

MILITARY AUXILIARY PLANS FOR BUSINESS MEN ARE ANNOUNCED

Organization of Company of Lawyers Is First Step in Proposed Undertaking.

DUNIWAY DRAFTS OUTLINE

Initial Meeting to Be Held on Board Cruiser Boston Next Wednesday Evening; Ideas Explained.

A plan for an Oregon militia auxiliary corps for business men has been prepared by R. R. Duniway, chairman of a special Chamber of Commerce committee.

A first step involves the organization of a company of lawyers. An initial meeting is to be held on the cruiser Boston next Wednesday evening.

"We need privates who will understand the honor and responsibility of the position," is Mr. Duniway's comment. His outline of organization plan follows:

1. To form an active unit which shall have weekly drills in marching, small arms and heavy corps manual (including machine guns which shall hold itself as a reserve force subject to the call of the governor of the state of Oregon for the purpose of defense of the state of Oregon.

2. To form an honorary unit which shall not be compelled to bear arms but which shall attend company lectures (whenever possible) and lead in moral support to all undertakings of the organization as a whole.

3. (a) To make an active interest in informing itself of the military and naval needs of the United States and the general status of the United States.

(b) To advocate the doctrine of immediate preparedness on the part of the United States; all its branches in advancing its interests;

(c) To assist in securing national and state legislation to carry out the above enumerated purposes.

The Oregon reserve corps to consist of two units:

(a) Active unit: To consist of all able-bodied members of the Oregon militia under the age of 50.

(b) Honorary unit: To consist of members of the Oregon bar who are unable to take an active part in drills, etc.

Active Unit:

6. Active unit: Members must subscribe to these articles which shall bind them for a period of one year (subject to extension by mutual consent) and to:

(a) Drill at least once each week.

(b) Study small arms manual.

(c) Study machine gun manual.

(d) Study heavy gun manual.

(e) Attend and participate in target practice.

(f) Attend military and naval lectures given on drill nights.

(g) Obey commands of duly authorized officers of the corps given in connection with the foregoing.

7. Equip themselves with uniforms when necessary.

8. The active unit shall for the first period of its existence be deemed an auxiliary marine corps attached to the U. S. S. Albatross, head stationed at Portland, rifles, rifle instruction, machine guns, machine gun instruction, the principles of marksmanship, military lectures, the use of the Clackamas rifle range for target practice to be made available to the corps by the naval militia under the supervision of the adjutant general of the state of Oregon.

9. The work of the corps shall be carried on at such times as not to interfere with the drills and work of the regularly enlisted militia.

Officers Are Listed.

10. Officers: After a period of drill and instruction deemed sufficient by the adjutant general, competitive examinations shall be held in such work as said adjutant general shall direct for the appointment of officers of the corps who shall be appointed by a board consisting of the adjutant general of the state of Oregon.

(a) The commanding officer of the Oregon naval militia.

(b) The officers so appointed shall serve in such capacity for a period of one year from the date of the organization of the corps.

(c) The officers so appointed shall also serve the corps in the following capacities:

(d) 1. Captain-in-Chief.

(e) 2. First lieutenant-Secretary.

(f) 3. Second lieutenant-Treasurer.

(g) Drill nights shall be arranged by the commanding officer of the training ship.

(h) Details to be worked out as occasions demand.

11. The corps shall work in harmony with the adjutant general and officers of the naval militia and shall be guided largely by their suggestions.

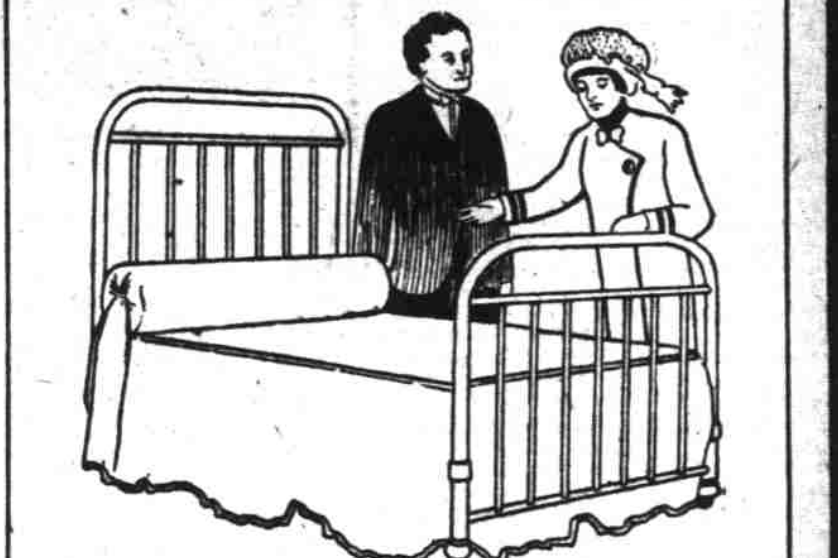

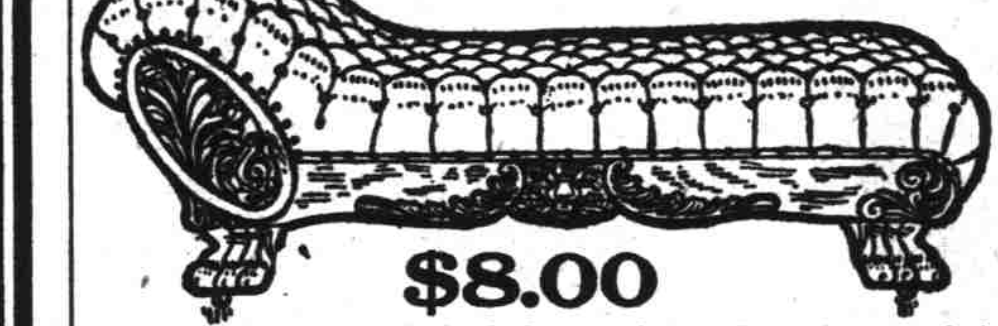
