CHILDREN'S PARADE

IS LEAD BY POLICE
ESCORT AND BAND

The police escort and band led the parade, with the governors of the Rose Festival association in automobiles immediately following.

Then came Queen Muriel, King Jay and J. R. Dunbar, president of the Rose Festival association, and pages to the king and queen, in a large automobile. Following in other machines were the members of the royal party, including the lords of honor, the flower queen and the champion. All of the girls were dressed in light dresses and carried parasols of various colors. Following the queen, the parade was led by the school board in automobiles, with a division of the Royal Rosebuds as escort. George L. Baker, carrying a banner, and assisted by two tiny girls, led the Rosebuds.

Rosarian Band in Line

Following was the Rosarian band and the rose girls, under the direction of Robert Krohn. The rose girls were from all the schools and in their drills and maneuvers on Grand avenue brought forth much applause. The girls were of uniform height, and made a striking appearance dressed in their light, white dresses, fringed with pink roses. A pink silk ribbon attached near their waists and pink ribbons in the hair, with huge pink flowers in their hands, completed their costumes.

From the time the girls swung into Grand avenue from East Main street until they finished the line of march, they were busy in their drills. Swinging the flowers over their heads and dancing, the rose girls made a very favorable impression.

Firemen's Band Marches

Then came the Firemen's band led by Chief Howell. This was the head of the human flag division led by E. J. Curtis, assisted by Robert Krohn, Jr., as director. The boys and girls making up the human flag were dressed in red, white and blue suits, with those in the front of the line wearing white hats and carrying the flag in the line of march, the body resembled an enormous American flag waving in the breeze.

Following was the flag section with E. J. Hadley as leader. In this division were several hundred children each carrying an American flag upright against the right shoulder. The Portland Ad club quartet and the Progressive Business Men's club quartet singing an American song, "Portland Grows," through megaphones, headed the next division. They were followed by McElroy's band.

Folk Dances Given

Then came the folk dance section with D. T. Van Tie as leader, assisted by Opal Creech, Agnes Duck, Merle Woody, Edna Doyle, Mabel Molstead, Lela Craddock, Jessie Johnson and Neta Patterson. Children from the Central, Vernon, Clinton Kelly, Richmond, Stephens, Woodmen, Elliot and Rose City Park schools participated.

The girls were dressed in quaint Dutch costumes minus the wooden shoes, however. They wore white stockings and white shoes. Each child wore a tiny, fluffy cap of white. The skirts were red in color with black, blue and yellow stripes near the bottom.

Dancing on the pavement, the children brought forth much applause. Many times during the line of march the procession stopped to allow the children to carry out displays along in front of the grand stands and where the crowds were thickest.

The Washington High School band, composed of boy students from the school, headed the next section. This was flag section No. 2 with H. M. Sherwood as leader. The children in this section, both boys and girls, carrying American flags and waving them to the patriotic airs played by the bands, aroused enthusiasm.

Following was the "Capri's" band heading the flower division with R. Steele, leader, assisted by Lydia V. Leneuve, Olga Johnson, Florence Smith, Emily Forrester, Elizabeth Shoemaker, Georgia Howe, Ella Ansley, Charlotte Ballin, Esther Hawkins and Miss J. M. Tiers.

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ROSE SHOW REVEALS RAREST OF BLOOMS; MANY NEW VARIETIES

Thousands of Blossoms at
Meier & Frank's Tell De-
velopment of Oregon Flora.

PRIZES ARE AWARDED

Great Throats See and Admire Exhib-
its of Portland's Best, With Colors
and Perfumes Most Delightful.

In song and poetry the rose has been throned in the hearts of the people these thousand years, and today the loyal hearts of flower lovers, wherever found, turn wistfully to every new touch of beauty and form that genius and science give to their queen.

Oregon champions the world in the profusion and regal beauty of her roses, and today the fairest of all these fair blossoms are assembled in Portland for the opening day of the annual exhibition of the Portland Rose society.

The exhibit opened this afternoon on the sixth floor of the Meier & Frank building, and almost immediately the broad aisles were crowded with admiring spectators.

Flowers Are Rampant.

