

PROPOSITION TO RUN AGAINST BEN OLCOTT IS NOT ENTERTAINED

W. A. Carter Considers Present Incumbent Most Efficient Secretary.

W. A. Carter is the most recent invitee who has refused to enter the race for nomination as secretary of state against Ben W. Olcott. The out-coming Governor Withycombe's office put the proposition up to Mr. Carter some days ago, but he refused to take the bait and definitely turned the proposition down.

"I consider that Mr. Olcott has made the most efficient secretary of state Oregon has ever had, and I do not want to oppose him," said Mr. Carter this morning. "I may differ with him on some political grounds, but he is a very efficient official and, for that reason, if for no other, I would not become a candidate against him."

Governor Withycombe came to Portland yesterday afternoon and registered at the Imperial hotel. J. G. Richardson, examiner for the corporation department, also is at the Imperial, and the campaign for an Olcott opponent is still going on.

It is understood that strong offers of support are made to those who are urged to become candidates. These promises have not been fruitful of success so far, however, and as the time grows short in which a candidate may enter the race, the efforts to induce some one to run are being redoubled.

Strong pressure is still being brought to bear on Charles B. Moore, and there are others who are being urged to run, but who, like the rest, hesitate to take the plunge, even with the governor's office behind them.

E. P. MORCUM IS CANDIDATE
Woodburn Resident Seeks Nomination for Bench.

Salem, Or., April 8.—(U. N. S.)—Republican candidate entered the race for circuit judge in Marion and Linn counties today. Elisha P. Morcum of Woodburn selecting the following as his slogan:

"A strict accountability under the law, regardless of politics, personality or position."

"Undeviate to enforce the law in accordance with equity and justice to all."

Circuit Judge Kelly and Attorneys Bingham and Poague of Salem are already in the race.

R. W. Swager of Ontario filed for the Democratic nomination for district attorney of Malheur county.

RACE IS NOW FOUR CORNERED
Numerous Republicans After Seat in Legislature From Yamhill.

McMinnville, Or., April 8.—The race for the legislature among Republicans has started a pretty fourcornered fight, with Hiram C. Cronin, of Newberg, a retired minister, now farming in that section; W. O. Sims of Sheridan, city attorney in his home town, and W. W. Lunge of McMinnville, a farmer. Ira C. Barber of Williamina is also a candidate for that office.

W. W. Nickell has filed his declaration for the Republican nomination for county assessor against Martin Miller, incumbent and candidate for renomination and re-election.

The race for joint senator is also one of interest among Republicans, with T. B. Handley Jr. of Tillamook, Jesse Edwards of Newberg, Francis A. Mitchell of McMinnville and J. T. Smith of near Newberg aspiring for the office.

W. G. Henderson, incumbent, Del Warren, A. P. Fletcher and Roy C. Faulconer of Sheridan are contesting the Republican nomination for sheriff.

Ivan Daniel of Portland has announced himself for the office of county recorder on the Republican ticket.

BENTON COUNTY UP IN AIR
Situation on Representative Becoming Complex.

Corvallis, Or., April 8.—Benton county is "up in the air" over the matter of representatives, and the situation took on another turn when petitions were put in circulation asking A. J. Johnson, president of the Benton County Taxpayers' association, to be a candidate, as is also W. P. Lafferty. Both are Republicans. Corvallis usually dominates the primaries. Mack is the country candidate, and Lafferty expects a nomination from the city. Lafferty is not considered a strong candidate, and the Republicans in the city see a likelihood of Mack winning.

It is thought that if Johnson will consent to run, he will carry the city nearly solidly and be the nominee, and that the Democrats would have less show to win than against either of the present candidates.

It is rumored that E. G. Leedy, ex-State Grange master, will be the candidate put forth by the Democrats.

Mr. Johnson was for two terms a member of the senate, and he is considered a strong candidate.

G. A. BROWN WILL NOT RUN
District Attorney Evans Is Still Without an Opponent.

George Arthur Brown, who has been considering entrance into the political arena as a candidate for district attorney in the Republican primaries against Walter E. Evans has definitely decided not to run.

District Attorney Evans seems to be

in much the same condition as that held by Secretary of State Olcott. He has no opposition for renomination so far, but there are some who would like to see him opposed. These people urge Mr. Brown to become a candidate but after looking into the question he today made definite announcement that he would stay out.

Well Known Man Candidate.
F. B. Tichenor of Port Orford, Curry county, is a candidate for the house of representatives from that district on the Democratic ticket, according to information contained in a letter to friends in the city. He will oppose S. F. Pierce, who was elected in the 1915 legislature and who is seeking reelection on the Republican ticket. Mr. Tichenor is well known in Portland. He was manager of the east side Democratic county central committee headquarters during the election of 1914.

Wheelon of The Dalles have been added to the executive committee of the Cummins organization, which is conducting the campaign in the interest of Senator Cummins from the Imperial hotel. EMPRESS THEATRE IS SOLD TO HIPPODROME CIRCUIT PROPRIETORS
Ackerman & Harris Purchase String of Theatres Extending Through Northwest.

