

GRADUATING CLASS AT O. A. C. IS LARGEST IN HISTORY OF COLLEGE

Numbers 285, 264 Getting Degree of Bachelor of Science; 18 Master's Degrees.

PAGEANT AT WILLAMETTE

Senior Class Now Holding Rehearsals of Spectacle Dealing With Early History of Oregon.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Or., May 30.—Commencement exercises at the Oregon Agricultural college, June 2 to 5, will be held as follows:

Friday, June 2.—Pageant of seasons and Russian fete day, with recital of music graduates in the evening. Saturday (Alumni day).—Alumni luncheon and business meeting with class reunion, inspection of college, reception of President and Mrs. Kerr to graduates and alumni, with annual recognition in the evening.

Sunday.—Baccalaureate sermon, Dr. Luther B. Dyott of Portland, with union church services in the evening. Monday (Class day).—Senior breakfast, class meeting, dedication of class memorial, class day exercises, inspection of college, regimental graduation parade, music festival, with senior play in the evening.

Tuesday.—Graduating exercises with address by Dr. Enoch Albert Bryan, ex-president of Washington State college, followed by college inspection. The class is much the largest in the history of the institution, numbering 285, receiving degrees as follows: Bachelor of science, 264; master of science, 18; pharmacy, 2; and music, 1. In addition, 24 vocational students will receive certificates of proficiency in their several vocations.

Willamette Rehearses Pageant.

Willamette University, Salem, Or., May 30.—Under the executive coaching of Professor MacMurray of the English department, preliminary rehearsals for the pageant which the senior class will present in connection with the seventy-second commencement exercises of the university already are being held.

The pageant deals with the romance of early Oregon. The first part shows the wild and unexplored Oregon country before the coming of the missionary. Here the senior playrights have based their work on the events centering around the "Bridge of the Gods" as chronicled in the Balch account. Wauilah is taken as the leading character of this portion of the action proper.

Jason Lee, the sturdy Methodist trail blazer and pioneer missionary, is eulogized for the action of the second part. Leading up to the grand finale of the third part will be scenes representing the Willamette of the present, the fruits of his monumental labors and sacrifices.

Those playing the leading roles are: Voices of the West, J. R. Rainier, spirit of the Wild, Helen Wastell; Wauilah, Frances Gittins; Snoqualmie, Arlie Walker; Edwards, Joseph Gerhart; Kelley, Read Bain; Young, John Gary; Jason Lee, Thomas Van Meter; Balch, F. M. Jasper; Slocum, Howard Jewett.

The pageant will be presented on the campus southeast of the gymnasium on the evening of Tuesday, June 6.

No Armed Mexicans Seen on Rio Grande

Commander of Sixth Cavalry Patrol South of Marathon, Texas, Brands as False Stories Being Circulated.

Marathon, Tex., May 30.—(I. N. S.)—Reports from Captain Joseph R. McAndrews, commanding the Sixth cavalry patrol south of here, received today branded as false stories that several bands of armed Mexicans have been seen on the Mexican side of the Rio Grande opposite La Jitas.

With the withdrawal yesterday of the One Hundred and Twenty-seventh coast artillery companies and the departure last night of the Fourteenth cavalry, Marathon is a militia outpost. Company K, Fourth regiment, Texas national guard, started for Terlingua at 8 o'clock this morning in motor trucks. Company I of the same regiment, from Mineral Wells, remains here.

Metal Miners Given Increase in Wages

Five Thousand Colorado Employees Share in Higher Prices to Extent of 5 Per Cent of Pay Checks.

Denver, Colo., May 30.—(U. P.)—Five thousand Colorado metal miners will get a 5 per cent increase in wages June 1, according to the agreement with mining companies here. It is expected other companies will follow the lead and that 25,000 miners will benefit.

The employers explain that the miners are being given a share of the higher prices metals are bringing. Nearly all the advances are on a sliding scale, depending on the selling prices. Gold miners are not affected.

Hiker Starts Across Country.

San Francisco, May 30.—(U. P.)—A determined to break the transcontinental record for the fastest foot race of 104 days, 7 hours, from San Francisco to New York, Joseph H. Scott, amateur hiker, of Philadelphia started for the east yesterday over the Lincoln highway. He expects to make Sacramento in two days.

