

BAY CITY BOASTS OF PAVED STREETS AND MODERN LIGHT PLANT

Salmon Canning and Lumbering Industries Form Valuable Backbone to Place.

WATER SYSTEM IS AMPLE

Plans for Improvement of Tillamook Bay and Bar Giving People of Port Hope for Future.

Bay City, Ore., June 8.—If you continue Stark street in Portland, or to give it its original name, the Hase Line road, due west for 60 miles it will pass through the center of Bay City on the Oregon coast. Unless you have been in Bay City recently you would scarcely recognize the place. In place of the old-time dirt streets Bay City now has 15 blocks of well-paved streets.

In the center of the street is a strip of concrete 16 feet wide. On each side of this concrete strip, crushed rock macadam is laid. The street paving cost \$45,000 and was done under the Harpoff act, the donating property paying for the improvement.

Bay City has a water supply sufficient for a city of 10,000 people. It is brought from a point three miles east of the city and has a fall of 800 feet.

Houses Electric Lighted.

Bay City has a 24 hour electric light service, the power being supplied by the Coast Power company.

There are two salmon canneries and one sawmill as well as a fresh fish shipping station at Bay City. The sawmill is cutting spruce almost exclusively. They have just shipped two carloads of selected spruce for which they received \$20 per thousand. It is aeroplane stock and was shipped to Boston. The canneries' name was not given and its destination beyond Boston is not known. The probability, however, is that Bay City spruce will soon be sailing above the hostile clouds in Europe helping to deal out death and destruction.

Bay City was started by H. W. Cottle, formerly president of the State Insurance company of Salem. W. S. Gens, still a resident of Bay City, was one of the first permanent settlers. He has lived in Bay City for the past 20 years.

Bay City Has Bank.

Bay City has a bank, a good hotel, a newspaper, the Bay City Examiner, several restaurants, well stocked stores and a sanitarium, the Tillamook Bay hospital.

The present city officers are W. H. Gilmore, mayor; J. C. McHugh, recorder; and L. E. Brown, treasurer. Just at present Bay City is jubilant over the fact that the sundry civil bill just reported in congress carries an appropriation of \$25,000 for the improvement of the Tillamook bay and bar. This completes the sum to be put up by the government toward the improvement of the bar. The government has already paid in \$72,000 of the \$100,000 promised. To make the necessary improvement of the bay it was necessary to organize a port, so the port of Bay City was organized with an area of 200 square miles.

Extends Twenty-five Miles.

It extends 25 miles to the eastward to the summit of the Coast mountains. Its northern limit is Manhattan beach and its southern boundary is the Wilson river. The assessed valuation of the district is \$7,500,000. The engineer's estimate of the total cost of the project is \$14,000,000. The government provides one half of this sum, the port of Bay City the other half.