San Francisco, April 8.—(P. N. S.)—Announcement of a big deal in Pacific coast theatre property will be made today by A. J. Rich & Co., local realty agents, whereby the circuit of which the local Hippodrome is a part is extended through the northwest, the Portland, Seattle and Butte and Minneapolis Empress theatres of the Sullivan & Considine circuit having been sold, through Rich & Co., to the circuit controlled by Irving C. Ackerman and his associates.

This deal extends their chain of theatres from San Diego to Minneapolis.

Rumors that a big deal affecting the Empress circuit was being negotiated were floating about Portland yesterday when Irving C. Ackerman and Sam Harris, California vaudeville men, and John W. Considine of the Sullivan & Considine circuit made a brief visit to this city.

Today's announcement in San Francisco comes as confirmation.

Messrs. Ackerman and Harris gained an entering wedge into the Portland theatrical field several weeks ago when they bought the lease on the home of the Orpheum at Broadway and Yamhill street.

With the acquisition of the Empress theater in the Northwest and in Minneapolis through the ground work for an entirely new circuit.

Details as to their future plans are not known here, but they are expected to be in Portland here and there is probable, more complete announcements will be made.

Closing of the deal probably means a farewell to the Sullivan & Considine circuit in this city.

ATTORNEY MERRICK ENTERS PLEA OF NOT GUILTY TO CHARGE

Defendant Declares He Has Never Seen Frances Hodges, His Accuser.

Attorney R. L. Merrick, former secretary to ex-Congressman A. Walter Lafferty, has entered a plea of not guilty to the charge of contributing to the delinquency of Frances Hodges, 15 years old.

To Deputy District Attorney Collier, Merrick declared that he did not know the girl and never had seen her so far as he knew. On the other hand, the girl says she has known Merrick for a number of years and she and her mother have been in his office at different times in connection with business matters. Merrick is married and has two children.

CONSTABLE DISTRICT PUZZLE
Candidates Find Law Confusing; Will Ask for Interpretation.

Candidates for constable for the Portland district will be asked to find the law confusing, as had been supposed until today, when Andy Kausha, candidate for the Republican nomination, presented a copy of his petition to Deputy County Clerk Bush for approval.

Instead, Deputy District Attorney Murphy and the half-dozen candidates for constable will ask the county commissioners Monday morning for official designation of the boundaries of the Portland district, so the voters may elect the constable for their own district.

This confusion arose over the change in the laws establishing a district court in place of justices of the peace. In 1915 this law was amended to include the entire county, but a similar change was not made for the constable.

The eastern part of the county, including the Fairview, Rockwood, Cycamore and Gresham precincts, is the Multnomah constable district, and the western part, including the city and the remaining territory in the county in the Portland district.

HE SHOULD HAVE KEPT OUT
Prudent Men Will Not Remain When Barroom Fight Begins.

When a barroom fight starts a prudent man will not stand around until he gets into the middle of it. He should have kept out.

Recourse should be a criminal action against the offending parties, and not a civil action for money damages.

This was the ground taken by Circuit Judge Gantenben yesterday afternoon, when he allowed a motion to dismiss the suit brought by Roy J. Masters against Harry W. School and Charles Brock, who were owners of a saloon at East Twenty-eighth street and Sandy boulevard, for \$5000 alleged damages.

Masters entered the saloon to buy a drink, when he crossed Joseph Seifert, bartender, who was having a row with another man. Seifert turned on Masters and beat him up and set a dog on him.

DISMISSAL OF CASE IS ASKED
Chief Engineer of Incinerator Held Not Subject to Civil Service.

Pointing out that C. H. Feldman, the present chief engineer of the city incinerator, was employed in that position when the amendment to the city charter was passed in 1912, to the effect that the incumbents of all positions should be appointed by the city, the judge said that the city was not bound to appoint him.

This request is embodied in an answer to the petition filed yesterday afternoon by the city attorney, who is Ben B. Thomas, J. W. White and Jesse E. Pelton, who demand that one of them be appointed to the position, on the ground that Feldman has never passed the civil service examination.

TAX CONTROVERSY IS ENDED
County Must Pay Balance to State; Sum Credited.

The long controversy between the treasurer of Multnomah county and the state tax commission over the payment of the balance of the state taxes due from this county for 1915 is ended. The trouble arose over the portion of city taxes to be withheld by Multnomah county to pay the interest on the \$1,250,000 Interstate bridge bonds.

County Treasurer Lewis and the county commissioners were notified today that the state tax commission had credited with \$59,752.75 state taxes, which the county had paid to the state.

The balance of \$27,075.25 before May 1 the injunction order restraining County Treasurer Lewis from paying the money will be dissolved.

NEW YEAR CLUBMAN "SLIDES"
Brags at White Ribbon Headquarters That Booze Is Plenty.

Walden, N. Y., April 8.—The member of ex-Municipal Judge Stevenson's late New Year's club dropped in at W. C. T. U. headquarters in the Dekum building this morning for a social call.

"I can buy all the booze I want in this town," he is reported to have told the White Ribboners, who notified District Attorney and Sheriff Hurlburt.

