his fitness to be a supreme court justice, said: "Brandeis got in wrong with the financial interests first because of his law against the gas companies. Then he fought the New Haven, then the insurance companies by advocating savings banks insurance for workmen. "Enmity was engendered against him by his advocacy before the supreme court of the Oregon law regulating the hours of work for women, and his membership in the public franchise league of Boston.

"I think it is Brandeis' public service which has stirred up the financial interests against him, and in proportion as their hatred grew, they took interest in which he is held by the people of Massachusetts increase."

Senator Walsh of the sub-committee, conducting the hearing, has received 1000 returned student petitions against the action of President Lowell of Harvard in opposing Brandeis and urging favorable consideration of his nomination.

Francis Peabody of Milton, Mass., one of the character witnesses for those opposing confirmation of the nomination, said Brandeis' reputation was that he was "not trustworthy and sailed under false colors."

Luther Burbank III At California Home

Plant Wizard Threatened With Pneumonia But Physician Says His Present Condition Is Not Dangerous.

Santa Rosa, Cal., March 2.—(P. N. S.)—Luther Burbank, the plant wizard, is ill and threatened with pneumonia at his home here today. His sickness is the result of a cold which attacked him several days ago. His physician reported this morning that his condition is not dangerous. For the first time Burbank will be prevented from taking part in the Arbor day celebration in the public schools next Tuesday, which falls on the same day as his birthday anniversary. The public has observed the wizard's birthday and planted trees and shrubs at the same time for many years.

Burbank usually tours all the schools on Arbor day and addresses the pupils at their exercises. He is a liberal contributor to school enterprises and the social center.

Suit Half Century Old Is Compromised

Litigation in Kentucky County Now Made Inactive in Every Shriveling Election While It Existed.

Louisville, March 4.—Litigation begun 45 years ago over a bond issue for a railroad that never was built ended here when Union county taxpayers comprised a suit for \$500,000 with the bondholders for \$100,000 and paid the smaller sum into court.

Roadmaster Named By Douglas County

K. A. Sinclair, of Portland, Gets Job at \$2100 a Year on Recommendation of Yeon and Holman.

Roseburg, Or., March 2.—K. A. Sinclair of Portland was Thursday appointed roadmaster for Douglas county by the county court. He was recommended by Commissioner Holman and Road Master Yeon of Portland who had formerly employed him. His salary was fixed at \$2100 per year. Mr. Yeon, who is in Roseburg, addressed the commercial club on road matters tonight.

Chappell Fortune Left to Children

Denver, Colo., March 3.—(I. N. S.)—The will of the late Delos A. Chappell, president of the Nevada-California Power company, bequeaths a \$1,500,000 estate to the two children, Delos A. Chappell, a student at Leland Stanford university, and Mrs. Jean C. Cranmer.

Young Chappell receives \$1,000,000 and Mrs. Cranmer \$500,000. The son is to receive \$300,000 cash upon his marriage.

Roosevelt Gets Big Lead in Straw Vote

Of 9000 Leading Republicans Who Answered Circular 40 Per Cent Want Him to Have Nomination.

New York, March 2.—(I. N. S.)—"For Heaven's sake don't put my name on any such circular," wrote Colonel Roosevelt a year ago to Henry Green, a publicity agent who was beginning country-wide canvases with a view to classifying presidential candidates and reading the barometer of public opinion.

Green sent circulars to 20,000 prominent men. He has received 9000 answers. Colonel Roosevelt heads the list of presidential preferences. Roosevelt so far has polled more than 40 per cent of the Republican vote. Following him in order are Burton, Hughes, Root and Senator Borah.

There were only two Democratic names on the circular, those of President Wilson and Champ Clark. Wilson apparently clinched Democratic sentiment with the speaker of the house running strong.

Sheridan Man Files For the Legislature

W. O. Sims, Lawyer, Seeks to Represent Yamhill County in House of Representatives as a Republican.

Oregon, Or., March 2.—W. O. Sims of this place has filed with the secretary of state his declaration of candidacy for representative for the thirteenth representative district, composed of Yamhill county, and will stand as a candidate on the Republican ticket. Mr. Sims is a member of the state bar association and is now serving his ninth term as city attorney of Sheridan. His slogan is "For economy and conservative legislation."

May Go to Columbus, Ohio. Columbus, Ohio, March 2.—(I. N. S.)—It is not likely that any decision on accepting the superintendency of the Columbus schools will be made by John H. Francis, superintendent of the Los Angeles schools, during his present visit here, according to his views when he arrived here.

"I haven't had time to consider the situation from all sides," he said, "and do not believe I will be able to give any answer today. I am leaving your city tonight."

Mother Only 11 Years Old. San Bernardino, Cal., March 3.—(U. P.)—A seven pound baby was born today to Simona Ablu, a child of 11 years. Surgeons consider the case a phenomenon. Simona is barely four feet tall. She weighs 80 pounds.

ELMIRA LUMBER MILL TO OPEN; OUTLOOK IS FOR CONTINUOUS RUN

One or Two New Logging Camps Will Be Started in Coast Mountains, Report.

Eugene, Or., March 2.—The sawmill of the Elmira Lumber company at Elmira, west of Eugene, will resume operations Monday with a force of 30 or 35 men in the plant, besides several teamsters hauling to the railroad at Velasco. F. C. Walters, manager of the company, said yesterday that it is expected to run all summer long if the price of lumber remains good, and that one or two additional logging camps will be opened in the coast mountains if the market continues on the upgrade. There is one camp now in operation, employing a number of men.

A big drive of logs was recently received at the mill, having been floated down the Long Tom river from a tract of timber which the company owns in the mountains a few miles back of Elmira.

Slide Destroys Road. Eugene, Or., March 2.—A big slide on the road that was constructed by the forestry department at Cape Perpetua on the coast of Lane county last year, occurred during the recent stormy weather and about 100 feet of it will have to be reconstructed, according to H. B. Rankin, supervisor of the Blueual national forest, who has recently returned from a trip to the forest.

Mr. Rankin says that the slide tore out the road and it will be necessary to cut back into the solid rock, as was done at the beginning.

Representative of Firm Which Is to Build 2 1/2 Mile Timber Districts to Start Work March 5.

Roseburg, Or., March 2.—C. L. Kendall, personal representative of Kendall Brothers of Pittsburg, who are to build the proposed sawmill and railroad to the timber districts from Roseburg, has received a letter stating that S. A. Kendall will leave for Roseburg on March 5. Should a decision favorable to the city, as is expected, be received from the Oregon supreme court in the case brought by John Hunter and others against the city of Roseburg attacking the proposition, it is believed the work will begin shortly after Mr. Kendall's arrival here. Practically all other matters in connection with the enterprise are already settled.