Chaplin's Demurrer Sustained.

Los Angeles, May 30.—(P. N. S.)—The demurrer of Charlie Chaplin, comedian, to the \$500,000 breach of contract suit brought by the Essanay film company was sustained by Judge Jackson today. The plaintiffs were given 30 days in which to amend their complaint.

Confesses That He Murdered Woman

Jack Stewart, Aged 24, Arrested at Bridgeport for Death of Mrs. E. J. Smith at Wenatchee, Wash.

Wenatchee, Wash., May 30.—The murderer of Mrs. Erma J. Smith, the aged homesteader of Badger Mountain, who was mysteriously shot and beaten to death Sunday, was arrested Monday at Bridgeport. He gave his name as Jack Stewart, age 24. "I don't know why I did it," said Stewart when subjected to the third degree. "I must have been crazy. I only got 10 cents." After committing the crime he fled, traveling at night and hiding during the day. Friday, driven by hunger, he sought, at a ranch near Bridgeport, food and lodging. He disappeared during the night, taking a coat and vest, and was arrested at Bridgeport this morning on that charge. "When searched this morning, 22 calibre shells were found. He confessed when accused of the murder."

Ex-Arizona Sheriff Dynamites Himself

J. R. Rucker Touches off Stick of Explosive on His Chest and Blows His Body to Pieces.

San Bernardino, Cal., May 30.—(P. N. S.)—Ending his life in exactly the same way chosen by an Ontario man last week, J. R. Rucker, 70, former sheriff of Gila county, Ariz., touched off a stick of dynamite on his chest and blew his body to pieces, according to the police. Rucker told a grandson that he would never again be seen alive.

INITIATIVE PETITION FOR LAW REGULATING DENTISTRY APPROVED

Painless Parker Again Will Seek Adoption of Measure Embodying His Ideas.

READY FOR SIGNATURES

Correlated Professions Included; Vitis A. Fitzgerald, Manager of Parker's Portland Office, Submits Petition.

Salem, Or., May 30.—An initiative petition for a law regulating the practice of medicine, surgery, dentistry, podiatry, osteopathy, pharmacy and other correlated professions was approved as to form Monday by Secretary of State Olcott and may now be circulated for signatures. The bill is proposed by Vitis A. Fitzgerald, a Portland dentist, and is designed to bring about the enactment of a statute embodying ideas advocated by Painless Parker, dentist. Fitzgerald is manager of Parker's Portland office.

Thatcher Made Special Agent.

Salem, Or., May 30.—George A. Thatcher of Portland, has been appointed special agent by Governor Withycombe. Thatcher has interested himself in the Ristman-Jennings murder case.

Articles of Incorporation.

Salem, Or., May 30.—Articles of incorporation were filed with Corpora-

tion Commissioner Schullerman Monday by the Eel Lake Logging Road company, Phillip Buehner, Albert Brix and W. U. Douglas, incorporators, \$10,000 capital stock, and North Bend principal place of business.

Fines Imposed on Fishermen.
Salem, Or., May 30.—G. O. Brock, of Silverton, and Thomas Graham and C. White, of Salem, were fined \$25 and costs Monday by Judge Webster for fishing without licenses.

Bar Examinations Begin.
Salem, Or., May 30.—Only two students were here Monday to take the educational examination for the state bar. Eighteen took this preliminary examination in Portland two weeks ago. The regular examination begins Tuesday and it was expected Monday afternoon that about 100 would take it.

Marshfield Visited By Espee Officials

Charles S. Fee, General Passenger Traffic Manager, and D. W. Campbell in Party.

Marshfield, Or., May 30.—Charles S. Fee, general passenger traffic manager of Southern Pacific, arrived here last evening with other officials on an inspection trip. This is his first visit to Coos Bay. Others in the party are: F. L. Burkhalter, superintendent of Oregon lines of S. P.; D. W. Campbell, assistant general manager, and A. Ormandy, chief clerk to John M. Scott, general passenger agent. The officials will visit different points in the county.

State Encourages Training.

