Beauty Chat

Don't Brush the Gums. RUSH your teeth. Don't brush your gums. Keep your mouth clean, but use a wash—without a brush, to cleanse.

There is an element of danger in brushing the teeth which is only too often ignored. The hard enamel can readily withstand the application of even the stiffest bristles, but the gums are torn and injured seriously when the brush slips over them.

Most people cleanse their teeth with more zeal than discretion. After selecting a suitable powder, paste or wash their method of application is so extremely crude that it does as much harm as good.

Brushes are made to be applied to the hard enamel of the teeth. Hard brushing irritates and frets the gums until they gradually recede in self-protection, thus exposing the softer portions of the teeth. When these parts are exposed decay is almost certain to follow. Nature never intended such exposure. The defiance of nature is always costly.

When coarse powders and stiff brushes are used without respect for the gums and an avoidance of them when brushing, their condition is sure to be impaired. The gums are delicately constructed. They bleed readily, and for this reason, as a rule, the bleeding receives nothing more than passing notice. But when blood is drawn the teeth are being brushed in the wrong way.

Dentists are kept busy doctoring gums as well as teeth. Many of the troubles of the gums can be directly attributed to the indiscriminate use of brushes. Such brushing also creates dental work by exposing the soft parts

of the teeth which are not protected by a coating of enamel.

There are two ways of damaging your teeth—the one is by not brushing them—the other is by brushing them the wrong way. It is natural for the cleanly person to desire to perfectly cleanse their mouth. In the anxiety to do so, very often the brush that should be carefully applied only to the teeth reaches the gums. When this happens the damage begins. Its first appearance may seem unimportant, but when the brush is continually applied to the teeth and the same time the latter are bound to recede.

Receding gums cause great suffering and annoyance. They lose their health and fail to perform the functions assigned to them—such as protecting the teeth above the enamel line.

Rinse your mouth with warm water or an antiseptic wash. Cleanse your mouth and gums in this way and remove the brush for your teeth. When you select a tooth brush, see that you get one in which the bristles are not too close together. The bristles should be trimmed to give the brush a serrated face. Brush the teeth with a half rotary motion and keep the bristles away from the gums. Use dental thread to cleanse those parts of the teeth that cannot be reached with a brush.

Ask your dentist how to brush your teeth. He will give you a lesson which might prove valuable. If you do not take this precaution, remember the brush is not for the purpose of brushing the gums. If such use is made of it the gums will be injured and by receding will give the teeth needless and dangerous exposure.
