

ANOTHER PHASE OF 'DRY' LAW INVOLVED IN DR. DEAN'S CASE

Act Prohibits Taking of Liquor to Public Places as Proprietor Declares.

EVIDENCE IS ROUNDED UP

District Attorney Proposes to Make Test of Provision of Laws Not Wholly Used.

It is probable that still another feature of the prohibition law will be tried out in the case against Dr. Charles Dean, whose roadside near Lents was raided by deputy sheriffs early Sunday morning and 25 men and women caught.

This will be the provision of the law which prohibits the taking of liquor to public places.

Dr. Dean says his guests brought their liquor to his roadside with them. It is reported that some of the patrons have made similar statements.

Proceeding on that theory, District Attorney Evans is now rounding up evidence against any of the persons who may have taken liquor to the roadside. He says he knows of no better case in which to test the provision of the law on this point than this one.

Dr. Dean is being held on a charge of maintaining a nuisance. His case will come up for hearing Thursday before District Judge Bell.

WIFE ASKS FOR DIVORCE

Mrs. Macauley Declares Husband Threw Glassware at Her.

William J. Macauley, sales agent for the National Cash Register company, is the defendant in a suit for divorce filed today by Mrs. Macauley. She charges her husband with cruelty and abuse. In March, she alleges, he threw glassware at her, breaking it into many pieces.

Macauley is now earning from \$500 to \$600 a month, she alleges, and asks for permanent alimony of \$250 a month, in addition to funds to defray the cost of her suit and attorney fees. She says he also has considerable mining stock and has accumulated credits with the corporation by which he is employed, of \$10,000.

Defendant Wins Suit.

A verdict for the defendant was returned in Judge Kavanaugh's court today in the suit for \$26,000 damages for personal injuries brought by Eldorado S. Davis against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. She sustained a broken ankle when she fell in a Woodstock car and was boarding it at Second and Alder.

Verdict for the Defendant.

Viola Jones failed to convince a jury in Judge Gatens' court this morning that she was entitled to damages from Edwin D. Becker, who she alleged kissed her unwillingly. She asked for \$7500 damages. Becker denied the allegations. The jury was out but a few minutes and returned a verdict for the defendant.

To Be Sentenced Saturday.

F. A. Taylor, convicted of embezzling the funds of F. A. Taylor & Co., asked for more time before sentence is pronounced. He will be sentenced by Judge Morrow Saturday.

Relief for Hermiston Settlers.

Washington, April 11.—Responding to appeals made by Hermiston, Or., people through Congressman Sinnott, Director A. F. Davis of the reclamation service, has authorized the project manager to enter into contracts with settlers on the western extension of the Umatilla project on a rental basis for temporary use of water by landowners and those who have heretofore made entry.

It was feared that crop making for this year would be interfered with by delay in the giving of public notice of the opening of the project, which cannot formally take place for perhaps two months. By this temporary arrangement settlers can go ahead with crop plans for the present year, pending the permanent water charges to be worked out later.

Changes in Bankruptcy Law.

Washington, April 11.—The Oregon Retail Merchants' association, by L. R. Merrick, has addressed a long letter to members of the Oregon delegation in an appeal for amendments of the bankruptcy laws. It is asserted that 95 per cent of those who go through bankruptcy have no assets, and the most of them have debts of less than \$1000.

Washington, April 11.—Judge Olof Anderson of Astoria, Or., one of the prominent opponents of ratification of the Columbia river pact, has telegraphed Senator Chamberlain that after fuller investigation he has changed his views and now indorses the proposed legislation.

Vista House Work To Commence Soon

Promoters of Pioneer Memorial Expect to Get Actually Under Way Within Ten Days From Now.

Vista House association hopes to begin construction of Vista House on Crown Point within 10 days. It has inaugurated a special effort to secure the payment of all pledged contributions. All pledges become due yesterday. An aggregate of \$700 or \$800 remains unpaid.

Vista House is to combine the features of an observatory for the finest view afforded from the Columbia river highway, a memorial to Oregon's pioneers and a public rest station. Its estimated cost is \$20,000, and a campaign to complete the fund will be continued even after construction has commenced.

Safety Commission Visits Film Houses

Fire Chief and Marshal and Others Inspect Various Exchanges of City; New Ordinance Pends.

Members of the public safety commission, attended by Fire Chief Donnell, Fire Marshal Stevens and H. P. Coffin, chairman of the public safety commission, and representatives of the newspapers, inspected film exchanges yesterday afternoon.

An ordinance has been submitted to the city commission requiring storage vaults for films to be placed on the first floor of buildings, to be fireproof and preferably of reinforced concrete construction. The object is to protect employees and film censors from dangers of explosion. Other provisions are included in the proposed ordinance.