Sacramento, Cal., May 30.—(P. N. S.)—State Controller Neylan today announced that employees of all state departments will be allowed to attend the military encampment at Monterey in July on full pay. Only sufficient men to barely operate the various departments will remain.

FRANK M. POWER KNOWN IN PORTLAND

Oreore, Or., May 30.—Frank M. Power of Salem, who died last Monday from blood poisoning following an injury received while cutting wood with an ax, was born in Kaeson, Minn., January 10, 1869, and moved to California with his parents, later coming to Albany, Oregon, where he graduated from Albany college in 1887. He took a course in law at Willamette university and was later admitted to the bar but never practiced his profession.

In 1898 Mr. Power began work for the Oregon Nursery company, then at Salem. Later he became secretary of the Salem Water company. For a time he was interested in the Chico Nursery company at Chico, Cal. Upon his return to Oregon he engaged in the real estate business in Portland, and in 1912 again entered the nursery business with the Oregon Nursery company at Oznoco, and at the time of his death was secretary of the company. In 1908 Mr. Power was elected secretary of the State Horticultural society, serving for six years in that capacity, taking part in the Land Products show at Portland on its inauguration.

In 1898 Mr. Power was married to Aesath Baker at Tacoma, Wash., who with two children, Kenneth and Florence, survive him, as do also his mother, aged 84 years and three brothers, E. L. of Pendleton, Alexander of Lebanon, and Charles E. of Portland.

Ticket Takers Free From Indictments

Cases Against Cleve Simpkins and Rex A. Turner, Who Were Alleged to Have Misappropriated Funds, Dismissed.

Salem, Or., May 30.—Indictments against Rex A. Turner and Cleve Simpkins, accused of appropriating state funds of the 1915 fair to their own use, was dismissed Monday in circuit court, upon motion of District Attorney Ringo, who stated that one of the state's witnesses had removed from the state and it would be costly to get the others here for a trial.

Turner, who is a Salem attorney, was tried a few months ago and the jury disagreed. The case against him was considered by Ringo to be stronger than that against Simpkins and no new

evidence has been secured, it was explained. Simpkins, who is a senior of the Oregon university, will now graduate without the cloud of an indictment hanging over him.

Victim of Explosion In Critical Condition

Parents of Del Smith, Who Was Injured at Loma, Mont., Leave Albany to Go to Him.

Albany, Or., May 30.—Del Smith, who was burned by a coal stove exploded in which he was trying to start a fire near Loma, Mont., on May 21, is in a critical condition at a hospital at Fort Benton, Mont. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. D. S. Smith, of this city left for Fort Benton on Saturday.

Smith was burned badly about the legs and lower part of the body when the coal stove, in which he was pouring coal oil, exploded, setting fire to him and to Miss Lila Patton and destroying the entire house and contents.

Miss Patton died a few hours after the accident and was buried at Halsey last Thursday.

Alleged Looting of Mail Investigated

Deputy U. S. Marshal Arrives in Marshfield to Start Inquiry into Thieving From Sacks in Santa Clara.

Marshfield, Or., May 30.—Alleged looting of the United States mail sacks on the occasion of wreck of Santa Clara near Coos Bay is again to be investigated.

A United States deputy marshal is here and is said to have subpoenaed a large number of persons who will testify at a federal investigation. Some time ago an officer started investigation but it was apparently dropped.

WITHYCOMBE FAVORS SHORTER BALLOT AND ANTI-LOBBYING LAW

Cry About Superfluity of Boards Called Work of the Cheaper Type of Politicians

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., May 30.—Governor Withycombe in a short informal address before the class in "state administration," suggested a bill to eliminate lobbying, shortening of the ballot, and giving the executive more time for strictly administrative duties as possible legislation looking forward to greater efficiency in state government.

In general the governor expressed satisfaction with the conditions under which the executive power of the state is administered. But the signing of vouchers requires practically one-third of the time of the state executive, and the governor expressed himself as favoring some means of saving this time.

The governor maintained that by changing the number of elective officers the ballot might be shortened within reasonable limits. The cry often heard about the superfluity of boards and commissions, the governor believes, is the work of the cheaper type of politician.

"We have the services of the very best citizens in the state free of charge under our present system," declared the governor.
