Pacific Chemical Company,
With Capital Stock of
\$300,000, Files at Salem.

FOLLOWS STATE RULING

State Land Board Decided None But
Oregon Men Should Undertake
Work—Deal in Mineral Salts.

Salem, Or., April 22.—The filing of articles of incorporation by the Pacific Chemical Company, capital stock \$300,000, with Corporation Commissioner Schulerman Friday was a new move in the direction of developing summer and Albert lakes, located in Lake county, which are under lease to Jason Moore of New York.

The state land board some time ago decided that the corporation handling the development of the lakes must be controlled by Oregon men and the organization of the Pacific company under the laws of this state is in compliance with the board's ruling.

The incorporators of the company are Chester A. Sheppard, Frank E. Smith and George A. Lovejoy, all of Portland, and the articles recite, among other things, that the company proposes to manufacture, buy, sell and deal in mineral salts.

Other incorporation papers filed today were as follows: Philomath Roundup association, capital stock \$500; R. P. McClelland, S. T. Wyatt and John Daniels, incorporators, capital stock \$500; Sheridan Lumber company, capital stock \$100,000; Frank Bontine, George M. Bracher and J. C. Bracher, Sheridan, String Engraving company, capital stock \$7500; Thomas E. String, Donald String and Edwin W. Morgan, incorporators, Portland.

Supplementary articles of incorporation changing the name of the John G. Barr company of Salem to Hatedin Bros. & Co., and King Bros. & Shear Iron Works of Portland, to King Bros. Iron Works were filed.

Councilman Bound Over.

Salem, Or., April 22.—At a hearing held in justice court at Turned Friday, Lee Jeans, city councilman, was bound over to the grand jury under \$1000 bond for cutting Robert Hunter with a knife during a free-for-all fight early this month. Justice Earl wanted to make the bond \$2000 but District Attorney Ringo thought \$1000 sufficient. The defense put in no testimony.

Candidates Pay \$6350.

Salem, Or., April 22.—The receipts for filing declarations of candidacy and for space in the pamphlet for the May primary election totaled \$6350, according to Secretary of State Olcott. Receipts for filing declarations were as follows: Republican, \$3335; Democrat, \$630; Progressive, \$150; total, \$4115. Candidates took space in the pamphlet aggregating a cost to them of \$2235.

The victims of the fatal accidents were George N. Pugh of Roseburg, who was killed by a train, and Mike Hally of Portland and Adam Van Prooven of Creswell, who received injuries while logging.

Of the total accidents reported, 163 were subject to the workmen's compensation act, 41 were from public utility corporations, 26 were from public utility corporations, 26 were from other firms or corporations which have rejected the provisions of the act and one was from a firm which does not employ labor in a hazardous occupation.

Salem, Or., April 22.—Eleven days after Ray Weist was killed while employed in logging operations by the Portland Railway, Railroad and Navigation company, his widow was awarded a pension of \$30 per month by the state industrial accident commission, \$7053.30 being set aside as a reserve.

1,400,000 SALMON AND TROUT WILL BE FREED FROM STATE HATCHERY

Will Be Placed in Streams Adjacent to Plant, Is Announcement by Warden.

Eugene, Or., April 22.—Four hundred thousand eastern brook trout and 1,000,000 fingerling salmon hatched at the state hatchery on the upper McKenzie river, will be distributed in the adjacent streams this summer, according to State Game Warden Carl Shoemaker, who visited the hatchery in company with 50 Eugene men.

The warden also announced improvements at the hatchery for this year in the way of establishing an electric light plant and the building of a pipe line from the McKenzie river, 200 yards above, for the purpose of supplying sufficient water in summer, as the creek that flows down the mountain through the premises becomes too low during the hot period of each year. Shoemaker said that a number of steel head trout will be liberated in the McKenzie this year, the eggs to be taken at Tillamook and hatched at the local plant.

