

ALLEGED VICTIM GETS SUSPICIOUS OF GOLD MAKING PROPOSITION

After Making "Investment" of \$150 He Refuses to Go Further, Tells Police.

THREE MEN ARE DETAINED

World for Making Baser Metals Into \$5 Gold Pieces Found—Marked Bills Aid Sleuths.

The ancient myth that gold could be made from baser metals by use of some mysterious chemical was used by three alleged bunko men to get \$250 from Harry Turner, a former bartender, of 4004 East Sixty-second street southeast. Turner reported to the police, and on his information two of them were arrested here late yesterday afternoon by Detective Captain Bate and Detectives Kellner and Tackaberry.

Turner told the detectives that the three men approached him in Seattle and explained that they had found the secret of changing baser metals into gold, but needed money to finance their project. They wanted him to put in \$250, and said they would put in other sums to make the total necessary.

Turner became dubious, but when they gave him a \$5 gold piece which they said had been made by their process, and he found on inquiry at a bank that it was real gold, he agreed to get the rest of the money, having handed over \$150. With two of the men, he came to Portland to get the remaining \$100. The other man was to procure the supplies, and the coins were to be made here, leaders slugs being first cast into the forms of coins, and then transmuted into gold.

After he had obtained the money Turner became suspicious and called on the detectives. He noted the numbers of the bills which he handed over, and after the arrest was made some of these bills were found in the possession of one of the alleged bunko men.

Maid for Seattle. The men arrested gave their names as John Brannin, 35 years old, and Robert E. Wasson, 50 years old. As the transaction is alleged to have occurred in Seattle, the men are held for the Seattle detectives.

A. J. Burns, alleged to be the third member of the gang, was arrested at Seattle last night. On his person were found mounds of \$5 gold piece size. The federal authorities will also make an investigation.

paredness argument, the need of providing means to supply powder and explosive ingredients in proper quantity in case of war. On the other was the agricultural argument, pointing to the need of cheap fertilizer for the impoverished farms of the south and of New England.

When not needed for war manufacture, the plant can be turned to nitrates for the farm, and that was what brought the almost unanimous support of the southern senators, where the cotton planters use great quantities of Chile saltpeter. It was this, far more than the hope of securing location of the site at Muscle Shoals in Alabama.



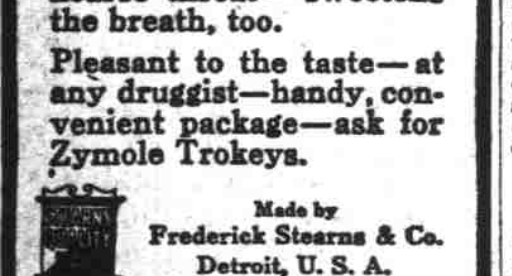

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Shade Trees Need Trimming; Who Will Do the Job?

James O. Conville, Portland's park superintendent, admits he is in a quandary.

The shade trees along the streets and in the parks need trimming worse than ever before," he said.

"The trimming of the trees, in view of the condition in which they were left by the ice storm last winter, is essential to the success of any clean-up campaign or city beautification movement."

"But the trimming of shade trees is a most particular piece of work."

"It requires expert workmen, money to pay them, and time. The city hasn't the funds to pay for trimming shade trees along the streets. It is struggling with the job of trimming the trees in the parks."

"I haven't any suggestion to make. I am puzzled. The trees need to be trimmed. How can it be done and who will do it? I'd like some suggestions."

that enlisted the almost solid vote of the Portland senators.

Hardwick of Georgia was the lone opponent from that section, and he based his view upon adherence to traditional Democratic doctrine against permitting the government to do something that private enterprise might accomplish.

Gallinger of New Hampshire, the Republican floor leader, observed somewhat regretfully that he expected to live long enough to see things done by the government much more socialistic than this.

Sutherland of Utah fought the plan on the statement that the farms of the middle and far west do not need replanting. He said the principal use of the plant will necessarily be the production of fertilizer for the next 100 years the United States probably will be at peace nineteen-twentieths of the time. So the plant, he argued, is class legislation for the farmers of the south and east.

House Expected to Concede. The house, when it passed the Hay military bill, voted down a nitrate plant rider. The question may prove a conflict between the two houses, but it seems very likely that the house will in the end accept some such amendment as that adopted by the senate.

The Smith rider provides for an investigation of power projects suitable for nitrate manufacture, and the designation of five such sites by the secretary of war. Muscle Shoals will thus have to take its chances with Celilo and Priest Rapids on the Columbia and other proposed sites, but it has the start in having been examined and approved by army experts, and in being located in the heart of the section of the country where consumption of nitrate fertilizer is largest.

IDAHO WOULD HAVE NATIONAL PARK IN SAWTOOTH MOUNTAINS

Washington, April 20.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Idaho wants a national park, and the delegation from that state is behind Senator Borah's bill to create one in the Sawtooth mountains, to be known as Sawtooth national park.

"The Sawtooth park is created and suitable roads built," says Representative Addison T. Smith, "it will result in thousands of people who are visiting the other parks visiting Idaho by automobiles and leaving in the state hundreds of thousands of dollars, in addition to the advantages which will accrue to the state from an advertising standpoint."

Before the public lands committee of the house is pending a bill to create a bureau in the interior department to have charge of all national parks and monuments, jurisdiction being now scattered in several places. Mr. Smith has proposed an amendment to permit grazing in the parks under permit from the secretary of the interior, where such use will not be prejudicial to the primary purpose of the park.

