MILITARY AUXILIARY PLANS FOR BUSINESS MEN ARE ANNOUNCED

Organization of Company of Lawyers Is First Step in Proposed Undertaking.

DUNIWAY DRAFTS OUTLINE

Initial Meeting to Be Held on Board Cruiser Boston Next Wednesday Evening; Ideas Explained.

A plan for an Oregon militia auxiliary corps for business men has been prepared by R. R. Duniway, chairman of a special Chamber of Commerce committee,

A first step involves the organization of a company of lawyers. An initial meeting is to be held on the cruiser Boston next Wednesday

"We need privates who will understand the honor and responsibility of the position," is Mr. Duniway's com-ment. His outline of organization plan follows:

l'urposes:

1. To form an active unit which shall have weekly drills in marching, small arms and heavy gun manual (including machine guns) which shall hold itself as a reserve force subject to the call of the governor of the state of Oregon for the purpose of defense of the state of Oregon.

2. To form an honorary unit which shall not be compelled to bear arms but which shall attend company lectures (whenever possible) and lend its moral support to all undertakings of the organization as a whole.

Preparedness Is Sought. (a) The entire corps to take an active interest in informing itself of the military and naval needs of the United States and the

and haval needs of the United States and the several states;
(b) To advocate the doctrine of immediate preparedness on the part of the United States;
(c) To cooperate with the state militia in all its branches in advancing its interests;
d) To assist in securing national and state legislation to carry out the above enumerated purposes.


