

VOLCANIC CINDERS OF CROOK COUNTY FOUND USELESS IN MACADAM

Report Is Made to State Engineer Lewis by Professor Graf of Agricultural College

USEFUL AS FOUNDATION

Might Serve Well Through Under Binder of Macadam. Mixed Like Ordinary Sheet Asphalt.

Salem, Or., April 6.—A report received Wednesday by State Engineer Lewis from Prof. S. H. Graf of the Oregon Agricultural college, shows that volcanic cinders of Crook county possess but little cementing power of themselves and, therefore, their use in an ordinary type of waterbound macadam is not practicable.

The cinders are also so porous and brittle that they do not possess the necessary crushing strength to allow their use in cement or bituminous concrete roads.

That a successful road might be built, however, by using the cinders as a foundation, on top of which might be put a binder consisting of natural cinders, mixed in the proportion of the ordinary sheet asphalt, is indicated by the report.

The latter seems feasible because the material of which the cinders are composed is in itself quite hard and resists abrasion very well, but on account of its porous nature is weak mechanically, unless crushed so fine that the pores are eliminated from the individual particles," said Engineer Lewis. "In addition to this type of construction, some special forms of penetration method roadways may also be investigated."

The use of the cinders has been under consideration by the state highway commission.

Man Breaks Jail to Visit Sweetheart

William Henderson, Held at The Dalles as Witness, Went to Freedom With Wire Found With Bride-to-Be.

The Dalles, Or., April 6.—Encouraged by his sweetheart, Miss Virginia Axtell of Aberdeen, William Henderson of Lyle, Wash., who was being held in the city jail as a witness against O. N. Reeves of Goldendale, charged with bootlegging, worked his way out of the jail at noon Tuesday with a small wire. The officers discovered his escape shortly after noon and an immediate search was instituted. They found Henderson and the girl at Lyle last night.

Henderson and Miss Axtell were engaged to be married when the former was arrested. Forcing a wire through the lock on an outer jail door, Henderson lifted the key from the lock, which had been left by an officer, and pulled it through a small hole in the door. It was then an easy matter to open the door.

"Perjury" Campaign Starts.

The Dalles, Or., April 6.—In an effort to make the prohibition law as prohibitive as possible, the police have inaugurated a "perjury" campaign. Four men have already been arrested, charged with perjury in connection with obtaining alcohol from drugstores under false pretenses. All were bound over to grand jury investigation under heavy bonds.

It has not reached an agreement as yet, but a license fee will be charged and also the proprietor of each jitney line must give a bond covering accidents and violations of the traffic ordinances. Amounts of the license and bond are unsettled questions yet.