Commander Ordered To Give Explanation

Albin L. Clark, commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, has been requested by the county commissioners to appear before the board tomorrow morning and show cause, if any, why the use of the veterans' hall in the courthouse should not be denied to his organization on the ground that it is political.

Clark says the Veterans of Foreign Wars were organized purely for social purposes, and that the organization should have the same right to the use of the hall as any other organization of veterans.

ADAMS SUGGESTS A PLAN FOR MEETING DELINQUENT CLAIMS

Recommendation Made That Owners Pay Bonded Assessment Installments, Too

SLOWNESS IS THE CAUSE

Commissioner Bigelow May Take Up Matter With Council to Determine the Course of Action.

City Treasurer Adams has recommended to C. A. Bigelow, commissioner of finance, that property owners assessed for street and sewer improvements be required to pay the bonded assessment installments as well as the interest. Heretofore the city has been satisfied with property owners paying the interest alone and has allowed them to postpone payment of installments.

This action is necessary because of the slowness of property owners to pay even the interest on bonded installments. City Treasurer Adams says that he has funds available to pay the interest on improvement bonds and redeem bonds falling due until September 1, but after that date the city will be without funds to redeem other bonds falling due unless the property owners pay the installments.

Under the bonding act property owners are allowed to bond the assessment for a 10 year period and pay the installments and interest semi-annually.

The city has been selling property on which the interest of the whole number of installments has been delinquent and it is now proposed to sell all property hereafter unless property owners immediately begin to pay what is due.

Commissioner Bigelow will probably take the matter up with the council to determine to what extent the city shall go.

May Sue Wood Contractors.

Commissioner Bigelow has asked the council to authorize a suit against Jeffery & Burton, contractors, to collect all money due on wood purchased from the city. The contractors purchased \$10,113.21 of the wood cut by the unemployed near Beaverton more than a year ago, and it is now charged that they have paid only \$2100 of the amount due.

Steam Heating Preferred.

Freedlander & Seymour, New York architects for the public auditorium, are to be requested to install a steam heating system in the auditorium instead of a hot water heating system. The city council yesterday definitely decided to have the steam system and authorized Commissioner Baker to so inform the architects.

Messboy Fined for Violating Dry Law

Louis Stengel of Steamer Johann Poulsen Assessed \$200 in the Municipal Court Yesterday.

Louis Stengel, messboy on the steamer Johann Poulsen, was fined \$200 in the municipal court yesterday by Judge Langworth for violation of the prohibition law. Stengel was arrested Saturday night by Harbor Patrol.

The steamer had just docked, and Stengel was starting uptown with a suitcase containing six quarts of Bourbon, with the confessed purpose of selling it to the parched Portland "trade." He was captured in the North Pacific Lumber company yard and readily confessed his intentions.

Harry ("Shanty") Busch, who provided a quart of whiskey for a joy-riding automobile party last Thursday night, was fined \$100 for violating the prohibition law, and James Fitzgerald, his partner, was discharged.

Changes in Customs Law Favored Here

The navigation committee of the Chamber of Commerce has gone on record in indorsement of a bill introduced by Senator Lane and Congressman McArthur to revise the maritime laws to allow vessels bound for Portland to proceed up the river without unnecessary stops at Astoria.

It was pointed out that the stop at Astoria was in violation of a long before made one customs district and since that time departmental rulings have kept the old regulation in force.

Fees and delays caused by this perfunctory stop would be eliminated, the committee decided, and therefore this, as well as other factors interfering with the freedom of the river, should be eliminated.

College Co-Eds Take City Examinations

Thirty-three pretty college co-eds are taking a municipal civil service examination today for playground directors in the public playgrounds. The written examinations were held this morning in the city hall. Only seven men appeared for the examination. Most of the girls are from the University of Oregon, Oregon Agricultural college and Reed college.

Concrete Bridges Contract Awarded

The contract for four concrete bridges on the St. Helens river has been awarded to the Moore Brothers, whose combined bid was \$19,927.31. The next lowest bidder was the Standifer-Clarkson company, whose bid was \$19,281.63.

THREE WEEKS' BRIDE OF JOSEPH HOWARD, ACTOR, SHOOTS SELF

Judgment for \$6833 in Local Breach of Promise Case Stands Against Husband.

Omaha, Neb., April 11.—(U. P.)—While arrangements were made today for the removal of Mrs. Joseph Howard's body to Chicago for burial, the coroner questioned her husband, a vaudeville singer, now on the Orpheum circuit, to see if he could throw any light on the reasons for his wife's suicide.

