The Alberta United Brethren church will become the center this coming week for all members of that communion in Oregon and western Washington, when their annual conference convenes.

The church is located at East Twenty-second and Sumner streets in the Alberta car, and the pastor and people of the church have been busy for many weeks preparing and planning for the entertainment of delegates and friends of the church that will avail themselves of the opportunity of these conventions, which begin May 29 and conclude with Sunday, June 6.
