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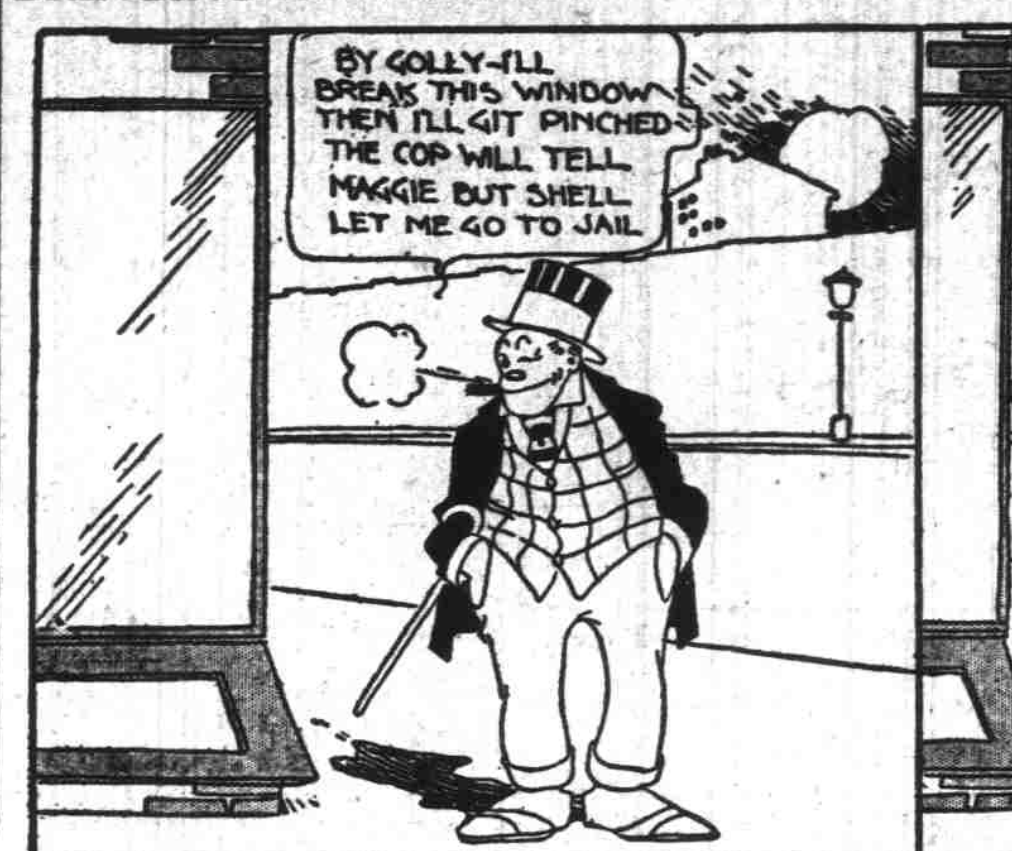
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BRINGING UP FATHER

Washington Has
Plan for Coaches

University of Washington, April 13.—The faculty of the University of Washington is considering a plan whereby the coaches of all athletic teams will be paid by the university rather than by the student body. If this goes through, the coaches will be given positions as instructors in the university and a department of athletics will be established. The coaches will give courses in coaching and training of athletes and all allied subjects. This plan is similar to the one which is being used both at the University of Oregon and Oregon Agricultural college.

The faculty will also decide some time this week the question of compulsory physical training for the students. The plan they have in mind calls for one hour a week in the gym for all men in the freshman and sophomore classes or all those taking military drill, and two hours a week for all the upper class men or those not registered in the department of military training.

Three A. A. U. Meets

Los Angeles, April 13.—(P. N. S.)—Three national A. A. U. swimming championships will be decided in southern California this year, according to Julius Klawns. Word has been received from the east that the women's back stroke, high and fancy diving had been awarded to the southern Pacific branch of the A. A. U. The events will be held either in the Los Angeles Athletic club or the Redondo Beach plunge.

San Diego was awarded the far western outdoor track and field championships with the suggestion that they be held in August. To the San Diego Rowing club was awarded the state swimming championships. Stanford, California, L. A. C. U., S. C. Pomona, Olympic club of San Francisco and other large schools and clubs on the coast will send teams to the far western track meet at San Diego.

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MAYORS TOTING
SORE ARMS FROM
BASEBALL WORKChicago Teams Draw Largest
Crowds on Opening Day
in Majors.

Chicago, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—Mayors of some of our leading cities are experiencing the aches and pains familiar to ball players on the second day in training camp and some 150,000 citizens of the same towns are more or less husky and hoarse tonight. All of which means that baseball is with us once more. The national pastime returned to its own today.

The tremendous throng of 32,000 that crowded every nook and cranny at Comiskey park, Chicago, proved the biggest turnout of the day and the White Sox turnstiles were the only ones that clicked 30,000 times or more. Singularly enough, the Cubs, another Chicago team, helped attract the biggest national league throng. The official figures at Cincinnati were 24,603. The record breaking turnout for Garry Herrmann's province.

The weather man provided some of his best brand of goods in most of the cities and the warm sunlight and balmy spring breezes attacked approximately 48,500 people. Several cold held the admissions at Boston to 5000.

All told, the American league showed an attendance of 75,351 and the national of 75,192. The White Sox crowd numbered 32,000. Then came the Yankee-Senator attendance of 20,000. The Cleveland-Brown game drew 18,551. The 5000 at the Red Sox-Athletic contest proved to be the smallest by far in both leagues.

In the National league next to the Cub-Red crowd of 24,603 at Cincinnati, came the Cardinal-Pirate throng of 15,000 at St. Louis. The Giants and National league champion Phillies attracted a gathering of about the same numerical strength at Philadelphia. The Braves-Dodger game at Brooklyn was the most poorly attended National league exhibition, the athletes playing to about 12,500.

A special match between the teams representing the Portland allies and Oregon allies rolled on the former allies was won by the Oregon allies by 39 pins. Both teams rolled well, the found team taking two games, but the winners' first game was too large.

Krusse of the losers rolled 230 for high score, and Blaney, captain of the winners, had an average of 204. Both teams will go to Seattle.