The warden was enthusiastic over the McKenzie plant and said it is better situated than the large one at Bonneville, as there is no danger from high water.

Plan Campaign for \$320,000 Road Fund

Advocates of Issue Make Effort to Insure Favorable Vote at Primaries—State Engineer Expected.

Marshallfield, Or., April 22.—The advocates of the \$320,000 road bond issue are planning a three week campaign preceding the primary May 26, to stir up interest and bring about a favorable vote. It is expected that State Highway Engineer Lewis, John Yeon and Frank B. Riley will be here to discuss the plan with the county in favor of the bond issue.

Plan Memorial Celebration.

Marshallfield, Or., April 22.—The members of the local post of the G. A. R., Sons of Veterans and the Spanish American War veterans have all joined in arranging for a big Memorial day celebration on Coos Bay. A prominent speaker will be secured and the celebration will probably be the most elaborate that has ever been undertaken here.

Believes Villa Was Incited by Germany

Mexican, Professor of Spanish at Equiam, Receives Letter from Brother, Stating Such Is Belief in Republic.

Hogquam, Wash., April 22.—J. Jose Ogilgar, of this city, Mexico, a prominent family, who for a long time has been a teacher of Spanish here, in commenting on the presence of United States troops in Mexico, said that there was no question in the minds of his countrymen that indirectly Germany precipitated the trouble.

Ogilgar, who is a nephew of General Camillo Ogilgar, Mexican minister of foreign relations, received just the receipt of a letter from a brother who is an officer in the Carranza army, and that this letter conveyed the belief that Germany incited the Villa raid for the purpose of inspiring the United States sufficiently to prevent interference by this nation with the submarine warfare of Germany.

Class of 1919 Is Ordered to Inscribe Names on Landsturm Register—Notices Have Been Posted.

RAIL CONNECTIONS A STIMULUS TO COOS BAY COMMUNITIES

Terminal Rates Would Make Section Trade Contender, Says Hugh McLain.

MILLS REFUSING ORDERS

New People Arriving in District Daily It Is Said—Big Welcome Promised in Railroad Celebration.

All the communities fringing Coos Bay are on their "toes." They already feel the stimulus of rail connection with the outside world, and when the first through train pulls into Marshallfield from Eugene over the continuous rail without any ferrying across the Umpqua, great will be the rejoicing.

So says Hugh McLain, president of the Marshallfield Chamber of Commerce who is here as a witness in the celebrated suit brought by R. A. Graham against the Spreckels interests. McLain decided yesterday that, with a terminal freight lumber, Coos county's products will become formidable contenders in the nation's markets.

Mills Run Full Tilt.

Along with Mr. McLain are Fred R. McJannet, J. J. Sees, Robert H. Marsden, Dr. E. M. Mingo and Herbert Lockhart. Though they have been fairly close kept at court, they are wasting no opportunity to boost for Coos Bay.

"Give us the interest and money spent to improve the mouth of the Columbia river and we will have a harbor that the world cannot beat," declared McLain.

"Our lumber mills are turning away orders right now," asserted the Marshallfield Chamber of Commerce chief. "We are too busy cutting Port Orford cedar to monkey much with the big spruce order that is floating around all over the coast hunting takers. When the railroad gets to hauling freight, we will be in a position, however, to handle finished lumber. We do little manufacturing now, you know, sending our lumber rough green in ships to California. Now we can put in kilns and finish off the lumber and sell it direct by rail.

Newcomers Arriving.

"We are getting new people in our country every day. Tourists already are coming and we expect an enormous trade at the kind this summer." North Bend and Marshallfield are making great plans for the railroad celebration when the big bridge across the Umpqua is ready to carry traffic. Now, only passenger trains are handled and they only between Eugene and Gardner, where passengers are put aboard what they have picked up by a stub train on the other side.

"We will have three days of it in July when the bridge is ready," said McLain. "Tuesday and Wednesday, with side trips to all the other parts of the bay country."

