

CHILDREN'S DAY TO BE OBSERVED IN A BECOMING MANNER

Most of Sabbath Schools of the Land Will Hold Programs Tomorrow.

TO ASSIST THE MISSIONS

Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America Asks Financial Aid for War Victims.

Tomorrow is "Children's Day" in most of the Sabbath schools in the land and it will be the biggest day of the year in the hearts of many of the little folks.

Special exercises will be held in many of the local churches. These exercises will contain a missionary strain as the offering on this day goes toward the mission fund.

The federal council of the Churches of Christ in America with headquarters in New York has sent out a request asking the Sunday schools of the land to give their offerings tomorrow to the war relief funds for disease, starvation and suffering.

Dr. Charles J. MacFarland, general secretary of the federal council, says in part: "Children's Sunday comes in June. What more fitting disposition could the children of America make of their offering than to send it to their little brothers and sisters of Armenia, Albania, Belgium and Poland?"

"Do you realize," he added, "that the children in those stricken lands are hungry and half naked and cold; that the little rags in which they are clad are in that condition because their homes and means of cleanliness have been destroyed; that this and the lack of food exposes them to disease and death; that children, pitifully thin little girls and boys, are dying by the thousand in hovels, beneath rocks, on mountainsides, huddled in the ruins of once beautiful homes?"

"No stronger foundation could be laid for peace in the world than the generation in all lands that save for American children to save the lives of the suffering children of all nations now."

Children's Day will be observed in the First Congregational church Sunday at 11 a. m. A program of music and exercises will be given by the beginners' and primary departments under the leadership of their superintendents, Miss Helen Bates and Miss Alice Dyott.

METHODIST PAGEANT WILL SHOW HISTORY OF RELIGIOUS MOVE

Lincoln High School to Be the Scene of Elaborate Staging of Narration.

The young people of the Methodist churches of Portland will repeat their pageant of Methodism next Sunday evening in Lincoln high school at 8 o'clock. About 120 are in the cast, not including the chorus and orchestra, also taken from the churches.

The production is a history of the church since the days of John Wesley, its founder, and in quick narration shows the principal events in the church history during the 209 years of its existence.

The pageant is called a history of the Methodist church, but in depicting the life history of this church it has detected the history of other Protestant churches. The only characteristic about the pageant purely Methodist is the names of the characters which the players assume.

The pageant is divided into four episodes and 18 movements. In the first episode the home of Samuel and Susannah Wesley is burned by neighbors because they object to the teachings of Wesley. Hardships encountered in other parts of England are also shown.

The second episode depicts the beginning of Methodism in America and brings forth Barbara Heck, Philip Emory, Francis Asbury and Sophia Cook. These people organize churches and Sunday schools among the colonists, preach in opposition to card playing and finally send missionaries to the Indians.

The closing episode shows the hardships endured by the early circuit riders, closing with a humorous recitation of a "missionary barrel" by a frontier preacher.

The closing movement shows the magnitude to which the church has grown and brings forth the many different departments which it is now supporting.

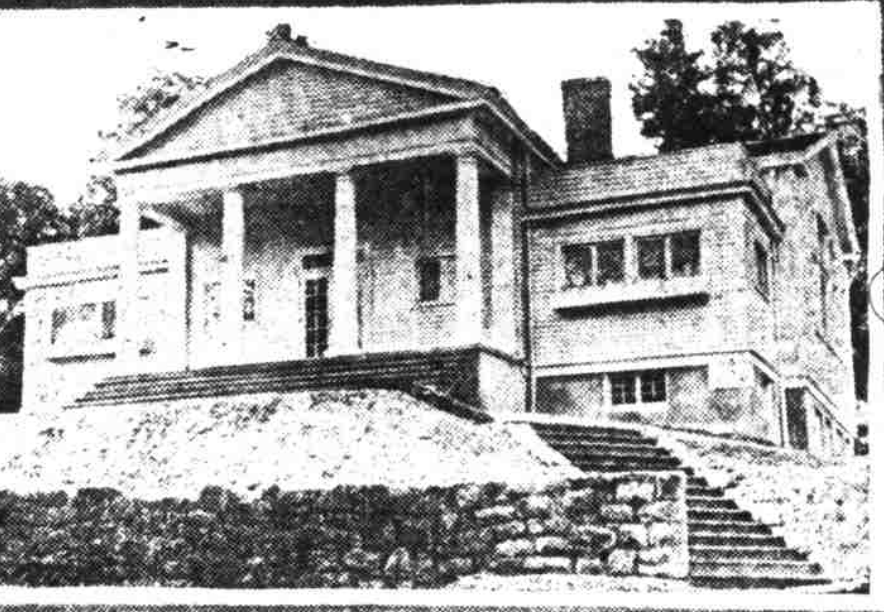