Three weeks ago Mr. and Mrs. Howard were married in Los Angeles. Mrs. Howard formerly was Countess Merik de Beaufort. Her husband departed on his theatrical travels, planning to meet his bride here. Upon arriving in Omaha, however, it is asserted he registered under an assumed name and the wife had difficulty in locating him. Those who saw their meeting declare Mrs. Howard appeared excited, and it is believed there was some talk of jealousy.

Howard Goes On With Act.

Afterward Mrs. Howard went to another hotel with an actress acquaintance, and at the first opportunity committed suicide by shooting. Her companion said she seemed temporarily insane. News of his bride's death was brought to Howard just before he had to go on the stage and sing ragtime. He was greatly shocked, but went through his act.

Before her marriage to the Count de Beaufort, who is now fighting in the German army, Mrs. Howard was Miss Irma Kilgallon, daughter of a Chicago millionaire. The divorce proceedings by which she was separated from the count attracted widespread attention. Later it was reported she married Batling Nelson, the prizefighter, but this proved untrue. She met Nelson in Europe, and he later said she was the first woman he ever loved. Howard's former wife, Mabel Harrison, died two years ago.

Jealousy Believed Cause.

Mrs. Howard's alleged jealousy of Ethelyn Clark, Howard's partner, is believed to have been the cause of the suicide, although Mrs. Clark and Howard both deny that such a supposition is justified.

When he was located today, Howard admitted having advised his wife Monday to return to the Chicago home of her millionaire father, M. H. Kilgallon, steel magnate. He bought her a ticket, he said, but she decided not to go immediately, telling him she would catch a later train.

Miss Clark said today she was merely a business associate of Howard and had no other interest in him.

Parents Are En Route.

Chicago, April 11.—(U. P. S.)—Michael Kilgallon and wife, parents of Mrs. Joseph Howard, who committed suicide in an Omaha hotel last night, today were en route to Omaha in response to a message that their daughter was very ill. So far as known, they have not been informed of her death.

Joe Howard is a rapid-fire wower, and because of his proclivities he owes Mrs. Edah Witherspoon of 7402 Fifty-sixth street southeast \$5888 for failing to carry out his promise to marry her. She was given a judgment for that amount by the circuit court, as the result of a sensational breach of promise suit brought by the Portland widow.

Howard was appearing at the Orpheum when he met Mrs. Witherspoon, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. G. L. Reiman. He was in town a week and in that time had wooed and won her. Mrs. Witherspoon alleged in her complaint. But he never returned to marry her, and she brought suit for \$50,000 damages.

The suit did not seem to worry the actor, as he never even filed an answer. He admitted that he had asked

Mrs. Witherspoon to marry him, but said he was only joking. The suit went by default, and Mrs. Witherspoon was given judgment for the amount stated.

Planned Double Tragedy, Belief.

Omaha, April 11.—(U. P. S.)—It was learned from authoritative sources today that Howard refused to see his wife until practically forced to do so, and then refused to converse with her for more than a few minutes. During his act Mrs. Howard sat in the wings with a revolver concealed in her muff. It was a new weapon of small caliber, with the price tag still attached. It is believed by the police and friends of Howard that Mrs. Howard planned to shoot the actor in the presence of the audience and then commit suicide.

Although apparently unmoved by his bride's suicide, Howard this afternoon said: "We loved each other devotedly. Her family, however, disliked me. I suppose that explains Irma's suicide. I guess she thought more of her parents than she did of me, although I was financially able to support her. I did not need any aid from her parents."

CONSUMER'S LEAGUE DISCUSSES SANITARY WRAPPING OF BREAD

No Action Is Taken in Regard to the Proposed Ordinance, However.

The Consumer's league took no action on the proposed ordinance requiring all bread sold in the city to be wrapped in paper at the bakeries, at a meeting of the library yesterday evening. Both sides of the question were heard.

Dr. Calvin S. White, former state health officer, declared that every principle of cleanliness and sanitation should dictate the wrapping of bread, not only bread, but cookies, doughnuts and "snails," before leaving the bakery. He spoke of some of the up-to-date bakeries he has visited in Portland, praised their cleanliness and order, and said

that it is too bad the same high standards are not adhered to in making deliveries.

H. H. Haynes, vice president of the Oregon Master Bakers' association, said that the master bakers desire keenly to aid any movement that will make for better bread and cleaner bread.

But the housewives of Portland, he continued, have not supported wrapped bread—they have not bought it.

H. F. Rittman, president of the Oregon Master Bakers' association, substantiated this statement.

Mr. Haynes also asserted that it will cost \$100,000 more a year to the bakeries of Portland to wrap bread, and that under present conditions the cost might go to \$400,000.

Mrs. A. W. Nicholson said that in cities where the wrapping of bread is compulsory, the result has been increased sales.

Mrs. W. E. Ogburn, president, said that the sympathy of the Consumer's league is on the side of wrapping bread. William D. Wheelwright presided.