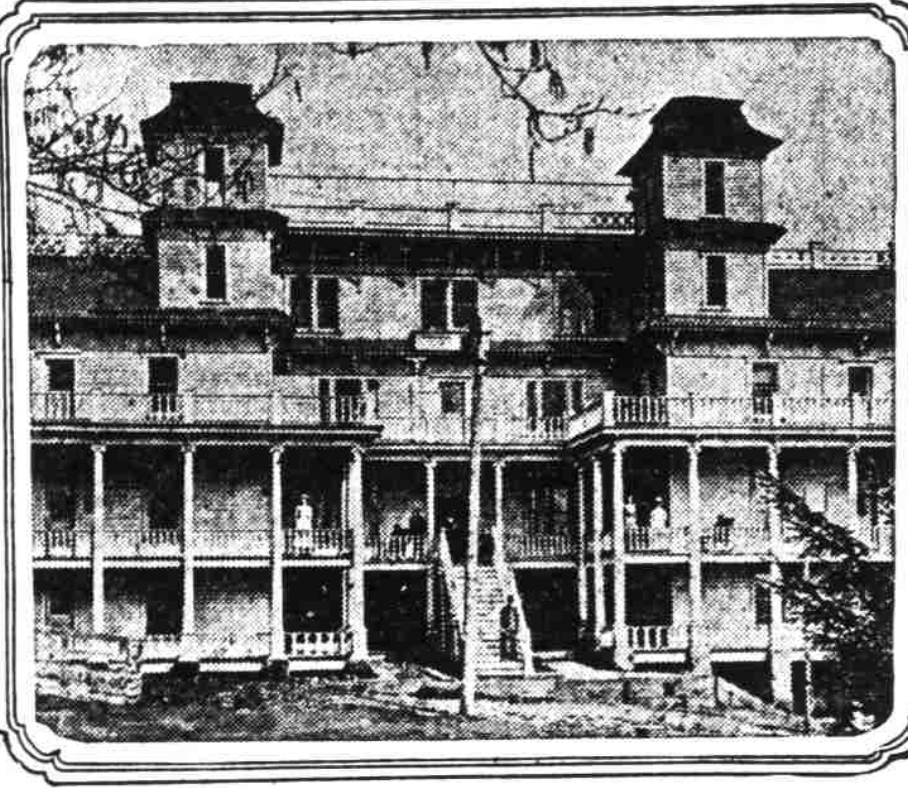
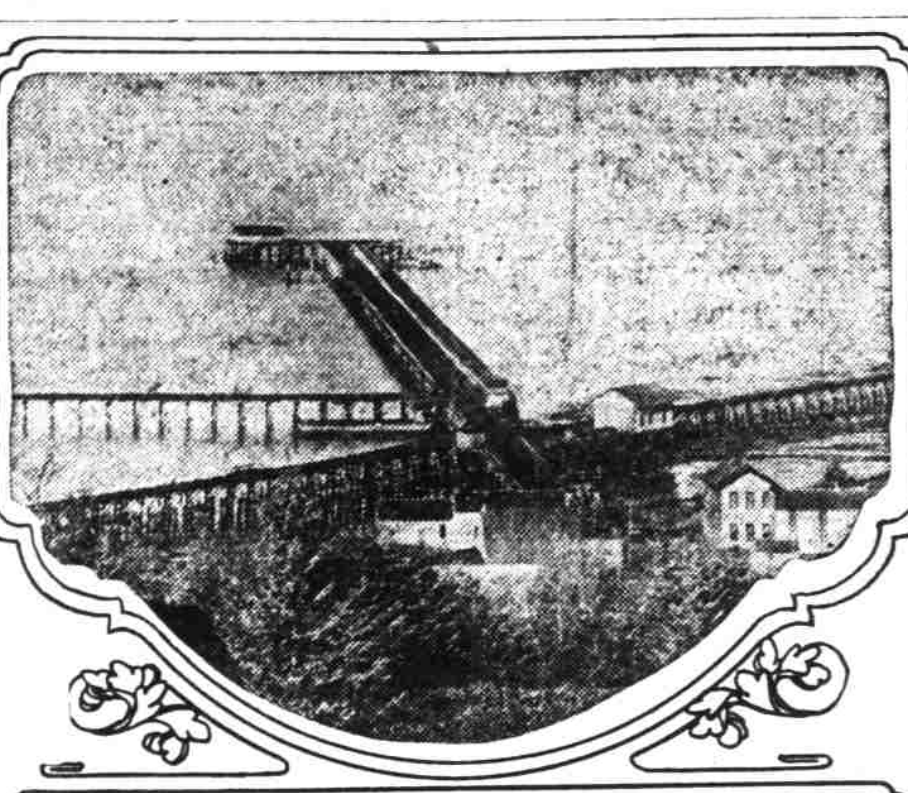
The Tillamook project consists of a jetty 5,000 feet long, projecting into the ocean on the north side of the inlet to the bay, and the dredging of a ship channel up the bay to Bay City.

Channel 200 Feet Wide.

This channel is to be 200 feet wide and is to have a depth of 16 feet at extreme low tide. About three quarters of the channel dredging has been completed and the jetty is about 60 per cent completed.

Under a special agreement with the war department the port contributed half the total cost through the sale of its bonds. The bonds were sold at a premium to the First National bank of Cleveland, Ohio. The port commissioners are John Nelson, president; Russell Hawkins, vice president; Theodore Jacoby, secretary; John O. Bonorth, treasurer; F. C. Robinson, commissioner.

Youngston, pastor of the Rose City Methodist church of Portland, was notified Wednesday by Most Eminent Commander Lee Smith of Pittsburgh, Pa., of his appointment as very eminent grand prelate of the grand encampment of the United States of Knights Templar, which meets in Los Angeles June 19.

The announcement was made at the session of the grand lodge of the A. F. and A. M. Wednesday afternoon and occasioned applause. This is the first time Oregon has been honored with an officer in the grand encampment.

Rev. Mr. Youngston is an old personal friend of Mr. Smith. He is past grand chaplain of the grand lodge A. F. and A. M. of New Jersey, and is at present prelate of Washington commandery No. 17, Knights Templar, Portland.

MOORE CHAIRMAN OF CENTRAL COMMITTEE, IS DECISION OF WELLS

Following Conference With Insurance Commissioner Announcement Is Made.

Salem, Ore., June 8.—Charles B. Moore, of Portland, following a conference with Harvey Wells here Wednesday, said he would call a meeting of the Republican state central committee at some future date.

A question as to who should call the meeting was raised some time ago, some insisting that Wells should call it inasmuch as Moore had resigned as chairman when he announced himself a candidate for secretary of state.

Wells term as treasurer will expire when the new committee meets and he said Wednesday that he had never authorized anyone to say that he was seeking reelection. He declared he believed the honor and hard work accompanying it should go to someone else.

Interchange of Service Asked.

