

TEDDY SLINGSBY IS LOSER IN BATTLE TO WIN GREAT ESTATE

Protesting Relatives Are Allowed Appeal by British Court of Appeals.

BABY LOSES \$1,000,000

Lord Justice Declares Mrs. Slingsby's Testimony Unreliable and Condemns Her; Other Judge Concurs.

London, March 13.—The appeal of the protesting relatives in the Slingsby changing baby case was granted by the court of appeals today. This means that little Teddy Slingsby loses. The decision was rendered by Lord Justice Warrington.

"Mrs. Slingsby's testimony," he said, "is unreliable unless corroborated by disinterested witnesses. Undoubtedly she called at the Associated Charities in San Francisco and applied for a child. I do not believe that any woman expecting to become a mother would advertise for a baby-boy to adopt. She must, therefore, be condemned as a woman who lied in the matter of the advertisement, and who supported the lie with perjury."

Justice Bray concurred in the decision. There were only two justices sitting in the case.

Lieutenant Slingsby, now serving in the English navy, was ordered to pay the costs of the case, which probably will reach \$150,000.

The court's decision rules that Charles Edward Slingsby, now 5 years old, the \$1,000,000 changeling, over whose legitimacy a bitter legal battle has been fought in two countries, is not the child of Lieutenant Charles Henry Slingsby of the British navy and Mrs. Dorothy Cutler Morgan-Slingsby.

This judgment was rendered in granting the appeal of opposing brothers of Lieutenant Slingsby, who have declared that the child was a changeling, and not the rightful heir to the \$1,000,000 estate of the Rev. Charles

NOT THE HEIR TO SLINGSBY ESTATE, SAYS COURT



Lieutenant Charles H. Slingsby, His Wife, and Charles Edward Slingsby, Now 5 Years Old.

Slingsby, the famous "reporting parson" of Yorkshire.

The verdict that the Slingsby child is not the offspring of Lieutenant Slingsby and his wife brings to a sensational climax the bitter litigation begun in San Francisco more than four years ago, when representatives of the lieutenant's brothers charged that the child was the illegitimate son of Vivian Anderson, a Geyserville, Cal., school girl, and Paul Colvin, a chauffeur.

In an effort to disprove this charge Lieutenant Slingsby and his wife went to San Francisco from London, in the local courts and before the local British consulate they presented evidence intended to disprove the charge that the schoolgirl's baby had been taken by the Slingsbys as their own.

The case then was shifted to London, where the probate division of the high court of justice upheld the legitimacy of the \$1,000,000 Slingsby heir. An appeal was taken, with the result that the court of appeals, sweeping aside the judgment of the lower tribunal, declared the Slingsby child to be a changeling.

DEBATING TEAMS OF UNIVERSITIES PLAN TRIANGULAR CONTEST

Oregon, Washington, Stanford Will Meet at Eugene, Seattle and Palo Alto.

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 13.—The most important intercollegiate debates of the Pacific coast this year will be held March 24 when the teams from the University of Oregon, University of Washington and Stanford University meet in a triangular contest at Eugene, Seattle and Palo Alto.

The United States should maintain a navy above third rank in fighting efficiency.

On her home floor in Palo Alto, Stanford will assert the affirmative against the negative team from University of Washington.

At Eugene the University of Oregon's affirmative team will be pitted against Stanford's negative team. The University of Washington will meet Oregon at Seattle, upholding the affirmative while her negative team will be at Palo Alto.

Won One, Lost One.

By this device each institution meets the other two and the championship is decided according to the number of votes secured by both teams of each school. Three judges will sit at each of the three debates.

Last year University of Oregon won unanimously from University of Washington and lost 2 to 1 to Stanford University.

At Seattle this year Cloyd Dawson and Nicholas Jauregui will defend the negative for University of Oregon at Seattle. Walter Myers and Earl Fleischman will advance the affirmative for Oregon in the debate at Eugene against Stanford.

On April 7 the University of Montana will meet Oregon in the last intercollegiate debate of the year in which Oregon is interested. This contest will take place at Missoula, Montana, on the same general subject of the navy. University of Oregon defeated Montana last year by a 2 to 1 decision, supporting the negative of the government ownership of railroads question.

U. of O. Has One Victory.

Already this year the affirmative and negative teams from Oregon Agricultural college fell before University of Oregon orators.

In the last four years, or since Robert W. Prescott became coach of Oregon's debating teams, the University of Oregon has won nine of the 12 debates in which it has participated.

