Weather Conditions.
The north-central divisions is still over the upper lake region and rains have fallen in the northern part east of the Rocky mountains, and in central and eastern Canada. A moderate depression, central over the south-west, extends northward to British Columbia, causing considerable showers over the Pacific slope. A ridge of pressure extends from Alberta eastward to the British Columbia coast. Reports from the Gulf and South Atlantic states were not so favorable. The weather is warmer in most sections west of the Rocky mountains, in northwest Montana, northern Colorado, South Dakota, Kansas, western Missouri and the northeast; in general it is cooler elsewhere. The temperature is below normal in interior portions of the country.
