Taft Family Backing Hughes, It Is Said

Esposal of Hughes' Cause May Be Actuated by Desire for Revenge; "Brother Charles" Active for Justice.

Chicago, June 7.—(U. P.)—Connection of the Taft family and fortune with the Hughes campaign was admitted yesterday by Governor Whitman of New York, one of the Hughes leaders. "Brother Charles" Taft of Cincinnati was said to be "interested in the campaign," although to what extent the governor said he could not be certain.

Governor Whitman would not comment on the reports that the Tafts were backing Hughes as a means of revenge on Roosevelt.

Governor Whitman said he "assumed" that William Howard Taft is in complete sympathy with the political views of the brother.

Laborers Are Injured.

Albany, Ore., June 7.—Four Greek laborers employed in the Noon Logging company camp near Rhilomata were injured Monday afternoon when the chain on a long 25 feet long and four feet in diameter broke, letting the huge log roll over onto them. Three of the men sustained broken legs and one received a severe injury in the back of his head that may prove fatal. All were taken to a hospital in Portland.

Stephen Vogler Dies.

The Dalles, Ore., June 7.—Stephen Vogler, who died at his home in this city early Tuesday morning, was buried today. Mr. Vogler, who had resided here for many years, was stricken Monday with paralysis. He died within a few hours. He is survived by a widow and two married daughters.

Marshall Willing to Stay With His Job

Vice President Says If Democrats Want to Nominates Him It Is All Right; If Not, He Won't Complain.

Indianapolis, Ind., June 7.—(U. P.)—"If the Democratic Party wants to nominate me for vice president, it is all right, and if not, I will not complain," was the statement of Vice President Marshall today upon arrival at his home here for a stay of two weeks. "It is none of my affair what is done at the Chicago convention, but personally I cannot help but prefer the nomination of Mr. Fairbanks," said the vice president.

Lad Killed by Fall In Grain Elevator

The Dalles, Ore., June 7.—When 13-year-old Cecil Perry fell from a scaffold in a grain elevator at Centerville Monday he fractured the base of his skull. The lad was rushed to the hospital for medical attention, but died upon his arrival here without regaining consciousness. The body was taken back to Centerville for interment.

PRESIDENT PREPARED SEVERAL PLANKS OF PLATFORM HIMSELF

Cabinet Approved These Items Referring to Party Legislation and Effect.

WILL ACCEPT CHALLENGE

Wilson Will Write Challenging Planks, Making Them Terse, Aggressive; Slogan, Peace and Prosperity.

Washington, June 7.—(U. P.)—President Wilson and his cabinet discussed national politics for more than an hour yesterday. The St. Louis platform and portending signs of another Republican split were the chief subjects considered.

The president prepared several planks of the platform himself and the cabinet gave them their approval. These planks refer to party legislation and its effect upon the economic and political welfare of the country.

The final draft of a few planks dealing with the great issues upon which the campaign will be fought, will be postponed until after the Republicans have adopted their platform. The Republican challenge, whatever it may be, will be accepted. President Wilson will write these planks also and it was said today that they will be terse, aggressive and incisive. The Democratic campaign slogan will be "Peace and Prosperity."

Tariff to Be Upheld.
The Democratic tariff will be upheld as a great model of economic legislation that has not yet been tried out and properly tested, because of disturbed European conditions, and the proposed tariff commission will be pointed to as a scientific method of solving the commercial problems that will arise with the coming of peace.

The Democratic party will be pledged to such further tariff legislation as will be essential to protect American industries from disaster through the dumping of foreign products on the domestic market, and the proposed increase of duties to enable the manufacture in this country of dyes for the

future will be used as proving that the policy of this administration is broad-gauged.

Stones to Bear Platform.

The ability of the administration to keep the country out of war will be extolled as an evidence of its strength, and preparedness legislation, thus far enacted and still promised, will be cited as its active response to the demands of public opinion.

It will be claimed that impetus to business was afforded by the federal reserve act, and it will be cited as an illustration of constructive legislation. Speaker Clark was quoted today as saying if he were called upon to write a platform for the St. Louis convention he would make it very short and clear cut.

Chairman Stone of the senate foreign relations committee will be entrusted with the responsibility for the platform after it is completed. He will carry it to St. Louis for submission to the convention with instructions to have it adopted as written.

Daily Conferences Held.
Daily political conferences are being held at the White House. Most conspicuous of the conferees are Senator Otis James of Kentucky and William Hughes of New Jersey. These two men are taking the most active part in preparing the plans of the convention with the president's secretary, Joseph P. Tumulty. Senator J. Hamilton Lewis of Illinois and Representative Frank E. Doremus of Michigan, chairman of the Democratic congressional committee, were White House callers today. Mayor James M. Curley of

Boston also talked politics with Secretary Tumulty.

Frederick W. Steckman, publicity representative of President Wilson, left today for St. Louis to arrange for the publicity plans. Senators Hughes, James and Pittman are planning to leave next Sunday.

President Wilson has not yet designated his choice for national chairman. The most likely man now is believed to be John W. Davis, solicitor general of the department of justice.

Dies at Soldiers' Home.
Roseburg, Ore., June 7.—James Moore, an Oregon pioneer, and a resident of Canyonville since 1854, died on Saturday night at the Oregon Soldiers' home, where he had been for the past two weeks. He was a veteran of the

Indian wars of 1855-56, and is survived by three sons, Washington Moore, of Canyonville; W. M. Moore of Camas Valley and J. W. Moore of Glendale.

Gained Amnesty, But Continued Plotting
Galveston, Texas, June 7.—(U. P.)—Generals Rafael Davilla and Luis Gamboa, recently granted amnesty by General Carranza, have been charged and will be court-martialed on charges of plotting with enemies of the de facto government, according to dispatches here today. The conspiracy is alleged to have continued after the men accepted amnesty.
