Rock Island Shares Off Stock Exchange

Action Follows Announcement That Company Has Been Dissolved—Stock Sold at 25 Cents on Market Yesterday.

New York, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—The Rock Island company shares, whose antics have caused a source of much annoyance in past years to the governors of the stock exchange, were stricken from the list today. This followed announcement that the company, now a shell, has been dissolved in New Jersey.

The company has outstanding \$49,347,450 par of the preferred stock and \$30,888,202 of common. These shares have had a checkered career. The common sold as high as \$81 and the preferred at \$94.75 in 1909. The common and preferred sold at 25 cents each today.

There always are, you know, and by those loose ends, according to the woman employer, we prove we are not proficient, only conceited.

Edwards has been dropped. In a statement issued today, the local chauffeurs' union, by whom the recall petitions have been circulated during the last month, announced that the petitions would not be filed because the cost would be an unnecessary burden on the taxpayers.
