Beauty Chat

Out of Their Shells.—Even those unfortunate women who have formed an unholy alliance with comfort and luxurious ease are coming out of their shells for a breath of fresh air. Warm days and alluring balmy breezes are serving as magnets in attracting the most sluggish into the open, even if merely to the porch. And what a valuable adjunct a porch is to any house.

Summer life is in a large measure porch life for those who are blessed with such a breathing place. To every home there should be attached a breathing place which has the benefit of a free sweep of the breezes and pure air. It should be made as attractive as possible in every way, for it will promote both comfort and health.

It does not take much persuasion to get people outdoors in the summer. When the sun warms the air they leave their homes in streams. But the warm weather is enervating. The atmosphere does not carry so many invigorating qualities as the higher temperatures prevail and frequently people do not get beyond the porches of their homes.

Sometimes, when passing through city streets lined with apartment houses, I am reminded of the cliff dwellers. The little porches so often seen are reminders of perches. But I know from experience that people who dwell on the upper floors of the large apartment buildings can be abundantly supplied with pure air if they give it a chance to circulate through their dwellings. The atmosphere becomes purer with height, and its purities are clearly apparent even at the elevation of tall buildings. But there are some who overlook the opportunity to give the air a chance to circulate freely through their apartments.

Those who have porches attached to their homes and an opportunity to cultivate lawns and grass are very fortunate. Perhaps they will not appreciate their good fortune until porches and lawns are beyond their reach.

When the heat of summer is upon us, I am sure the thoughts of city men and women who were reared in the country, wander back to the trees, flowers and cool streams in the midst of which they spent their childhood. They should go out into the country.

19 Cases of Liquor Seized at Gardiner

Boxes Labeled Beer, but Containing Whiskey, Confiscated by Police on "Tip" Shipped From San Francisco.

Roseburg, Or., June 1.—Probably the largest raid since the prohibition law went into effect was made at Gardiner Wednesday under orders of District Attorney Neuner. The officers received a tip recently that a large shipment of liquor would arrive in Gardiner the first of this week from San Francisco on the steamer San Gabriel and special officers were sent to investigate. The confiscated liquor consists of 19 shipments of 24 quarts each, but the liquor, instead of being beer, as allowed by law, is whiskey shipped under beer labels. The liquor will be shipped to the officers in Roseburg.

Charlie Chaplin Wins Election Salary Problem Is Stumper

In many respects the Ad clubs' convention to nominate a president of the United States differed from all others of seriously recorded history. In the first place, the meeting of Tuesday afternoon in the Oregon hotel reproduced a species of the miracle of the lion peacefully lying down with the lamb.

The Republican, Democratic, Prohibition, I. W. W. and Socialist parties were divided only by tables. President W. D. Whitcomb announced that formalities of electing a chairman would be dispensed with. He named Fred Spoerl as chairman; everyone yelled "No" and Mr. Spoerl was announced as unanimously elected.

Songs Are Called For.

Instead of proceeding then to the nomination so that the nominators might be eased of their speeches, the chairman called for songs from the club quartet and Roy Dietrich, for humor from the Howard brothers and compliments from the managers of the Passing Show of 1915.

Authorized by the same vociferous protest as had his own appointment he put Dave Mossesohn in charge of credentials and Mossesohn in control of the ballot boxes.

The nominating speeches contained the usual language but differed in the fact that Judge R. G. Morrow for the Republicans nominated Woodrow Wilson, C. A. Cochran for the Democrats nominated William Howard Taft and John T. Douglis for the Prohibitionists nominated Theodore Roosevelt.

No one nominated Hughes. Howard R. Salisbury and Percy E. Arlett nominated Charlie Chaplin, placed a living model of him before the club, and evidently had such influence over the chairman of the ballot boxes that Charlie Chaplin was declared unanimously elected.

Upon which it was asked how the United States of America could pay a Chaplin salary, and the election was lost in silence.

Douglas Republicans Meet.

Roseburg, Or., June 1.—At a meeting of the Republican county central committee in Roseburg Wednesday afternoon, B. W. Bates was elected chairman, O. H. Porter, secretary, and A. C. Menster, treasurer. Elbert B. Hermann was elected state committeeman and J. T. Bridges of Oakland, congressional committeeman from Douglas county.

Admiral Warns That Country Unprepared

Commander of Pacific Fleet Says If Congress Does Not Give National Protection, Others Should Be Elected.

Venice, Cal., June 1.—(P. N. S.)—"Our country is not prepared. If we have a war and you get what it is possible you might, you will get what you deserve." With these words Admiral (Amron) M. Winslow, commander of the Pacific fleet, sounded a "warning note at the Memorial day exercises here. He declared that if the present congress does not give America sufficient facilities for national protection, men should be sent to Washington who will do so.

Polish People Near Aberdeen Have Feud

Shots Exchanged in Skirmish But No Fatalities Reported So Far; Sheriff and Deputies on Ground.

Aberdeen, Wash., June 1.—A feud has broken out between several families in a Polish settlement 12 miles north of here. Shots have been exchanged in a skirmish, but no one has been killed so far. Sheriff Mathews and several deputies have gone to the scene. The Polish community comprises about 50 families.

Investigation Into High Taxes Ordered

Consular Agents in Mexico Instructed to Look Into Charges That American Oil Firms in Mexico Pay Assessments.

Washington, June 1.—(I. N. S.)—Counselor of the State Department Polk, today announced that Consular Agents Dawson, at Tampico, and Rodgers at Mexico City, have been instructed to investigate charges that prohibitory taxes are being levied against American oil operators in Mexico.

Missouri Bank Is Robbed by Bandits

Confederate Waits Outside With Automobile While Partner Compels Cashier to Turn Over \$3000.

Webb City, Mo., June 1.—(I. N. S.)—While a confederate waited outside with an automobile, a bandit yesterday entered the bank of Nock City, 10 miles from here, at noon yesterday and compelled Cashier Long to turn over \$3000 to him. The men escaped.

Town Destroyed by Fire.—Springer, N. M., June 1.—(I. N. S.)—The town of Roy, near here, was almost destroyed by fire yesterday. The loss is estimated at \$100,000.
