

MUNICIPAL BATHING BEACH TO BE READY WITHIN TWO MONTHS

Riverfront. Opposite to Ross Island on West Side Will Be Location.

WILL HAVE INSTRUCTORS

Lockers Will Be Provided But Bathers Will Have to Furnish Their Own Suits.

Within two months Portland's first municipal bathing beach will be in full operation, according to announcement made today by James O. Conville, superintendent of parks.

Construction of locker rooms and shelter building is to begin at once and will be ready for use by the opening of the river swimming season. The beach, to be used by the city is near the Portland Ship building yards in South Portland just opposite Ross Island. The O. W. R. & N. company has given the city the use of the beach. Commissioner Baker and Superintendent Conville visited the beach this morning and agreed as to the location of the locker rooms. According to Conville about 1000 of them will be provided.

The city will provide a man and woman swimming instructor at the beach, but the swimmers will have to provide their own bathing suits. Log boats will be placed in the river to prevent inexperienced swimmers getting too far out into the water.

FOR COLLECTION OF GARBAGE

Need of City System Advised by Commissioner Daily.

The people of Portland themselves are responsible for uncleanly conditions throughout the city and they will continue to be responsible until a municipal garbage collection system is established. Such was the statement of Commissioner Daily following request made by J. E. Werlein that the city require property owners near Hawthorne avenue and East Ninth street to clean up their property. Werlein is in charge of the district for the clean-up committee.

The city commissioners assured Werlein that they would cooperate in every way in the clean-up campaign and that they welcomed all suggestions.

Street Repair Contract Let.

The contract for repairing asphalt streets for the ensuing year was awarded to Oskar Huber by the city council today. The repairs are to be made whenever the city orders. The prices for repairing vary, according to the type of repairs.

City Makes Offer.

The city will spend \$50,000 in completing and improving Hillside boulevard provided the property owners will pay the full amount of assessment imposed upon them for the construction. Such is the decision of the city council and City Attorney La Roche has been instructed to negotiate with the property owners with a view of securing an agreement and have them drop the fight against the assessment.

POSSIBILITY OF NEW BUILDINGS LOOKS DUBIOUS

Pennsylvania and West Virginia. It has given some hearings, but thus far has made no decisions.

The Oregon bills are for Hood River and Klamath Falls, by Sinnott, and for Oregon City, Grants Pass, Corvallis and Ashland by Hawley. All of

the bills, as originally proposed, called for appropriations of \$100,000. The estimates of the treasury department as to cost of the sort of building proposed in each case and the amount needed for purchase of site do not in any case exceed \$70,000.

The estimates for building and site combined for Klamath Falls and Ashland are \$60,000; for Hood River and Grants Pass, \$65,000, and for Oregon City and Corvallis, \$70,000. Estimates for the site stand at \$10,000 in each city except Oregon City and Ashland, in which cases the cost of ground needed is placed at \$15,000.

Two May Be Weeded Out. It is thought probable that two, possibly more, of the proposed Oregon buildings will be weeded out by the committee. This brings cities in the same general territory in a measure in competition. Comparative merits of Corvallis and Oregon City, on the one hand, and of Grants Pass and Ashland, on the other, are likely to be considered, on the theory that it will not be possible to include all the buildings that are asked for.

Across the Columbia river, in the state of Washington, Congressman Johnson is father of five building bills. He asked for \$150,000 for Hoquiam, Centralia, Puyallup and Chehalis, and \$500,000 for Tacoma. The Hoquiam bill is the only one which contains the guaranty legend by the department, which states that \$45,000 for building and \$15,000 for a site will meet the needs of the government.

Other Washington Bills. Representative Hadley of Washington has introduced \$50,000 bills for Snohomish, Anacortes and Blaine, and another for \$75,000 for Mount Vernon. Representative Humphrey has a bill for a \$100,000 building at Bremerton, for \$50,000 for an immigration station at Seattle, and for an increase of \$95,000 in the limit of cost for the Seattle postoffice, for which \$50,000 had previously been authorized.

The other Washington representatives, La Follette and Dyer, have not introduced any public building bills.

Time Limit on Pure Food Labels.

Washington, April 27.—Labels printed for use on food and drug products prior May 5, 1914, containing the guaranty legend and serial number, may be used until May 1, 1918. This is the result of a hearing by the department of agriculture as to the number of such labels in the hands of dealers and manufacturers, many of whom have large stocks of these labels on hand, costing thousands of dollars. An amendment to the food and drugs act on May 5, 1914, the future use of these labels was prohibited, but officials announced that there will be no prosecution for such use within the time limit now fixed, where such labels were printed in good faith under previous regulations.

