

COMPANY HERE WILL HANDLE BOX OUTPUT OF LARGE FACTORY

Effort Will Be to Build Up New Business in Foreign Countries.

J. B. KNAPP IS IN CHARGE

Former Manager of Northwestern Association of Box Manufacturers Enters New Field of Activity.

The Knapp-Cheney company, box shock merchants, has opened offices in the Northwestern Bank building. This firm announces that it is operating and exclusively selling the output of the box department of the Shevelin-Hixon company of Bend, Or.

The Shevelin-Hixon box factory is said to be the largest in the northwest and is the most modern in equipment. It has an annual capacity of 40,000,000 feet of box shocks, all of which will be marketed through the Knapp-Cheney company. J. B. Knapp, formerly in charge of the U. S. forest service and more recently manager of the Northwestern Association of Box Manufacturers, and G. W. Cheney, former manager of the Columbia Box & Lumber company of South Bend, Wash., are the members of the firm.

The Shevelin-Hixon operation at Bend produces California white pine lumber and box shocks, and in addition a sash and door department forms part of the operations. The box shocks produced by this company are intended to serve middle western and cargo trade and the Knapp-Cheney company in its sales department intends to promote an extensive foreign business along with the rail business in the middle west and via the Panama canal to the east coast of the United States.

The company will devote its entire attention to the Bend operation and does not anticipate a brokerage business. Mr. Knapp will be in charge of the Portland office and Mr. Cheney will attend the operation of the box factory at Bend.

LUMBERMEN FILE PROTEST

Rate Discrimination Claimed in Shingle Shipments.

Washington, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—Transcontinental railroads proposed from 65 to 67 cents per hundredweight on red cedar shingles in carload lots from Washington, Oregon and British Columbia to Illinois, Indiana, Missouri and other middle west states was made the basis for a complaint filed with the Interstate Commerce commission today by the West Coast Lumber Manufacturers' association.

The association in its complaint states that competition between Louisiana and the northwest is keen and that the proposed increase will discriminate in favor of the southern state.

MILL TO RESUME ACTIVITIES

James Danaher Jr., of Portland to Manage Camino Plant.

Next Monday the plant of the C. D. Danaher Pine company at Camino, Cal., will resume operations, after a year's close down. The management will rest with R. E. Danaher of Detroit, Mich., and James Danaher Jr., who for the past five years has maintained an office in the Yeon building while making timber investments on the coast. The office here will be closed, but a Portland representative may be named later. The mill cuts sugar and white pine.

MR. BUEHNER AT COOS BAY

Final Details in Large Deal Are Being Arranged.

Definite confirmation of the reported purchase by Philip Buehner and associates of Portland of the Simpson estate timber and lumber mill holdings on Coos Bay, is expected any time now, for Mr. Buehner has gone to North Bend to attend to the final details of the transaction, which involves about \$1,000,000.

Mr. Buehner says that while some changes may be made in the plant, no extensive improvements are planned for the immediate future, and the management is up to the requirements for the present.

Sale of Cedar Bolts Made.

The United States district forester, on bid, has sold to the Baker River Lumber company of Concrete, Wash., 2,890 cords of red cedar shingle bolt timber, located on 170 acres of the Washington national forest, Walkers creek, Baker river drainage. Washington Crew to Go East for Regatta

University of Washington, April 13.—The Washington crew will go east again this year to compete with the best talent that the east can offer. The faculty revoked their ruling of two years ago in a meeting yesterday when they voted favorably for allowing the crew men to go to Poughkeepsie.

After the Stanford race last Friday the students had faint hopes that the crew would be allowed to compete in the east this year, so little was said about the matter, and the faculty acted independently.

It was first planned to send two boats back, one for the junior varsity race and one for the varsity race, but the cost of this would be too great, so as a result only the varsity will make the trip.

The trip east will be financed by the Seattle merchants to a great extent. They are anxious to see the men make the trip because it is a good advertisement for both the university and the northwest.

The men plan to leave Seattle about the first of May. They want to get on the Hudson earlier this year so that the men will have more time to become accustomed to the climatic and rowing conditions in the east.

Armstrong Leads in Golf.

Los Angeles, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—Driving S. Armstrong, southern California golfer, won the qualifying round in the 1916 championship today from a field of 98 entries with a card for the 36 holes of 149. Jack Neville of San Francisco was second with 151 and Harold R. Lamb third with 152. Poor scores were the rule in the morning round, although Lawrence Gowing finished with 75. Armstrong and J. Graham, the latter from the Greenwich, Conn., club, and Robin Hayne of San Francisco had 76s while Neville and Lamb had 77s.

Ex-President Called Antithesis of Wilson and Personification of G. O. P. Issue.

New York, April 13.—(I. N. S.)—The New York Tribune this morning editorially declares in favor of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt for President. It says in part: "Colonel Roosevelt and no 'pusy footing'." "The Tribune likes this candidate and this issue." "It regards Senator Root, its favorite so long as he had a chance of nomination, as now practically eliminated."

"The party thinks that Mr. Root would not be so likely to win as either Colonel Roosevelt or Justice Hughes, and it wants him as secretary of state in the next Republican administration, since it cannot have him as president."

"We are for Colonel Roosevelt because we believe the country needs him. No one else will quicken the pulse of the nation as he will quicken it. No one else will stir the conscience of the people as he will stir it. No one else will inspire patriotism as he will inspire it."

"No one else personifies the issue which the Republican party must make as he personifies it."
