

SYSTEM OF ISOLATING PRISON DEGENERATES PUT IN FORCE AGAIN

Authorities at Salem Return to Plan Adopted by Former Governor West.

POLITICS MIXED IN FIRE

Asserted That Officials of State Penitentiary Were Away Election-Eveing When It Occurred.

Salem, Or., June 1. — In pledging everyone they told regarding the incendiary feature of the state prison fire, officials gave as a reason that they feared that the guilty convicts would avenge themselves on the other inmates who had "peached."

Several persons on the outside, including members of the state board of control and District Attorney Ringo, were told and all were asked to keep the matter secret.

In connection with the fire, it is asserted that Chief Engineer Barrick, who is one of the main cogs in the fire fighting system, was piloting Chief Clerk Davey, of the prison, in the institution automobile to Mount Angel and elsewhere in Marion county, where Davey sought to round up voters for C. B. Moore, candidate for the Republican nomination for secretary of state. Particular attention was paid to Mount Angel.

Barrick's absence was an important factor, it is contended, in delaying the control of the fire.

In building a cell house in the "bullpen" for degenerates, the prison authorities have practically returned to West's system. West isolated several degenerates in the "bullpen," which is a high-walled enclosure. The new administration took them out and made much of them but one by one they fell from grace.

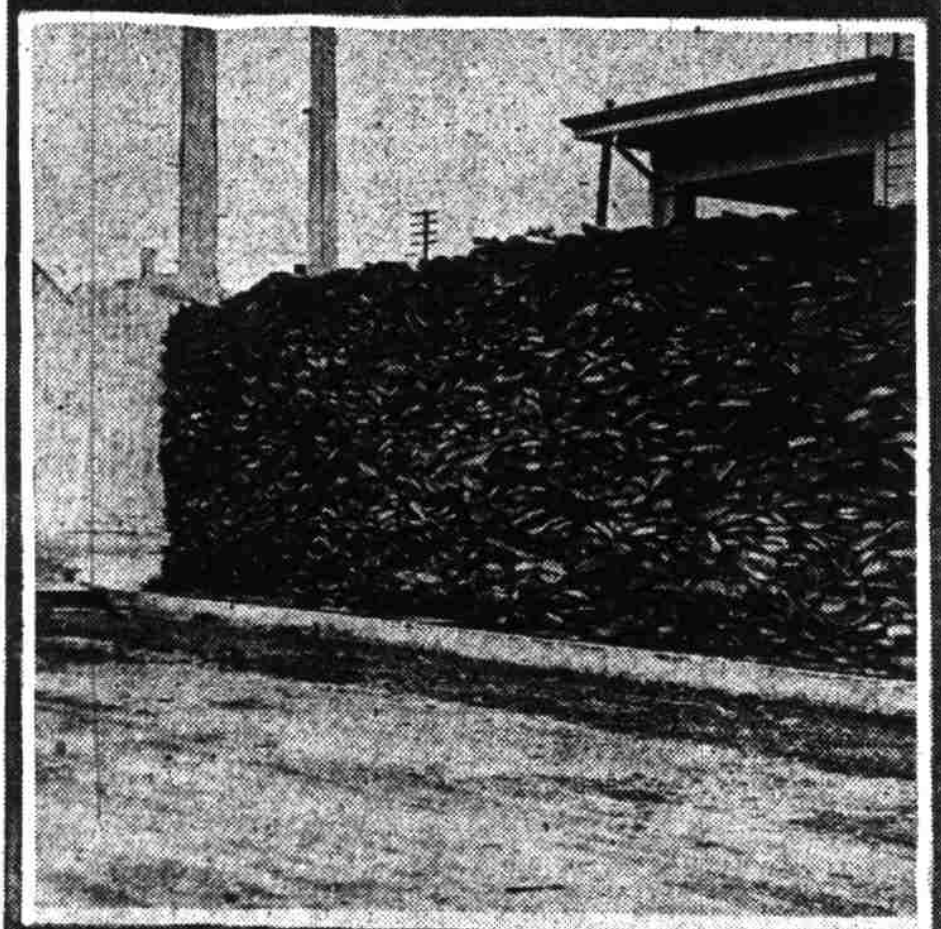
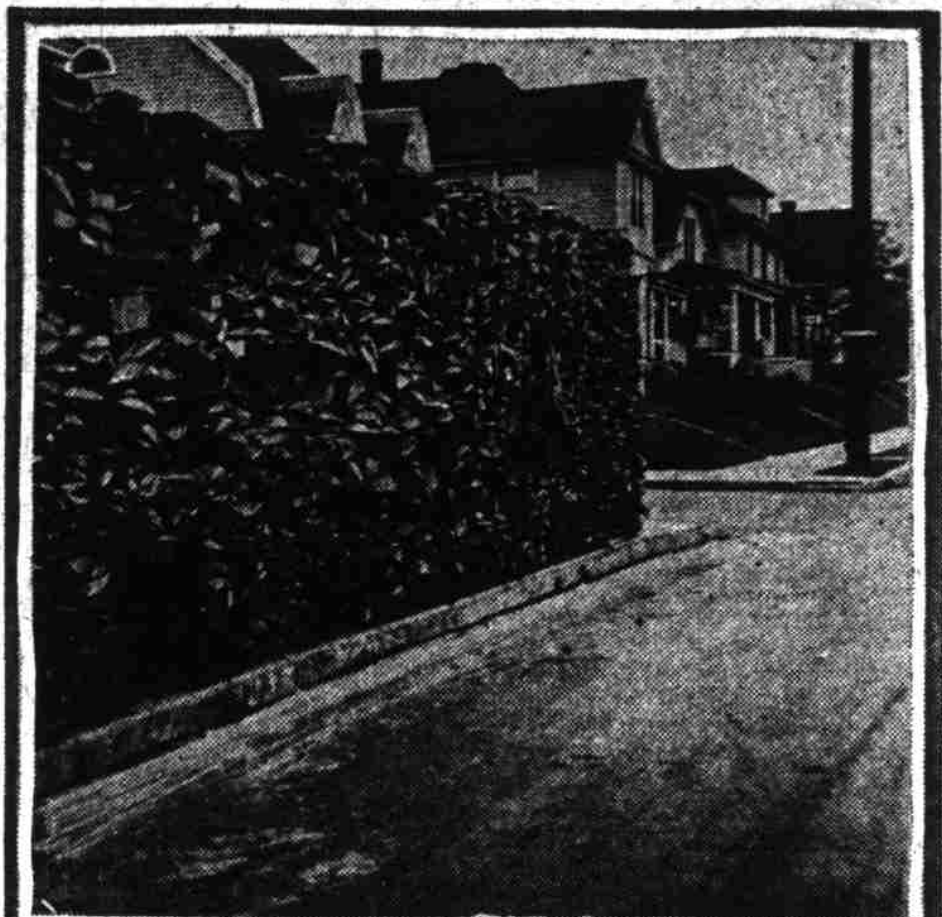