Ward was sent to get the man, who, he said, had been drinking and was dangerous. He was taken to the city hall and held in the city jail.

Lad's Father Named as Guardian in the Divorce Case.

The young couple, who were attending a business college in Portland, were married at Vancouver, April 13, 1915. They went to live with their parents at Lyons, in Linn county.

GOVERNOR LISTER IS ON RECORD FOR MEN RATHER THAN PARTIES
Washington Executive Declares He Favors Non-Partisan Election of Officials.

Seattle, Wash., April 8.—(U. P.)—Governor Ernest Lister of Washington today declared himself in favor of non-partisan election for all state, city and county elective offices. He is the second governor in the United States to do so. Governor Hiram Johnson of California also came out in favor of this movement.

This is no sudden or recent decision with me," said Governor Lister. "Twice I have recommended to the legislature the abolition of party lines in the election of public officers and the removal of the party label altogether. Experience, moreover, has proved in an all-around manner that the work of the legislature, as well as of other public offices, is seriously hampered by partisanship."

Merits Lost in Shuffle.
"Again and again it has been demonstrated by the members of one party, if proposed by a member of an opposing party, in the bitterness and jealousies for party advantage the merits of the measure itself are lost sight of."

"I cannot see any reason why a county commissioner, city treasurer, state auditor or member of the legislature should be either a Republican, Democrat or member of any other nature. He is fit or unfit for office on his own personal qualifications."

Character Is What Counts.
"The character of a man is what counts on a tariff question, or some other matter with which he has nothing to do—should determine his fitness."

"I shall do my utmost to bring about the success of the non-partisan movement in this state, and I believe it will be adopted, as the most rational policy between state, county and city government."

Turk Cruiser Badly Damaged in Battle
Rome, April 8.—(U. P.)—The Turkish cruiser Midilli, formerly the German warship Breslau, has been badly damaged in a naval battle off the Bosporus.

This is presumably the same engagement that Petrograd dispatches referred to yesterday. Constantinople's cables also mention the battle and fight. Both said the enemy fled after an exchange of shots.

White Temple Will Have Supply Pastor
Following the reception Friday of the wire declaration of Rev. William Russell Owen of Hanson Place Baptist church of Brooklyn, N. Y., to the pastorate of White Temple Baptist church of this city, the pulpit committee is taking steps to secure a supply pastor for the White Temple for the coming few months.

Holmes Business College Will Close
Officers of the Holmes Business college have notified their students that because of financial difficulties the institution is to be closed Friday of next week. The school is located at the corner of Third and Commercial streets, and the college has maintained its headquarters in the Flinders building.

Spanish Minister At Paris Meeting
Madrid, April 8.—(U. N. S.)—Dr. Alphonso Costa, Spanish minister of finance, was en route to Paris to attend the allied economics conference today.

Only the bare announcement of Dr. Costa's trip to Paris was made in Madrid. It is not known what significance may be attached to his attendance on the allied conference.

Ansel Clark Made Department Agent
Ansel R. Clark, a Portland attorney, has been appointed joint representative of the Chamber of Commerce and the University of Oregon's school of commerce, as representative of the federal department of commerce.

Austrian Planes Captured.
Rome, April 8.—(U. N. S.)—The following official statement was issued today:

"Seven Austrian aeroplanes attempted to bombard the Cantonnements between the Isonzo and Tagliamento rivers. Our planes were sent down and two of the occupants were prisoners. Our high angle guns were ineffective through fear that Italian machines would be hit."

U. S. Aviation Corps IS TO BE REORGANIZED AS RESULT OF NOUROY

Benefit of Lieutenant Colonel Squier's European Observations to Be Secured.

Washington, April 8.—(U. N. S.)—Secretary of War Baker told the house committee on military affairs today that it intended to reorganize the aviation corps of the army as a result of the recent investigation of that branch of the service's forces.

Under the new plan, the aviation corps will be reorganized into two divisions, one of which will be in control of the military aviation, and the other will be in control of the civil aviation.

Baker intimated that he might reorganize an entirely separate signal corps.

"I mean to put the airmen," he said, "under new rules and regulations."

Secretary Baker intimated that Lieutenant Colonel Squier may head the aviation corps.

Would Take in Civilians.
"In any event," he said, "the corps will be enlarged to get the benefit of Squier's observations in Europe."

He urged that eligibility of army men to become flyers be changed. At present only officers less than 30 years old and unmarried are allowed to fly. Six months' enlistment of expert civilian flyers, said Baker, should be allowed.

Secretary Baker said he did not believe the government could make machine flying a strictly private concern. He also admitted that only two government aeroplanes had been able to fly simultaneously since the expedition entered Mexico. The others, he said, were incapacitated because of minor troubles.

Armor Unnecessary.
"The American aeroplanes," he said, "are big armors. However, there is no necessity for this as the machines are not meant to fight with. They are intended to be used entirely for scouting purposes."

"Ordinary rifle and gun fire is ineffective against a machine 7000 feet high, and high angle guns have little value when an aeroplane is higher than 1400 feet."

"Dirigible craft, with the exception of the Zeppelin, is a failure. Control of that machine is still a German military secret."