Big Time Promised.

"We are going to show the visitors a royal good time and not stick them off in a corner the way Portland did us at the opening game of the baseball season. We want to educate them in our resources and in our hospitality as well."

Definite plans for the celebration are being made. It is known just when the big bridge will be ready. Semi-official assurances were given the Coos Bay delegation Thursday that it would be ready about the middle of July and may be a little earlier. To make sure, however, it is the plan now to have the celebration the first of August, and the local Pythians of Marshallfield are planning to attend. Consequently, they want the railroad celebration over in time.

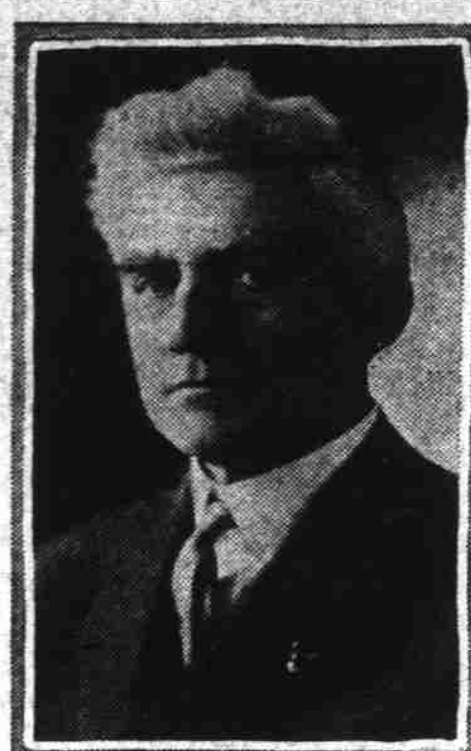
Fast Freight in Wreck.

New Gunner Record Made by U. S. Fleet for Long Distances

Atlantic Fleet Takes Lesson From Battle Between Tiger and Bluecher.

New York, April 22.—(I. N. S.)—Uncle Sam's gunners have set a new record in American naval marksmanship, according to information today at the New York navy yard. The Atlantic fleet, which recently engaged in battle maneuvers at Guantanamo, bettered former marks for distance in long range target practice, with 12 and 14 inch guns by more than 50 per cent, and incidentally surprised the world by the accuracy they showed at the long distance.

Former long range target practice usually has been limited to 12,000 yards, with most of it being at 8000 yards with reduced loads. At the recent maneuvers the targets were put from 15,000 to 19,000 yards away.

The incentive for the longer ranges came from reports of various battles of the present war, particularly of about a year ago when German warships in a dash from Kiel into the North sea, were attacked by the British fleet. The Tiger and Lion were crippled and the Bluecher was sunk.

Rush Work on Warships.

Vallejo, Cal., April 22.—(I. N. S.)—Work on war vessels in drydock at Mare Island navy yard was rushed today so provision might be made to receive the cruiser San Diego when it arrives Tuesday. Cancellations for the year have been 187.

Italians Repulse Austrian Attacks

Official Report Announces Small Infantry Engagements in the Upper Astico—30 Are Made Prisoners.

Rome, April 22.—(I. N. S.)—Official: "Along the whole front there was intermittent artillery activity and frequent sniping. The Austrians made small infantry engagements in the upper Astico, in the Sugana valley and in the upper Cordevele we took 30 prisoners.

"In the Monte Nero zone on the night of the twentieth we repulsed an Austrian detachment which attempted to bombard our lines at Ortill and Sleme. Yesterday afternoon several of our Caproni aeroplanes bombarded a hydro-aeroplan station near Trieste, dropping 60 bombs. Serious results were observed. All the machines were turned safely to the base despite violent anti-aircraft fire."

Jitneys Force Car Line to Seek Buyer

Stockton Street Railway Company Asks City to Purchase Line Which It Can No Longer Operate.

