Pioneer Rooming House Is Raided by Chief of Police and the City Attorney.

GREEK MAKES AFFIDAVIT

William Wood, Former Postoffice Inspector at Roseburg, Mentioned as Purchaser by Informant.

Marshfield, Or., April 28.—At 4 o'clock Thursday morning, Chief of Police Carter and City Attorney Brand made a raid on the Pioneer rooming house, securing incriminating evidence of bootlegging.

A. Lottis, a Greek, swore to an affidavit that he bought 25 bottles of beer and one of whiskey in the place.

The grand jury is to consider the evidence.

Jury Investigates Diamond's Loss.

Marshfield, Or., April 28.—The grand jury came to Marshfield from Coquille Thursday morning and is investigating what is known as the Peck-Perian case, involving the loss of a \$500 diamond at a party two years ago. The trouble has smoldered along until both sides now are determined to get to the bottom of facts, which may provide startling disclosures. Many society people of the city are interested.

Treated Own Horses; Indicted.

Marshfield, Or., April 28.—U. S. Prine, an old man of Myrtle Point, has been indicted for practicing as a veterinarian without a license. Complaint was made by Dr. Masson, veterinary of Myrtle Point. It is claimed the old man filed his horse's teeth and performed minor operations. The district attorney says he will recommend suspension of sentence.

PARADISE PROJECT BIDS ARE AWARDED; INJUNCTION IS LATE

and the papers were signed before the deputy sheriff, with the temporary restraining order, reached the Paradise office.

Will Start Work.

Frank Sloan, secretary of the Paradise district, said Thursday that construction of the project's ditches, reservoir, etc., will be started as soon as possible.

The development of this project will mean much to Umatilla county and Oregon. The project contains 47,000 acres of land lying east of Stanfield. The center of the project being about six miles due east of this city. Only one other project in the northwest, the Sunnyside project in Washington, is larger.

The land on the project is first class. Half of it is at present bearing wheat land. It is valued at an average of \$25 per acre. It will cost \$80 per acre to complete the project, making a total investment to the owners of \$85 per acre. Irrigated lands are selling at \$150 per acre on the Umatilla project at present.

The Paradise project was organized three years ago. It was surveyed, and plans and specifications of all the work were made by A. Wold, expert irrigation engineer, of Seattle. These surveys and plans have been checked by other engineers.

Water From Umatilla.

Water will be taken from the Umatilla river, near Thorne Hollow, above Pendleton, and carried to the project through 32 miles of main canals and many more miles of laterals. There are two reservoir sites, one on the Umatilla river, three miles above Gibbons, with a capacity of 7000 acre feet, and another in Stage Gulch, above Stanfield, with a capacity of 30,000 acre feet. The main feed canal runs from Thorne Hollow along the north side of the Umatilla river, past Cay-couse, crosses the Wild Horse at Hanford, and runs into Stage Gulch, a distance of 32 miles. It will have a capacity of 880 cubic feet per second. The Echo branch canal is 26 miles long, and will run along the divide between Stage Gulch and the Umatilla river. The DeSpain branch is 18 miles long, and the Cold Springs branch 16 miles long.

The average elevation of the Paradise project is 800 feet, and it runs from 600 to 1000 feet. It has been pronounced the richest irrigation project in the northwest.

Paradise project and various other private and government ditches. All of the land to be irrigated lies adjacent to the town of Echo, and east of Butter creek.

O. D. Teel originated this project in 1908, and has been president of the board of directors since its organization. His investigations in 1908 convinced him that the lands comprising the districts could be irrigated, and he secured the cooperation of J. T. Hinkle in outlining a plan of action. The Teel Ditch company, a corporation, was formed under the laws of Oregon, and in 1910 some 27 landowners purchased stock in the project.

Lewis Considers Project.

It was the intention at that time to build the project with company funds. After the passing of the district irrigation law in 1911, it was deemed advisable to form the project into an irrigation district and issue bonds to raise money for construction.

work. This was done September 7, 1912.

After a thorough investigation of the engineering features of the project was made by the district, the entire proposition was presented to John H. Lewis, Oregon state engineer. He approved the same in its entirety. The directors then brought suit in the circuit court to test the legality of all proceedings, and Judge G. W. Phelps approved the same, February 26, 1914.

After the formation of the Teel district all of the water appropriations originally acquired by O. D. Teel and later transferred to the Teel Ditch company were assigned to the district. A bond election for \$1,200,000 was held June 14, 1915, at which there was not a vote cast against the proposition.

