

SCENARIO IS WOVEN ABOUT EVENTS OF THE ROSE FESTIVAL

Mrs. Robert D. Inman, Portland, Creates Film Feature Fitting Great Carnival.

SANTA CLAUS PICTURED

Proceeds of Exhibits, She Suggests, Should Go to Local Institutions Engaged in Charitable Work.

A scenario woven about Rose Festival events and the children's festival has been devised by Mrs. Robert D. Inman.

Her idea is to weave into story form the charming and beautiful features of the festival and to have the production given circulation that will add to the fame of Portland as the Rose Festival city. The proceeds, she believes, should be divided among the Portland institutions that are working against unemployment and are seeking to systematize charity.

SANTA'S FIRST VACATION. INTRODUCTORY PICTURE—The young lady who acts later as the Rose Festival queen meets the little girl of the tenement district and enters her home and sees the sickness and the great need of the family. She leaves in haste and goes to the Mutt's headquarters and reports the conditions. Several of the committee carrying baskets and packages of Christmas cheer reenter the home, placing the things on the table, while the young lady who is the future queen tells the story of Santa Claus. The picture to follow will be an elaboration of the Christmas celebration by the family.

Finds Festival Slogan. SECOND PICTURE—Later, the little girl by some accident finds a card bearing the slogan, "For You a Rose in Portland Grows," and conceives the idea of planting the rose in memory of Santa Claus, which she does in the humble environment of their backyard. The young party who originated the slogan will appear as a part of this picture, and helps the little girl to mail the slogan to Santa Claus in the envelope which she provides for her.

THIRD PICTURE—Santa Claus in his home in Toyland will be represented in a beautiful environment with his tools and toy shop. He is seated at his fireside looking weary and careworn when Santa presents the invitation. His face brightens upon receipt of the invitation which she insists upon him accepting.

FOURTH PICTURE—The letter from Santa Claus being received, there is joy mixed with consternation in the family, and they all troop out to tell the glad tidings along the streets and byways. The picture should represent at least 40,000 of the school children of our city, running in all directions. It is decided among them to call a mass meeting of all the children in the community to prepare for Santa Claus's coming.

Cleanup Campaign Depicted. FIFTH PICTURE—This shows the picture of the children in mass meeting making enthusiastic plans for their cleanup and planting campaign. They decide to elect a queen to preside at the festivities. The picture continues to show these then in full operation with their rakes, hoes, shovels and flower seeds.

SIXTH PICTURE—Will show the interior of the Benson Trade school where the children are learning and learning to make their costumes for the great occasion. Also the boys in their work in the manual training department.

SEVENTH PICTURE—This will feature our May Day festival upon the Columbia highway with the children, the boy scout and the Oregon National Guard are met on the day's outing and their sympathies are aroused and they volunteer to scale the mountain sides to plant the seeds in the more inaccessible places. The May pole and the folk dancing and various forms of entertainment will be shown as further effects being made to prepare for Santa's visit.

EIGHTH PICTURE—Santa Claus in his final preparations for his journey, pats his reindeer and bids them goodbye. He then takes the train and starts for a vacation. The children marching in holiday attire through the streets with their doll buggies, push carts and various toys that might be decorated for the reception. When Santa dismounts the train at the depot, he is showered with rose petals by the children and is escorted to a fairy like conveyance. He enters the parade that will be featured by the festival committee. All festival activities could be shown in this picture. They escort Santa through the park of roses and he is shown our scenic points of interest. Santa Claus goes to the home, where preparations have been made to receive him. The window boxes are bright with their blossoms, and roses are gathered and arranged in vases to adorn the table. Pictures in simple poster form adorn the wall, etc., etc. A lesson can here be shown in the value of utilizing old things which have been reconstructed by the children through the influence of the trade schools with the assistance of others who have come to lend encouragement. Santa is shown his rosebush and the beautiful flowers in the garden.

Stockings Are Filled. NINTH PICTURE—Santa Claus finally retires and after he is sound asleep the children tinkle in to see if he has really fallen asleep. One after the other they enter his room to inspect Santa as he slumbers. The little girl taking Santa's large coat and cap from the bed puts on the same and goes out. The boy fastens Santa's stockings to the bed and the little girl returns with other children, who all have something to place in his stockings as a return compliment for his great generosity to them.

TENTH PICTURE—Santa leaves the city in a shower of roses and promises to return to them at Christmas.

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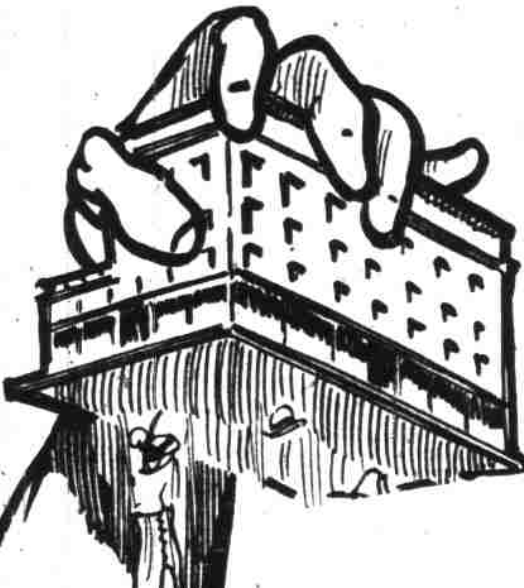