To Develop Alaska Lands. Washington, April 20.—Looking to the more rapid development of the public lands of Alaska along the line of the government railway, Secretary Lane has announced the creation of an Alaskan land and industrial department, with headquarters at Seward, which will be in charge of Andrew Christensen, a man experienced in Alaskan public land matters.

The new office, which will be under the Alaskan engineering commission, will have in charge all questions relating to lands tributary to the government's railroad, including the selection and survey of townships and the sale of lots in the sites that may be chosen. The office will also serve as clearing house for information concerning the lands and the development of resources generally.

Benson Bill on Calendar. Washington, April 20.—The McArthur bill, granting 240 acres of forest adjoining Benson park, to the city of Portland for park purposes upon payment of \$1.25 an acre by the city, having been reported to the senate by Senator Chamberlain, a vote is expected on the senate calendar. Senator Chamberlain expects to obtain consideration for it soon after the military bill is out of the way.

McArthur Is Hopeful. Washington, April 20.—Representative McArthur makes the following comment on the president's message: "The president is responsibly engaged in diplomatic negotiations, and seems to have stated his position clearly and concisely. I am hopeful that we will not be drawn into the war, but I regard the situation as very grave."

Brass Cannon for Walla Walla. Washington, April 20.—Senator Poinsett has introduced a bill authorizing the secretary of war to deliver to Henry W. Lawton camp of United Spanish War Veterans of Walla Walla, Wash., two condemned bronze or brass cannon or fieldpieces and a certain number of cannon balls, to be placed in a cemetery plot.

Federal Court at Aberdeen. Washington, April 20.—The senate bill providing for term of the federal court to be held in Aberdeen, Wash., on the first Tuesdays of June and December, which passed the senate on April 12, has been referred to the house committee on judiciary.

Postmistress at Bakooven. Washington, April 20.—Mrs. Eva W. Fleming has been appointed postmistress at Bakooven, Wasco county, Ore., to succeed Claud Wilson, resigned.

NATIONAL DEFENSE POLICY IS INDORSED BY LOCAL CHAMBER

Directors Back Referendum Plan as Offered by U. S. Chamber of Commerce.

TERMS ARE SET FORTH

Suggestion Made That Pacific Fleet Be Not Subordinated to That of the Atlantic Coast.

Directors of the Portland Chamber of Commerce last night voted affirmatively on the referendum on national defense promulgated by the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. With the exception of paragraph 4 of the report of the national chamber's special committee, all 10 paragraphs were indorsed as stated. The fourth paragraph, however, was affirmed with a suggested modification urging that the naval strength of the Pacific fleet be not subordinated to that of the Atlantic.

The directors, therefore, have indorsed the following propositions: Increase in army, navy and industrial strength and coordination to make all fully available.

That a council of national defense be created to assist in developing a policy of defense.

That a staff of industrial mobilization be created.

That a program of naval construction be adopted immediately to restore the United States at least to its former position of second naval power on the Atlantic with adequate protection to the Pacific.

That a general staff for the navy be created.

That the regular army be increased until it, with its reserves, is sufficient to furnish the first line of land defense.

That universal military training be made a fundamental democratic principle of military policy.

That private industry in time of peace be educated to supply materials needed under pre-arranged government regulation of prices, rather than trust to protection in government plants alone.

That this program involve also the storing up of reserve materials in time of peace.

That sufficient officers be added to the regular army for detached duty.

STATE AID RECOMMENDED Assistance Urged in Making An Industrial Survey.

The committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce to make a state industrial survey having particular reference to resources in raw materials has decided that the task cannot be performed properly unless assumed by the state and paid for by an appropriation from the next legislature.

We found it so tremendous an undertaking that we have decided to call upon the legislature for an appropriation sufficient to meet the cost," said George E. Hardy, chairman of the survey committee and executive secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Hardy's committee associates are Hudson B. Hastings of Reed college, A. G. Labbe, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce manufactures and industries bureau; J. A. Bexell of Oregon Agricultural college, and H. B. Miller of the University of Oregon.

FRUIT MARKETING DISCUSSED Governor to Be Asked to Appoint a Committee.

Problems connected with the marketing of Oregon's 1916 fruit crop were discussed by the directors of the Chamber of Commerce last night, the decision reached being that Governor Withycombe be asked to appoint a committee to work out details of the government's plan for coordination of selling agencies.

The expense of the campaign of education which has been proposed probably will be largely absorbed by the state, as representatives of the Oregon Agricultural college have offered the services of two men during the growing season to help orchardists prepare for the market. Another skilled market expert is needed, it appeared, and the chamber expects to cooperate with the state government in his work.

C. C. COLT NOT A CANDIDATE President of Chamber Files Notice With the Board.

President C. C. Colt filed formal notice with the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce last night that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself. This notice was presented because of the heavy pressure brought to bear upon him from many sources to head the chamber's activities again this year.

In his letter of declination, Mr. Colt expressed confidence that the work is going forward with utmost satisfaction and that he will offer his best services from the ranks to make the coming year the most successful in the community history of Portland.

Aid U. S. Could Give Britain Discussed London, April 20.—(I. N. S.)—Already the possibility of the aid United States will be able to render Great Britain by entering the war is being discussed in official quarters here. In naval circles it is stated that the American destroyer flotillas would be of great assistance in British waters. They would help considerably in conveying supplies and British vessels for operations against Turkey. British vessels also would be released from the West Indies.

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Jitney Driver Is Shown Cell He Might Occupy
