

NORTH BANK ROAD IS TO MAKE CHANGES IN ITS OPERATING SYSTEM

New Division to Be Created and Naming of New Officials Will Follow.

PLAN EFFECTIVE MAY 1

Portland Division Will Be in Charge of G. E. Votaw—Other Selections Have Not Been Announced.

Effective May 1, a rearrangement of the operating department of the North Bank road will be made, according to General Manager C. O. Jenks. Mr. Jenks said today that thereafter the line between Vancouver and Spokane and the Oregon Trunk will be operated as one division, while the Oregon Electric, United Railways and the Astoria division of the S. F. & S. will be considered a division.

This will involve the appointment of an additional superintendent, master mechanic, chief train dispatcher and other operating officials for the Vancouver division. Mr. Jenks was not ready today to announce the personnel under the new arrangement, as the change will involve a considerable shifting about of officials.

The new arrangements, in fact, Mr. Jenks stated, a restoration of the system in vogue prior to the retirement of the late P. A. Brainard, who was superintendent of the Vancouver division. It was not known at that time how long Mr. Brainard's leave of absence would extend, and as an economical measure, the Vancouver and Portland divisions were consolidated.

The Portland division will be in charge of G. E. Votaw, who succeeded A. J. Davidson when the latter was placed in charge of the Spokane & Inland Empire for two years; J. Blasing, John H. Haak and Howard Everts Weed for one year.

The directors are to elect the other officers.

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SCHOOL BOARD IS ASKED TO PROVIDE A SOCIAL CENTER

Change in Plans for Proposed Terwilliger Building Is Now Requested.

Residents of the district to be served by the proposed Terwilliger school building for an assembly hall more than class rooms. They want a social center.

They recently petitioned the school board to alter the plans for the structure so as to provide for class rooms and a commodious assembly room, instead of merely eight class rooms.

The board took the matter under advertisement and directed F. A. Nar-

more, school architect, to figure on the request. At yesterday's board meeting he reported it would cost \$24,000 to build eight rooms and a hall. The original appropriation for the Terwilliger school calls for an expenditure of \$18,000.

There were earnest protests from board members.

"I wouldn't mind jumping up a little in concert, but not that much."

"The taxpayers are burdened enough as it is," declared Chairman Muny. "We should stick within the original appropriation. If it is necessary to hold meetings residents of the Terwilliger district could secure the as-

sembly hall in the school building of an adjoining district."

"The primary purpose of a school building is to be a place of instruction, not a community center," said Director Lookwood.

Assistant Superintendent of Schools Rice stated that only six rooms were needed at the present time, and suggested that a partition be left out between the other two, making a small assembly room.

The matter was referred back to the board's building committee, but it is highly probable the Terwilliger school will be built as originally planned.

Bids for grading the site of the

proposed Benson Polytechnic school will be advertised for next week.