For Use of Indian Mission.

Washington, April 27.—A petition from the Melakakha Christian mission to have a few acres set aside for its use on Annette Island, Alaska, was recently received by Senator Chamberlain from Thomas N. Strong, an attorney of Portland, Or. who has taken an interest in the Indians on the island. Upon taking up the matter with the interior department, the senator is informed that the situation can be dealt with by issuing a permit, and the matter has accordingly been referred to the commissioner of education for an opinion as to the advisability of complying with the request.

Why Marshfield Was Denied.

Washington, April 27.—Explaining why it is necessary to refuse the request of the Chamber of Commerce of Marshfield, Or., for a gunboat to be assigned to the use of the naval militia there, Secretary Daniels of the navy department has written to Senator Chamberlain. The militia there must first be incorporated as a part of the naval militia organization, says the secretary, and after that is done the department has always required that a "certain" time shall elapse before a vessel is assigned to use of such an organization.

Postmistress at Whitney.

Washington, April 27.—Miss Grace Parrott has been named postmistress at Whitney, Baker county, Or., in place of R. L. Jellison, resigned. Charles J. Rose has been appointed postmaster at Huber, Washington county, a new office.

MRS. HARVEY O'BRYAN IS GRANTED DIVORCE; ALIMONY ALSO FIXED

Wife of Insurance Man Wins Decree and \$150 Permanent Alimony.

CASE GOES BY DEFAULT

Mother to Have Custody of Children, It Is Understood; Husband Made No Attempt to Contest.

It took only about 10 minutes for Mrs. Anna Grizelda O'Bryan to obtain a decree of divorce from Harvey O'Bryan, prominent insurance man, this morning. The decree was granted by Judge Gantenbein.

According to an agreement which had been reached between Mr. and Mrs. O'Bryan, she was granted \$150 a month permanent alimony, which is to be in lieu of all her rights in the O'Bryan property. It was understood, but not mentioned in the decree, that she is to have the two children, both boys, one 18 and the other 15.

The O'Bryans were married December 19, 1895. She obtained the divorce on the grounds of cruelty, consisting principally of nagging and quarreling. She was not required to go into detail. The testimony was taken before a court reporter while Judge Gantenbein was in session. In this case, as the divorce suit was to have come before Judge McGinn, who was not in court today, Mrs. O'Bryan was represented by Attorney L. E. Werlein, who was particularly cautioned as the case was being finished to see that the decree was just right.

Mr. O'Bryan did not file an answer to the complaint, permitting the case to go by default. Deputy District Attorney Dempsey appeared for the state and conducted the interrogation of Mrs. O'Bryan.

Mrs. Closset Demurs.

That the position taken by Mrs. Emilie Closset in connection with the estate of Joseph Closset is inconsistent with the exercise of any trust that may be reposed in her as administratrix of the estate is denied in a demurrer to the complaint filed some time ago to oust Mrs. Closset from her position as administratrix. The complaint was filed by Alfred Adolph Closset and Eugene Schmidt, children of Mrs. Closset.

Insurance Companies Sued.

Suits against 12 more insurance companies were filed today by Lipman, Wolfe & Co., to recover sums of money refunded to the companies under alleged threats to publish certain alleged false derogatory statements concerning members of Lipman, Wolfe & Co. In all, suits have been filed against approximately 40 insurance companies.

Accused of Nonsupport.

Roy A. Ryckman, held on a charge of non-support, was returned today from The Dalles, where he was arrested yesterday. Herbert Lessly, also charged with non-support, was arrested today in Seattle. An officer will be sent after him.

Bound Over to Grand Jury.

Peter and Josephine Bosselli, who were arrested at 83 1/2 First street for liquor selling, had a hearing this morning before United States Commissioner Drake and were held to the grand jury, the charge being that of selling without a federal license. They were fined \$200 recently in municipal court for the same offense.

New Divorce Suits Filed.

Suits for divorce were filed as follows: Bertha E. Kerr vs. Jack Kerr, married in California in 1904, desertion; D. F. Lucy vs. A. E. Lucy, married in Tillamook county in 1899, two children, desertion; Margaret White vs. Glenn White, married at Vancouver in 1914, desertion; Laura Meier vs. Augustus J. Meier, married in Portland in 1905, three children, cruelty.

Sues on \$50,000 Notes.

Suit to collect a \$50,000 note was filed yesterday afternoon by S. Morton Cohn Real Estate Investment company against John Matthiesen and wife and J. H. Peterson. The note was given to William Frazier, now deceased, on December 1, 1911, and was payable in two years from date.