Stockton, Cal., April 22.—(U. P.)—Does the city of Stockton desire to purchase the jitney line owned by the Stockton Electric Street Railroad company or will the city entertain a proposal to purchase it? That is the question with which General Manager F. W. Webster of the Southern Pacific company's electric lines in Stockton and Fresno staggered members of the city council this morning.

Webster said that with the jitneys increasing, their operations unregulated, with the tightening of money markets making it impossible for him to secure money for extensions and improvements and with the high taxes which a municipally owned car line would not have to bear, he could no longer run the line and earn a reasonable return on the investment.

PRESIDENT COLT HAS AMBITIOUS PLAN FOR COMMERCE CHAMBER

Addresses Members at Chamber's Annual Meeting and Outlines His Program.

SHIPPING INDUSTRY URGED

Membership Report Shows an Increase of 710 Since April 1 of Last Year; Total Now 4211.

Development of water transportation, a factories building as an incubator for small industries similar to that which has proved such a success in Toledo, Ohio, the founding of an industrial development company to provide capital for new industries and to assist some of those already here, vigorous handling of Oregon development problems such as drainage and irrigation, rural credits and agricultural extension—these, briefly stated, constitute the work to which C. C. Colt, president of the Chamber of Commerce, believes that organization should devote itself primarily during the coming year.

Shipbuilding Industry Important.

Mr. Colt also laid great stress on the possibility of developing the shipbuilding industry to great proportions from the groundwork afforded by the letting of contracts to construct three ships here and the certainty that a fourth contract is to be secured soon. These recommendations were made at the annual meeting of the chamber membership in the Oregon building Friday 500 of the members of the chamber, now in charge of United States officers for complicity in bomb plots, denies the charge against him.

Mr. Colt explained that his administration of the Chamber of Commerce has inherited approximately \$66,000, hence the fallure of revenue to meet expenditures. He said that such measures of reimbursement have been taken as bringing expenses within revenue and that the last four months had shown a surplus of \$6600.

The plan of operation laid out had been found too elaborate, he stated. The building had shown a loss of \$17,784 after \$24,000 had been charged against the chamber as rent.

Mr. Colt advised members by asking them to "get in and help do part of the work," declaring that "dues without cooperation do not fully discharge the duties and obligations of membership."

Must Believe in Ourselves.

He emphasized that "we must believe in ourselves before others will believe in us," and declared that what the organization needs most is more vision and action willing to subordinate selfish interests to the welfare of the community.

He suggested quarterly instead of yearly meetings of the membership, and monthly meetings of the bureau as a means of keeping in closer touch with the community. He also declared that in Portland there is too much of the disposition to sit with folded hands while others are hustling and that the Chamber of Commerce is in and working. He finished with a couplet, the last line of which ran: "Where everybody works and nobody slacks, you can raise a town from the dead."

Election Called for Irrigation District

Voters Will Pass Upon Proposition to Include 15,000 Acres in South End of Rogue River Valley.

Ashland, Or., April 22.—An election will be held May 13 for the purpose of organizing the Ashland-Talent irrigation district, which will embrace approximately 15,000 acres in the south end of Rogue river valley.

Three trustees and a treasurer for the district will be elected. Exceptions from the proposed district have all been filed. Last year a complete survey of the water sources of the valley was made under the supervision of Engineer Whistler of the state department.

A proposition has been submitted to the landowners by a company to build a huge reservoir on Beaver creek, 24 miles from Ashland, bringing the water by canals and creek beds by a circuitous route over what is known as Greenspring gap, where a tunnel will be necessary.

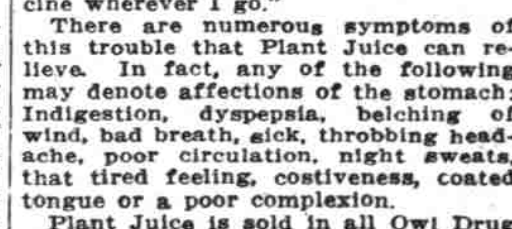