ORDINANCE PLANNED AS GUARD AGAINST ACCIDENTS

At the request of the public safety commission, City Attorney W. P. La Roche is drafting an ordinance forbidding the piling of firewood at street intersections.

The terms of the ordinance probably will provide that no wood at all be piled within 10 feet of an intersection, and that from a point 10 feet from an intersection to a point 25 feet from an intersection wood may not be piled to a height of more than four feet.

There is now no regulation of the piling of wood on the parkings between sidewalk and pavement, save that of time. It is customary for purchasers of firewood to have it piled on the parking to a height of 15 feet or more. Here the wood is left, perhaps, during a large portion of the summer months, when it is sawed and stored in basements. Photographs by the commission show that in multiplied instances wood is piled to heights and so near intersections as to obstruct the view of persons and automobiles approaching intersections. Against this custom many serious accidents are charged.

Several months ago the public safety commission was asked to take up and report on the danger of piling wood at intersections, but the work lagged until the recent injury to a little girl, who was struck by an automobile. The accident brought realization that something must be done promptly.

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Claims of Indians Upheld by Phelps

Court Holds That Umatilla Indians Have Prior Rights to Water for Irrigation Purposes; Will Appeal.

Pendleton, Or., June 1. — Judge Phelps Wednesday handed down an opinion in the matter of adjudication of water rights of the Umatilla river and tributaries. A decree, in accordance with this opinion, is to be filed in a few days.

Adjudication has been before the courts for more than five years. The state water board spent five hours in taking testimony, and made a decision from which an appeal was taken to the circuit court. The attendance was better and the enthusiasm at a higher point at today's meeting than at a central committee gathering for several years. Confidence in Democratic national victories in November was expressed, and prospects look bright for the election of part of the county ticket.

Among prominent Linn county Democrats present were M. C. Miller and S. M. Garland, Lebanon; W. P. Elmore, Brownsville; Mark Weatherford, Albany; C. C. Peery, Seilo; H. W. Standard, Brownsville, Rousing and inspiring speeches were made by several present.

Eugene, Or., June 1. — The Lord's prayer repeated aloud by 50 members of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce at their weekly luncheon Wednesday was the tribute paid by that body to James J. Hill.

The prayer was offered following remarks by Rev. A. M. Spangler of the Congregational church upon the character, worth and ideals of the railroad builder. Rev. Mr. Spangler said:

"Our is not pain that comes from the loss of a dear friend, but it is sorrow for the great loss to the country. Mr. Hill showed us that life is a mission of service. The twentieth century idea is that the real purpose of our existence is the giving of aid to others. Here and now, at the very time of his funeral, we recognize our loss."

\$200,000 Is Raised By Eugene College

Sum Was Necessary to Receive Offer of Late J. J. Hill of \$50,000 Providing Money Obtained in Certain Time.

Eugene, Or., June 1. — The \$200,000 necessary to obtain the \$50,000 cash gift of the late James J. Hill, for an endowment fund of the Eugene Bible university institution supported by the Christian church of the Pacific northwest, has been raised, according to the announcement of President E. C. Sanderson last night. Wednesday was last day set by managers of Mr. Hill's educational fund for the raising of the \$200,000.

The offer of Mr. Hill to give \$50,000 to the school on condition that it raise \$200,000 was made in March, 1914. The people of Oregon were the largest contributors. The school recently celebrated its twenty-first anniversary.