The dainty teas, the rampant climbers, the rough and ready hybrids vie with each other in heartful rivalry and wealth of beauty. Blossoms of surpassing size, marvelous beauty and delicious fragrance are to be found arranged in slender vases, great bowls and baskets.

Stove white Karl Droushnik, shell-pink Testouts, crimson Richmond, and all the shaded blossoms are shown in great profusion. A novelty is a basket of Austrian copper roses, the inside of the petals resembling deep copper, colored satin and the outside a rich buff color.

E. B. McFarland is showing 15 roses new to Portland. The display of hybrids and hybrid teas roses is unusually large and fine, although there is a slight falling off in the number of perfect hybrids. The queenly Caroline Testout is shown by the hundreds, and the quality is unusually high.

Woodrow Wilson, were here, he would see in this highway, which we have gathered together to dedicate, something of the mind which conceived it, of the quality of manhood of the builders and of the character of the people who, by self-sacrificing liberality, made the building possible, and would place a wreath of victory upon the brow of every son of honest toil who by sweat and labor has carved out of the granite of these mountains this monument to each of them.

"Of the artist engineer, the lover of the beauties of nature, who had the genius and vision to see a highway through the granite walls—along the perpendicular cliffs and through the evergreen forest glades, he would say, he has wrought better than he knew, and this highway will be to him a memorial enduring forever."

"The Master Builder, who has set an example of patriotic service to state and nation worthy of imitation and emulation, he would say—this highway will be a blessing indeed if it shall be a perpetual inspiration to others to like unselfish patriotism and service to country and state."

"Of the people of the county of Multnomah, who laid aside the sordid things of life and builded this, a national highway, making it possible for the people of the nation to enjoy the wonders and beauties of this sublime place, this highway characterizes them as a people of great things. People are great as they dream, and this highway stamps the people of the northwest as a people great in vision, great in achievement and great in patriotism."

"Monument to Toil.
"And the sons of toil, who have joined with the artist engineer, the builder and the people in making this national highway—you by your labor

and skill have builded here a monument to honest toil honoring them forever."

"On behalf of Woodrow Wilson, president of the United States of America, I join in the dedication of this highway to the nation as a national highway, dedicated to a nation of liberty-loving, patriotic people, a people by habit and desire devoted to pursuits of peace and commerce. But a people with a heart for any fate, resolved to be prepared to meet every obligation with courage and patriotic devotion."

Mr. Flegel received a telegram from President Wilson requesting him to represent the nation's chief executive at the dedicatory ceremonies.

"I consider this a great honor," said Mr. Flegel last night, "to be called on by the president of the United States to represent him at a function of this sort and I gladly accept."

The telegram follows:
The White House, Washington, D. C.
Hon. Austin F. Flegel, Portland, Ore.

I would be very glad to have you represent me at the ceremonies in connection with the dedication of the Columbia river highway which are to be held at Crown Point tomorrow, June 7th. I hope that you will find it possible to do so.

"Words fail me to describe the wonders and beauty of these majestic mountains, deep gorges, sparkling cascades, matchless glens, ever-sounding waterfalls and the woods where rolls the Oregon, and the charm of it all combined and made so easily accessible to all the world by this national highway, and I shall not attempt to do so. 100 Astorians Off For Rose Festival

Longshoremen Gather at Dock and At-
tempt to Prevent Delegation From
Traveling on Steamer Lurline.

Astoria, Ore., June 7.—Approximately 100 members of the Astoria staff and their friends left on the steamer Lurline at 9 o'clock last night for Portland, where they will participate in the Rose Festival. They expect to arrive in Portland tomorrow morning and to take part in the marine parade.

Some trouble arose here before the Lurline sailed, owing to the fact that the vessel was manned by non-union men. One 200 longshoremen gathered at the dock and urged citizens not to make the trip on the boat.

One of the members of the staff who made the trip is J. J. Sizemore, secretary of the Astoria Labor Council, and in order that he be not molested he was escorted from the crowd to the boat by Chief of Police Houghton. He was urged by the longshoremen not to board the boat.

The Portland Press club will remain open to all members of the club and friends during the Rose Festival, according to the Astoria Labor Council, and of managers yesterday. An invitation has been extended to out of town visitors to make their headquarters in the club rooms during the week.