Salem, Ore., June 8.—Asserting that the defendant has refused an interchange of service and traffic at Tillamook and that it forwards telegraph messages received over its lines for delivery to patrons on the plaintiff's lines by mail, thereby causing great delay and inconvenience, the Tillamook County Mutual Telephone company filed a complaint against the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company before the public service commission Wednesday. An interchange of service is asked.

Tentative Governor's Program.

Salem, Ore., June 8.—As secretary of the Western Governors' conference, to be held at Salt Lake City June 26, Governor Withycombe has the program about arranged. The tentative program includes the following: Address of welcome, Governor Spry of Utah; response, Governor Lister, of Washington; report of the conference, Public Lands and Water Power, Governor Boyce, of Nevada; "State and Federal Aid in Land Settlement," Governor Carlson, of Colorado; "State Administrative Problems," Governor Hunt, of Arizona; "The West and Its Water Power," former Governor Hawley, of Idaho; "Practical Preparedness for the Pacific Northwest," Governor Withycombe, of Oregon.

Several of the governors attending the Western Governors' conference will also give addresses at the National Governors' conference to be held in Salt Lake at the same time.

Taxpayers' Committee Meets.

Tooze Must Share Prize With Humbert

Judges Upon Reconsideration Arrive at New Conclusions Relating to Oratorical Prize Winners at University.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Ore., June 8.—That Lamar Toozee and Cleveland Simpkins, both of Salem, are probably not entitled to a clear title on the prizes they won in the Failing and Beckman orations developed when the provisions of the deed of gift were reviewed. The judges who gave Toozee first prize of \$150 and Simpkins second prize of \$100, made the awards on the method of summation of ranks. Investigation revealed that this method, which has been used for years, was probably not intended in the bequest. According to the method used Harold Humbert received third ranking, but according to the majority method he received first, Lamar Toozee second and Cleveland Simpkins third.

It was later decided that Humbert and Toozee share the honors of first place while Cleveland Simpkins take third place. A new division of the awards will be made.

Harold Humbert's oration was on "Behold the Man."

No motive for the crime is known, there being no signs of attempted robbery.

Street Car Employees Want Higher Wages

San Francisco, June 8.—(P. N. S.)—Representatives of the municipal street car men's union called on Mayor James Rolph Jr. yesterday with a formal request for higher wages. They asked the increase in friendly

spirit and sought the cooperation of the mayor in their cause. The car men ask a raise of 40 cents a day, giving them \$3.40 pay for an eight hour working day. This would mean a flat rate of 42½ cents an hour.

At the present time municipal car men are receiving \$3 a day, the minimum wage for municipal employees fixed by the charter.

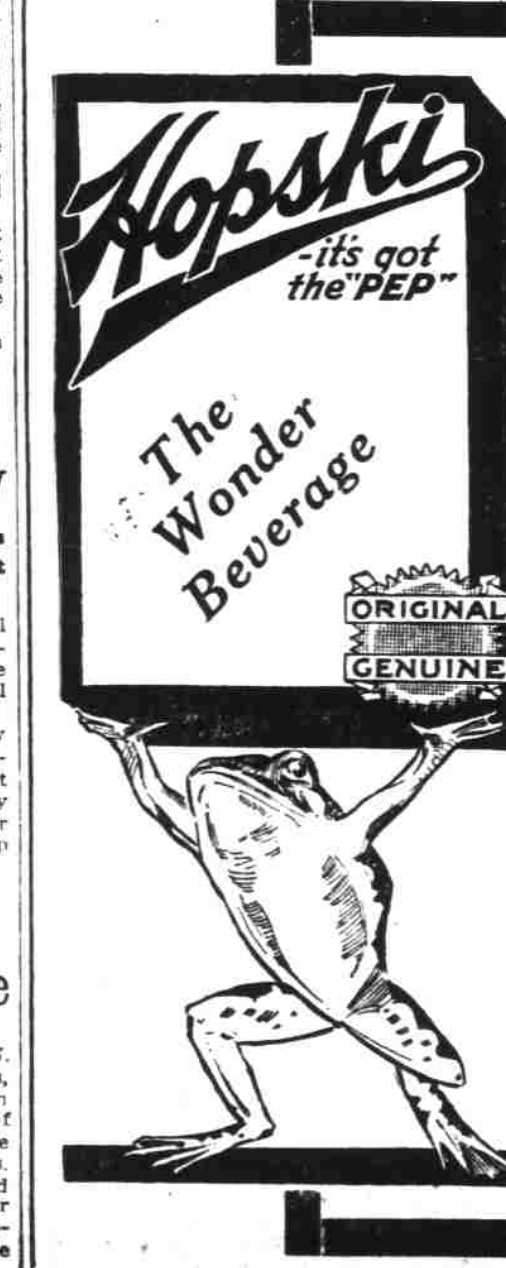
