

KELLY'S DEBUT WITH BEAVERS RESULTS IN THE SAME SAD TALE

Angels Take Second Game of the Series, 4 to 2, Jack Ryan Turning the Trick.

RECRUIT LOOKS ALL RIGHT

Beats Out Double and Single and Scores One of the Home Team's Two Tallies.

When Frank L. arrived in town, he said that old Jack Ryan's arm was so sore he couldn't lift his saucer of morning. Was F. Leroy putting one over on Walter Henery McCredie and his fellow townsmen? Anyhow, Jack didn't seem to have anything the matter.

The only fellow Sinister Jack didn't beat was a tinorous looking strapping Notre Dame, (Indiana of course) who elicited a double and a single and made one of the two tallies of the home team.

This lad's name is Kelly. He is a left handed pitcher and he debuted in the Coast league yesterday. The Angels got a whole flock of hits, but they couldn't score many runs. Instead, they earned only three of them. And the support accorded young Mr. Kelly frittered away like the Sinn Felvers.

One ball trickled through Bobby Vaughn's territory that allowed a runner to advance. Kelly, who is the brother of the young fellow in the preceding column, who once tolled in the dressing room of the Southern league, didn't make a bad showing.

Ryan was extremely lucky in the first. After fanning Willie to start with, Vaughn beat out a perfect bunt. Then Jack cracked Specs on the left arm. A wild pitch allowed the runners to advance. John tried to keep the ball close to the pitcher.

Then Sinister J. socked Nixon on the arm and filled the bags again, but Galloway pulled his fellow Celt out of trouble by knocking down Stump's grounder and stepping on third to force Gulsto.

The Seraphs tied it up in the third, when Kane singled, stole, and scored on Ellis' single just inside first. Kane's piffle was a signal for wild running on the bases against Fisher, who got only one of the five who ventured a steal.

With two out in the fourth, Boles walked and tallied when Nixon took his eye off Ryan's fly in an effort to survey his distance from the fence, and the ball plumped out of his paw.

Los Angeles added another pair in the fifth. After Ellis whiffed, Wolter singled across second, the first of three singles, and stole. Willie made a long sprint to left to get Koerner's fly but just managed to get his fingers on the ball, and Koerner went to second on the throw to third.

In the seventh the Angels filled the bags on Wolter's double, Koerner's single and the hitting of Galloway, but McLarry was called out on strikes, a judgment that made him exceedingly wrathful and resulted in his ejection from the game with a pedro plastered upon his alabaster brow.