Water for the project is appropriated from Camas creek, in southern Umatilla county, diverted through a tunnel into Butter creek, and thence down the natural channel of Butter creek to the point of diversion onto the lands.

Bonds Cover Costs.

Bonds of the district were issued for the total cost of construction of the diversion work. They bear 6 percent interest. For the first 10 years, assessments are levied same as county taxes for the interest on the bonds. During the second 10 year period a graduated increase of the tax levy is made, until at the end of the twentieth year the sinking fund thus created cancels the bonds.

The men who started this project have staid with the district and devoted their time and attention to the work until the present day. O. D. Teel, originator of the project, is still president of the board of directors. J. T. Hinkle, who attended to the early legal work, is attorney for the district. W. B. Hinkle did the engineering work for the original Teel Ditch company, and is now chief engineer of the district. J. Frank Spinning became associated with the project when the first stock company was formed, and has served as secretary since the formation of the district. A. B. Thomson, former president of the Irrigation congress, has been a director since the organization, and has been active in promoting its interests.

Okanogan Opening in June.

Wenatchee, Wash., April 28.—The West Okanogan irrigation project in Okanogan county will be officially opened and dedicated with a mammoth two day celebration, June 7 and 8, at Oroville and Tonasket. The commercial clubs of the two towns are planning to make the reclaiming of 10,000 acres of arid land to agriculture a red letter mark in the county's history.

Mayor Who Tore Up Check Faces Recall

Chief Executive of San Diego "in Bad" with Cooks and Waiters Because He Destroyed Money.

San Diego, Cal., April 28.—Discontent originating, it is claimed, in the tearing up of a check for \$3000 signed by E. W. Scripps, publisher of the Scripps papers, bubbled over this week in the adoption of resolutions by the Cooks' and Waiters' union urging the recall of Mayor E. M. Capps.

Mayor Capps, who tore up the check, says the cooks and waiters cannot recall anyone, much less him, and defies them to do their worst.

At the time of the tearing of the check Mayor Capps declared it had been sent to him to be spent by him alone in relieving the suffering of flood victims during January. He was asked to turn it over to the relief committee to be turned into a permanent fund to be used in rebuilding and reestablishing farm houses and farms. He refused to do this, and when the argument became heated, tore it up to end the discussion.

He said he had not spent it because he had had no opportunity to do so and further declared that his action was indorsed by the donor of the check.

Bugs Get Theirs.

Hood River, Or., April 28.—Bugs and pests in the Hood River orchards have been treated to a most liberal effusion of spray materials this year as shown by the records of the Apple Growers' association that supplies the sprays to its members for cost. The records show that 1200 barrels of lime and sulphur and 280 barrels of miscible oil have been sold to date which is 500 barrels more of the former than was used last season, while no miscible oil was used last year. It is estimated that fully 500 barrels more of lime-sulphur will be used this year in addition to what has been used.

Woman on Death Bed Swindled, Is Charge

Sarah Pendleton Induced Harriet Scofield to Sign Over \$1600 in Certificates of Deposit, Allegation in Suit.

When Harriet Scofield was on her death bed Sarah Pendleton, by fraudulent representations, induced the said woman to indorse over to her certificates of deposit in the Ladd & Tilton bank amounting to \$1600, according to allegations contained in a complaint filed by John Boydston, administrator of the estate of Harriet Scofield against Sarah Pendleton and the Ladd & Tilton bank. The suit is to enjoin the bank from paying the deposits of Sarah Pendleton until their true ownership is determined by the court.

Boydston alleges that Mrs. Pendleton induced Mrs. Scofield to indorse the certificates by saying she would attend to the business connected with such certificates when, he alleges, she did it for the purpose of getting the certificates for herself.

It has been learned today that his disappearance may be due to the fact that his attentions to a young lady of the community where he resided were spurned. Sheriff Johnson says today that posses will be organized to search for Doerr.

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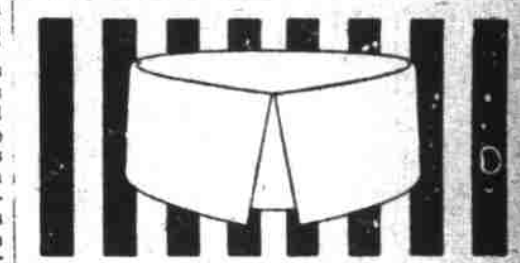
