Los Angeles, May 6.—(P. N. S.)—We observed Bare Knuckle Day at the old ball yard and it was a wise man who knew a good place to hide. Not until a pair of policemen in their new spring uniforms began patrolling the field was order restored.

Gus Gleichmann went bat crazy and hit for a triple, a double and a single. A village quiet hovered about the park as the teams stepped into the eighth inning with the Tigers leading 7 to 1. Things happened in the ninth, Quinlan was passed. When Briff grounded to Bates the ball was thrown to Risberg, forcing Quinlan. It looked like the easiest kind of a double play order but Quinlan roared to the rough stuff. The Salt Lake outfielder lunged heavily against Risberg, throwing the Swede off his balance and interfering with a double play. That was the fracas.
