

SALE OF CHINA EGGS CAN'T BE RESTRICTED BY STATE OF OREGON

Supreme Court Holds That
Act Is in Conflict With the
Constitution.

GANTENBEIN IS REVERSED

Action Followed Offering for Sale of
Cake Containing Imported Pro-
duct of Foreign Eggs.

Salem, Or., June 6.—Holding that the state of Oregon cannot place restrictions on the sale of eggs imported from China or any other foreign country, and that the act aimed to accomplish this purpose is in conflict with the constitution of the United States, the supreme court Tuesday reversed the judgment of Circuit Judge Gantenbein, of Multnomah county, in the case against J. C. Jacobson of Portland.

Jacobson used China eggs to make a cake, offered for sale, and was convicted of failing to display a sign saying: "Imported eggs used here." "Trade with foreign nations and the state of Oregon must be just as free as between the latter and any sister state," said Justice Bean in his opinion. "The restriction in the section of the act in question must necessarily interfere with, impede and obstruct that freedom of transportation and exchange between this nation and foreign countries, which such articles would upon their merits otherwise have. This section of the law is beyond the power of state legislation and is void."

Elsewhere in his opinion he said that the act does not meet the tests prescribed for a police power regulation, and it can safely be said that the real purpose was to counteract the custom's duty act of congress which admitted eggs from foreign countries without duty.

Roseburg Rehearing Denied.

Salem, Or., June 6.—The supreme court denied today a rehearing asked by the city of Roseburg in the case brought by John Hunter and others, and declared, in an opinion by Justice Harris, that it still adhered to the conclusions of the original opinion holding that the contracts entered into with the Roseburg & Eastern Railroad company and the Kendall Lumber company for the building of a railroad were in violation of the constitution.

Adventists Lose Request.

Salem, Or., June 6.—That the will of Lucy Ellen Rowell of Lincoln county, in which she left about \$30,000 to the Western Oregon Conference Association Seventh Day Adventists, was wholly the product of disease and delusion and not the deliberate act of a person mentally capable of intelligently selecting the objects of her bounty, was the decision of the supreme court Tuesday.

The suit was brought by Frank Rowell, husband of the deceased, to set aside the will. The judgment of former Circuit Judge Harris for Rowell was affirmed. The opinion was written by Justice McBride.

pire, and Yuan held it when he was only 26 years old. When the Japanese drove the Chinese out of Korea, he was one of the few to return to Peking still in the favor of the court.

He rose to great prominence through his effective reorganization of the army after the war with Japan had shown its weaknesses. It is generally held that he assisted the empress dowager in effecting a coup d'etat in 1895 by which she wrested the throne from the emperor, Kuang Hsu, and he was popularly accused of betraying the emperor.

The dowager appointed him governor of Shanghai, where, during the Boxer rebellion, he displayed his astuteness. Invited to join the Boxer sect, he dared not do so, although he had no sympathy for their fanaticism. He agreed to join the Boxer movement if its leaders would prove to him their immunity to foreign bullets. His toll was that he had one of those foreign guns in his own house, and that if the leaders would meet him in his garden next day he would stand them up against the wall and try the "foreign devil magic" on them. If the bullet did not hurt, Yuan would become a Boxer.

Boxer Submits to Test.

So subtle was the faith of one leader that he submitted to the test, and, according to the story, fell dead at the first rifle bullet, which pierced his heart. Yuan Shi Kai was thus freed from any obligation to join the fanatic movement of the Boxers. As a matter of fact, he was given credit for material assistance to the foreigners during the warfare which the allies waged in China.

With the death of the empress dowager and the emperor, Kuang Hsu, almost coincidentally, and possibly each by poison at the hands of the other, the child emperor, Hsun Tung, came to the throne under the regency of Prince Chun. Yuan, presumably because he had gained such control of the army, was dismissed in disgrace although nominally on the pretext of "curing a sore leg."

When the anti-Manchu rebellion broke out in October, 1911, the Manchu regency in despair urged Yuan to return. The latter replied that his leg too was not yet well, but when given authority as supreme commander of all forces in the north, he accepted. He also became the first premier of the regency cabinet, which the regency offered the rebels as a concession of peace.

But neither the rebels nor Yuan

were satisfied. The abdication of the Manchu rulers was forced, and the boy emperor, at the dictation of Yuan Shi Kai, authorized the premier to organize with the rebel leaders at Nanking a republican form of government.

Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the provisional president of the southern rebels, was forced to retire, and Yuan Shi Kai was elected provisional president of the Chinese republic at Nanking on February 15, 1912. He took the oath of office at Peking the following month.

