

Spectators by Thousands Visit and Admire the City's Exhibit of Roses

ROSE SHOW THROWS ADMIRE BEAUTIES OF FLOWER AND FOLIAGE

Second and Last Day of Exhibition Draws Enormous Crowds of Visitors.

ROSES OF HIGH QUALITY

Gorgeous Display of Testouts Among Wonders, With Rarer Blooms of Shapeliness and Perfume.

The second and last day of the annual exhibition of the Portland Rose society in Meier & Frank's store opened this morning with hundreds of people clamoring for entrance when the store opened at 9 o'clock. Catalogues on the back of which are blank headed "Roses That I Most Admire" are being made good use of by the eager and enthusiastic spectators. A notable feature of the exhibition is the high grade of roses shown by amateurs. In past years many ordinary roses were shown in the amateur classes, but this year they are exceptional.

Exhibit of High Class.
There are 198 exhibitors and each exhibitor has an average of 10 entries. The entire exhibit is of high quality, the heavy rains and cold weather of the winter having destroyed many of the insects and contributing toward unusually fine foliage. Each year sees additional interest and new members in the society, with the result that this year's show is the finest yet held. Much credit is due E. B. McFarland for his excellent management of the exhibition, the best a total lack of confusion in making entries and in the judging.

Testout Table Attracts.
The society is also greatly indebted to Meier & Frank company for the spacious room arranged for the display, many people having remarked upon the pleasing staging. One long table devoted entirely to displaying Caroline Testouts is one of the great attractions of the show. The climbing roses, of which there is a goodly display, are also of interest to people with gardens.

about a magnificent floral float that stifles expression of admiration. And so the passing of bank after bank of roses, of greenery, and of all the bright hued flowers of the season brought forth a continuous chorus of "ahs" and "ohs" from the crowds this afternoon.

They fairly gasped before the terrific beauty of each entry—gaped in admiration and then recovering as the vehicle passed, burst forth into cheers and applause.

Rose Display Predominates.
Roses of course predominated, for this is the Rose City and this is the Rose Festival, and there were roses without number.

Overcast skies melted away before the warmth of color and the passing of the pageant left a lingering perfume hanging over the pavements, a faint odor of roses distilled by the breeze.

Fire engines covered with blankets of roses lost their workaday identity and retained only their form.

Pleasure seats covered with greens and flowers even lost all semblance to an automobile.

Rose garlanded horses gave the horse vehicle and riding horse sections of the pageant all the splendor of some triumphal fete.

Before the magic of floral decoration the usual pestiferous attributes of the motorcade seemed to disappear. It was a pageant of flowers and pageant of wonders, for the flowers worked wonders.

Portland's annual floral parade was grander and more beautiful than ever before.

CITY CARS, FLOATS ARE PROMINENT IN PAGEANT OF ROSES

While privately-owned automobiles and horse-drawn vehicles made up the larger portion of the parade, the city's departments, local, civic organizations, schools and fraternal societies were well represented by floats and machines.

The fire bureau alone had 15 machines and horse-drawn pieces of apparatus in the parade. Chief Powell's machine led the division. Roses and green foliage made up the decorations on most of the rigs.

The department of public utilities had a huge float descriptive of the work of the water, street cleaning and garbage incinerator bureau. This float occasioned surprise owing to the color scheme and the arrangement of details. The city commissioners rode in a tastefully decorated machine.

Several pretty cars representing the high schools made up an attractive division of the parade. The cars were decorated with the school colors and filled with students.

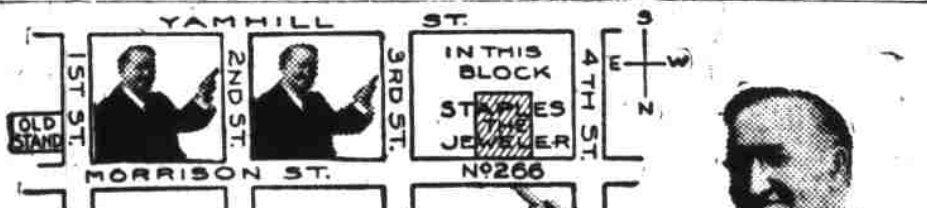

Strike Forces Coos Bay Mills to Close

One Already Shuts Down and Managers of Others Say They Will Be Forced to Follow Soon.

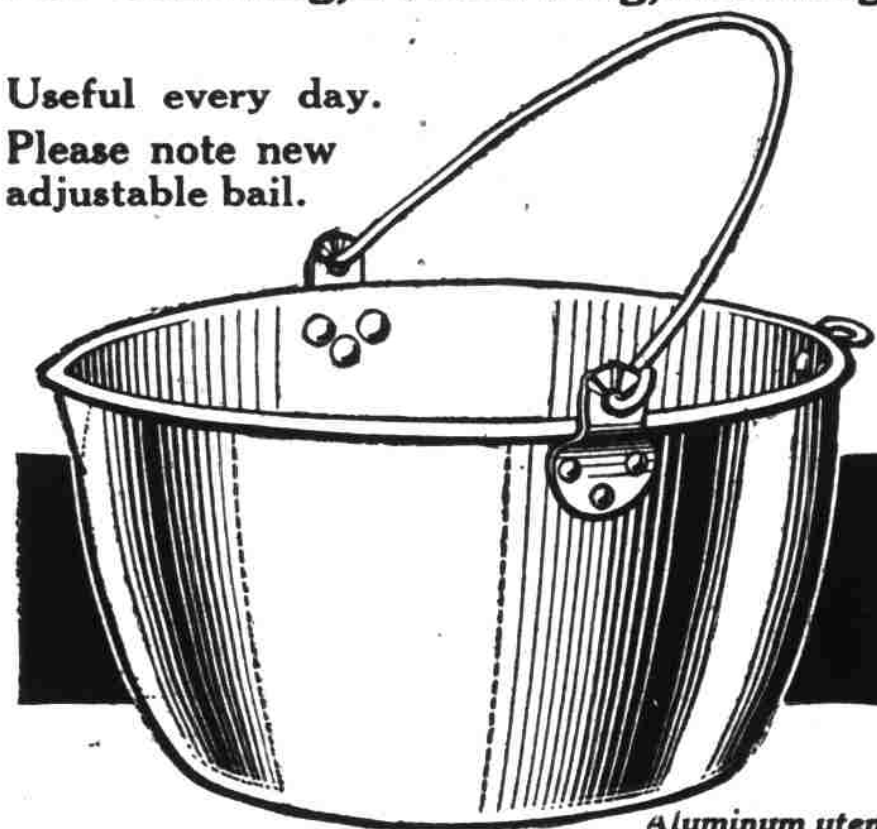
Marshfield, Or., June 7.—The longshoremen's strike on Coos Bay is looming as a serious problem and unless relieved at once will have the effect of closing down all the North Bend mills. One, the Bushner mill at Porter, suspended last night until it can obtain vessels to transport the lumber now congested on its docks. George Stephenson, manager of the North Bend Mill and Lumber company, said his concern will have to close today for a week at least, and perhaps longer. The shingle mill has an accumulation of lumber that will occupy its docks by Saturday night and the Kruse & Banks shipyard will also be affected, since it will be able to obtain no lumber by Saturday night. The steam schooner Yellowstone is still in port and freight has been discharged from her.