Murder Case Nears End.

The case against Louie Wing, charged with the murder of Leong Yin Luck, will go to the jury in Judge Morrow's court this afternoon. Attorney Collier will close the argument for the prosecution.

Suffrage Boosters Coming.

When the special car party of suffrage boosters arrives at the Union station Sunday morning it will be met by a committee of Portland men and women and escorted on a tour over the Columbia river highway. Luncheon will be had at Crown Point chalet.

Thirty Cents Is Sum As Theft Reward

Thirty cents from a junk dealer for old lead. That was the sum received by the boys who broke into the Taylor street Methodist church and wrecked the pipe organ for the sake of the lead pipes. The damage they did will run from \$500 to \$1000.

The boys—three of them—were taken before Judge Cleaton of the juvenile court yesterday afternoon and their cases were continued until Saturday morning for final disposition. Two of the boys, Douglas Messinger and Joe Meyer, are 15 years old, and the third, Frank Lavodie, is only 12. The mothers of the two older boys and the father of the younger were in court.

"The trouble is that you parents have not looked after your boys," said Judge Cleaton. "Yet you are responsible for their acts." Deputy District Attorney Robison, who has charge of juvenile cases, said he was going to hale Lavodie before the grand jury for investigation for his parental neglect.

Bigelow had the proof of the story at the city hall this morning. It was a fish 40 inches long and weighing 20 pounds. Bigelow says he caught two others even longer but lost them when trying to get them into the boat. The commissioner was accompanied by C. C. Hall and Max Meyers. Meyers caught two salmon.

CLEAN-UP CAMPAIGN IS COMMENCED WITH GREAT VIM, ENERGY

Citizens Inspect Districts to Start Forces to Work Tidying Up Portland.

Portland "kicked off" in its big clean-up and paint-up campaign this morning when an automobile load of citizens made the rounds of the different outlying districts to start the force to work on making Portland tidy. St. Johns was the first place visited. Mayor Albee and O. M. Plummer raised a flag as a signal. Then the committee viewed the heaps of refuse that must be carted away and gave instructions to the district committeemen on how to start.

Then they went on to other districts, where similar instructions were given. As much cleaning as possible is to be done before May 1, when the formal organized campaign opens. "Everyone is taking hold of this work in earnest," exclaimed Jacob Kanzler, secretary of the civic bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, this afternoon. "It will be the most thorough cleaning Portland has ever had."

Astoria, Or., April 27.—The annual convention of the Oregon Retail Merchants' association will close this evening when the delegates will be entertained by the local lodge of Elks at a dancing party. The session has been a successful one in every respect. Over 100 delegates are in attendance including merchants from all parts of the state.

Last evening the session was devoted to a discussion on the extension of credit, led by Clifford Barlow of Warrenton. J. G. Snodgrass of La Grande led a discussion on the topic "Shall the Retail Merchant Adopt a Two Price System, Making a Lower Price for Cash Than for Credit?"

The speakers on the program today are E. J. Jaeger, Portland; Rev. Mr. Waters, Astoria; C. W. Mullins, Astoria; George Brown, attorney general, Salem.

The report of the committee on resolutions will be received and a large series of miscellaneous business transacted. The election of officers and the selecting of the place for the next convention will be decided today.

Senator Lane has been informed that investigation will be made by an inspector as to the advisability of establishing a new office to be called Wemme, in Clackamas county, requested by C. W. Kern of Welches.

Alleged Officer Jailed.

Seattle, Wash., April 27.—(P. N. S.)—Charged with extortion of \$30 by representing to C. M. Gray, a druggist, that he was a deputy sheriff and would arrest Gray for alleged violation of the dry law, Joseph M. Scallen, a special agent of the Puget Sound Electric company, is under arrest here today. Scallen claims that he borrowed the money from Gray.

Fined for Giving Away "Booze" Ad

Ashland, Or., April 27.—A legal question which has been discussed throughout Oregon will be decided in the circuit court of this district following an appeal from Ransome Rouse of Ashland, who was fined \$200 in the Ashland city court yesterday for giving a liquor label to a friend. Rouse was tried upon a bootlegging charge, and the jury disagreed.

Prosecuting Attorney Kelley then filed a complaint charging Rouse with the giving away of the circular and order blank from a California liquor house. He produced one witness who swore Rouse had given him the circular. The defense waived examination and later appealed the case. This is the first time this phase of the prohibition law has been brought into court.

A minimum fine of \$100 and maximum fine of \$500 is attached to the offense, and the same section of the law applies to liquor advertisements in newspapers, magazines and all billboards.