Yuan Shi Kai was reported seriously ill several days ago. When he announced last fall that he would ascend to the throne as emperor of China, a revolt broke out. His coronation was then set for early spring, but postponed indefinitely because of the nation's turmoil.

Rumors of Poison.

San Francisco, Cal., June 6.—(U. P.)—Japanese newspapers recently received from China contain unofficial rumors that the illness of Yuan Shi Kai was caused by poison. It was reported that the revolutionists had many assassins in Peking, and that one of them might possibly have gained access to the palace.

Observers of Chinese affairs here were of the opinion that his death, if the report is true, would result in new uprisings in southern China. The lack of a strong man to take Yuan Shi Kai's place, it was believed, would cause the revolutionary situation to become even more serious.

Revolutionists in San Francisco's Chinatown celebrated when the report of Yuan Shi Kai's death was received. Leaders said his death meant the restoration of a real republican form of government in China.

Robert Park, editor of a Chinese newspaper, declared Li Yuan Hung, vice-president, would succeed Yuan.

Yuan Hung Succeeds Him.

Washington, June 6.—(U. P.)—Informed of the Tokyo dispatch telling of President Yuan's illness and a report that he is dead, the Chinese legation said inquiries would be made immediately of the Chinese government. The legation expected advice later today.

The cable which contained the notification was sent in code by the American minister at Peking.

Minister Reisch called Yuan Shi Kai died last night. The message was dated 11 o'clock, Peking time, and was a bare announcement of Yuan's death and a statement that Premier Luan Chi Jui had pledged his full support to Vice-President Li Yuan Hung, who succeeds Yuan.

State Department Notified.

Washington, June 6.—(U. P.)—The state department today received an official report that Yuan Shi Kai is dead.

LUCK BROKE FOR THE GERMANS IN BATTLE ON SEA, SAYS BRITON

Heavy Mist Gave Opportunity
for Teuton Fleet to Escape
Annihilation.

SUN AND WIND ALSO AIDED

Wind Blew Hard in Germans' Direction
and Sun Silhouetted British Ships,
Making Splendid Targets.

Restoration of Tirpitz Demanded.
London, June 6.—(U. P.)—With dispatches from the Hague to London say that since the Sialkot sea fight there has been a growing demand for the restoration of Admiral von Tirpitz as head of the German sea forces. The dispatches say that the German conservative and national liberal parties are making a concerted move in this direction, not being satisfied with the result of the sea fight.

Admiral von Tirpitz, who had been generally credited with planning to push to merciless execution the German submarine campaign of frightfulness, resigned when the German-American submarine controversy grew hottest shortly before President Wilson's threat of severance of diplomatic relations. His health was given as the reason.

London, June 6.—(U. P.)—"Only a phenomenal piece of luck saved the German high seas fleet from utter destruction in the North sea fight," a senior officer, commanding one of the British cruisers that played an important role in the engagement, told the United Press today.

"The Germans had all the advantages they could have wanted," said the British commander. "It was blowing hard in their direction. The sun was at our back silhouetting all our ships and making splendid targets for the German gunners."

The firing began at 20,000 yards. We engaged five German battle cruisers whose names we could not make out. It was not fighting from the start with the water full of burning shells. I could see our shells hitting the Germans and plainly doing great damage.

Chase Was Fruitless.

"Our strategic plan was to cut the Germans off from their base. We had accomplished this when the mist began settling, finally giving the Germans a chance to escape. Our fire was so heavy they were more than anxious to quit. Only two of their battle cruisers were still firing when the mist settled. All that was left for us was to chase them through the light. When daylight broke, they had disappeared."

"Our men entered the battle fearlessly, and fought with wonderful coolness throughout. One shell after another struck our vessels, but failed to break the spirit of the men. A bursting shell hit a funnel of one of our first line vessels. Men rushed to remove the debris and found still another shell was unexploded. They dumped it into the sea."

Anxious to Repeat Battle.

"The super-dreadnaught Warspite, which the Germans claim they sank, rushed into the engagement disabled, with a broken propeller. She circled around helplessly under a terrific fire. The other British ships came to her aid and engaged the Germans shelling her. She finally escaped under their protective fire. Her loss in men was small, and her damage easily repaired."

"The Germans certainly enjoyed great luck in getting away after the British had paid for their victory with lives and ships. We are more than anxious to repeat the engagement under similar circumstances, trusting that the luck will not all go away the next time. I am certain, however, that the enemy's losses were heavier than ours."