Pogue of Salem Out For Circuit Judge

Salem, Or., March 13.—Myron E. Pogue of Salem, has announced his candidacy for the Republican nomination as circuit judge of the third judicial district, which comprises Linn and Marion counties.

Pogue was born in Lake county in 1862, and has lived in Oregon all of his life. He studied at the University of Oregon, and afterward read law with the Honorable Binger Herman at Roseburg. He has been in Salem since 1888, and has practiced law for 22 years.

Soldiers' Home at Roseburg Carries Man, Wife and Sons on Payroll.

NEW JOBS ARE CREATED

Expenditures Show Large Increase Since New Commandant Took Public Job at Institution.

Salem, Or., March 12.—The tendency to create jobs to get members of the families of institution officers on the state payroll is not confined to the state prison. Recently attention was called in The Journal to the fact that the job of chauffeur had been created at the state prison to take care of George Sherwood, son of Deputy Warden Sherwood. It had never before been found necessary to have a chauffeur in the employ of the prison. The work had been done without adding anything to the payroll.

At the Soldiers' Home at Roseburg it appears that Commandant Markee, who succeeded Commandant Elder last fall, in December created the position of mail carrier, and Chauncey Markee, his son, was placed on the salary list. In the same month the position of electrician was created and William M. Markee, another son, was given the place.

Payrolls for December, January and February show that both sons of the commandant have signed up regularly for their checks.

This makes four Markees drawing salary, the commandant, his wife as matron, and their two sons.

It is asserted here that neither the job of mail carrier or electrician was created before the Markee regime and that there is no necessity for such employment.

A comparison of months in the Elder and Markee administrations shows that Elder's payroll for May was \$821, June \$841 and July \$717. Since Markee took charge there has been a considerable increase in the payroll, as follows: October \$879, November \$909, December \$895 and January \$955.

Salem Company Ready.

Salem, Or., March 13.—In case the war in Mexico would require the loss of the Oregon National Guard, Major Carl Abrams of the state industrial accident commission, and Private George Putnam, secretary to Governor Withycombe, would go with the guard, they state. Putnam is a private in Company M of Salem.

Company M would take with it many young business and professional men from Salem. It has now a membership of 106, the largest of any company in Oregon, and First Lieutenant Williams of the regular army, who inspected it recently, paid it a well deserved compliment.

Salem, Or., March 13.—Mrs. Minnie McCauley, a resident of Salem since 1879, is dead. She was born in Guelph, Canada, and had been a resident of Salem since 1879, her home being at 486 North Liberty street. She came to Oregon with the family of Oswald West in 1877 and moved to Salem two years later. She married T. N. McCauley in 1883. She is survived by three daughters, Mrs. E. N. Gillingham of Salem, Mrs. E. J. Park of Seelye, Cal., and Miss Marian McCauley, student of the Salem high school.

Arrested For Non-Support.

Salem, Or., March 13.—Harry L. Cratty is in jail here on a charge of failing to support his 14-year-old son, who has been making his home with his maternal grandmother at Oregon City since his mother died. Cratty was arrested at Oregon City.

Coroner Seeks Re-election.

Salem, Or., March 13.—A. M. Clough, for 22 years coroner of Marion county, has filed a candidacy for the Republican nomination for another term. D. G. Drager, county treasurer, has filed as a candidate for the Republican nomination for another term.

Russians Reported Headed for Bagdad

Forces Operating in Persia Occupy Town of Kerind, 125 Miles From Ancient Metropolis—Near Frontier.

Petrograd, March 13.—(I. N. S.)—The Russians who have been operating in Persia have apparently begun a march upon Bagdad. The official army headquarters report says:

"We have occupied the town of Kerind, Persia, in the direction of Bagdad."

Kerind is 50 miles west of Kerman-shah, which the Russians captured some time since, and only 40 miles from the Turco-Persian frontier, almost on a direct line to Bagdad, which is 125 miles distant.

An advance of 60 miles further west would bring the czar's troops into the valley of the river Diyala, an eastern tributary of the Tigris, which would give them an easy approach to the ancient Arabian metropolis.

15,000 School Boys To Receive Training

New York Leads to Be in Camp Under Eye of General Leonard Wood, Former Chief of Staff.

New York, March 13.—(I. N. S.)—Fifteen thousand New York school boys will receive military training in camp this summer under the eye of General Leonard Wood, U. S. A., and other officers.

Organization is being completed of the National School Camp association, which will conduct the camp. At a meeting next Saturday the boys will be enrolled.

Until the vacation season opens the boys are to be drilled in national guard armories after school hours twice a week.
