

CALIFORNIA WOMAN MADE PRESIDENT OF GENERAL FEDERATION

Mrs. Cowles Polls Nearly
Three Times as Many
Votes as Mrs. Sneath.

MISS BACON IS ELECTED

Massachusetts Candidate for Vice President Unopposed; Mrs. Evans Is Oregon Member Board Directors.

New York, June 1.—(U. N. S.)—Mrs. Josiah Evans Cowles of Los Angeles, is president of the General Federation of Women's Clubs. A count of the ballots today in yesterday's election showed Mrs. Cowles had polled nearly three times as many votes as her opponent, Mrs. Samuel B. Sneath of Ohio. The vote follows:

Mrs. Sneath, 423.
Mrs. Harry McFarland of North Dakota was elected recording secretary, and Mrs. William P. Harper of Seattle auditor. A treasurer was not elected, because none of the three candidates received a sufficient majority.

Other officers elected were: Vice president, Miss Georgia Bacon, Massachusetts.
Second vice president—Mrs. Eugene Reilly, North Carolina.

The convention this morning authorized the board of directors to appoint a treasurer and Mrs. William B. Williams of Michigan probably will be named.

Many of the delegates already are leaving for their respective homes, although the convention is still considering unfinished business today and a religious rally held tonight.

Delegates of Louisiana are boosting New Orleans for the next convention.

Bishop of Salem, and Albert Abraham of Roseburg, of the Second congressional district, for the Republicans; and Dr. Henry Waldo Coe and A. E. Clarke, representing the state at large, and Paul Buchholz of Stanfield, for the Progressives.

Ralph W. Hoyt, the other Republican delegate from the Third district, will join the party in Spokane, as will the Washington delegation.

Ex-Senator Charles W. Fulton and Charles H. Carey of the Republican contingent are already in the east.

The party will travel over the Northern Pacific to St. Paul, and thence over the Chicago, Milwaukee & St. Paul to Chicago.

The Oregon Republicans will be quartered at the Sherman House, and the Progressive delegation will have its headquarters at the La Salle hotel.

Charles W. Ackerson and John Y. Richardson will be assistant sergeants-at-arms at the Republican convention. The Oregon delegation goes to the G. O. P. gathering instructed for Justice Hughes for president and for William Grant Webster for vice president.

D. L. Povey, a Progressive delegate, will leave tonight, and Colonel Emmett Callahan, a Progressive alternate, will leave tomorrow.

Notes of Thanks Written.

After being sentenced, a handcuff was snapped over Waite's wrist. A deputy held the other end of the steel "cangary."

Waite was then led away to be taken by automobile to Grand Central station, where the 11:07 train was taken for Ossining. On his way to Grand Central station Waite was perfectly at ease.

At the depot he was seated in a day coach with his guards.

In the Tombs before being taken to court for sentence Dr. Waite wrote a note to Warren Hanley, thanking him for courtesies extended. To Dr. A. W. Prior, in the Tombs, pending an appeal from conviction in an assault case, Dr. Waite wrote a note of appreciation. Dr. Prior attempted to gain Waite's confidence so that he could testify if Dr. Waite had feigned insanity. He was not called.

The matter of an appeal is under way. It was announced that the conviction that one would be taken, but Waite's insistence that he wants to die in the electric chair to make partial atonement for his crime may result in a decision not to appeal. An appeal would delay the execution several months.
