Thousands of People View Impressive and Spectacular Ceremonies Today.

UNFURL THE FLAG

President Wilson, At Washington, D. C., to Press Electric Button Which Will Release Old Glory.

The Columbia River highway belongs to the world. Its unsurpassed viewpoints of the gorge of the Columbia, its monoliths and waterfalls, are the possession of all who travel. Under the imposing aititude of Multnomah falls this afternoon, the crash of falling waters mingling with the music of the Rosarian band, Queen Muriel of the realm of roses, with a

The witnesses were officials of Oregon and Portland, a crowd estimated at 10,000 people who applauded the act. Later in the day President Wil-son at Washington, with a touch of his finger on an electric button, will unfurl the American flag to the breeze at Crown Point, thus giving sign of the nation's acceptance and formally sealing the gift

The Columbia River highway is recognized as the greatest scenic road on the American continent. Its dedi-cation to the tourist travel of the world gives the Rose Festival of 1916 a distinction beyond all other festivals,




