FLORAL DESIGN PRETTY

Blue Larkspur Formed Basis for Color
Decorations; Event Long to
Be Remembered.

Figuring prominently among the events of the Rose Festival were the many lightening excursions up the Columbia River highway, which in many cases terminated in a dinner or luncheon at Mrs. Henderson's Crown Point Chalet. On Wednesday, when the highway was officially dedicated, a continuous string of cars motored along the road. For the officers of the U. S. navy who were in the city for the occasion a dinner was arranged at Crown Point Chalet, which will be long remembered and heralded in many cities by the visitors among the many assets and glories of the highway. The table was cleverly decorated with small, blue lined, toy battleships rocking in rough seas of blue silk. The vivid blue larkspur, which are now blooming along the highway, formed the floral decorations of the table and about the rooms of the chalet. In the hall room great clusters of the flowers were arranged with vine maple and other greenery from the woods and in the dining room below, clusters of the flowers centered the table and were arranged in hanging baskets overhead.

The visitors' table was set on the upper porch, off the hall room, which has been enclosed in glass this year, and gives a marvelous view up and down the Columbia gorge, which was enjoyed along with the famous chicken dinner.

Piano Manufacturer Found Dead in Pool

John Valentine Steger, Multi-Millionaire, Believed to Be Victim of Heart Failure; Fell in Gold Fish Tank.

Chicago, June 12.—(I. N. S.)—John Valentine Steger, self-made multi-millionaire, died suddenly and inexplicably Sunday in the deep water of his piano factory's reservoir. He was in the Illinois town he built and named after himself.

His body was found yesterday floating on the surface of 4 feet of water which fills to the brim a concrete tank he had installed as fire protection for his big plant. Around it swam hundreds of gold fish he had put there to amuse his grandchildren and out of the banks of the pool as evidence of his accidental death, were a half smoked cigar and a paper bag full of bread for the fish he had come to feed.

Railroad Talk Is Thing in Harney

O. S. L. Expects to Have Trains Operating to Crane Creek Station Next Week; Half Way to Bend.

Harrisburg, Or., June 12.—The Oregon Short Line, which is operating the Oregon & Eastern railroad, expects to start operating trains as far as Crane Creek station next week. Crane Creek station is about half way between Riverside and Bend, the proposed terminus of the road in Harney county.

C. H. Ross, of Chicago, a railroad builder, announced that he is ready to build a line from Bend to Burns, and it is up to the people of Burns to show him if they will meet his demands.

The Strathorn railroad surveyors working east from Bend are now in Harney county at the Gap ranch, near Silver creek. It is reported that Mr. Strathorn will be in the county in the near future.

NORMAN MACK ASKS WHAT HUGHES MEANS BY 'ULTERIOR PURPOSE'

How Would Republican Do Differently From Wilson, How Better Things?

St. Louis, Mo., June 12.—(I. N. S.)—Norman E. Mack, Democratic national committeeman for New York, today attacked the position of Justice Hughes in his statement of acceptance and put several questions to the Republican nominee.

Here are Mr. Mack's first two questions to Justice Hughes:

"What would you do differently?"

"How would you run things better than President Wilson has done?"

"Mr. Hughes," Mack continues, "says that he stands for an Americanism that knows no ulterior purpose, for a patriotism that is single and complete; but Mr. Hughes, on the other hand, was the pet candidate of those who put their nativity before their Americanism."

Then Mr. Mack asks a few more questions:

"Were these elements mistaken when they denounced President Wilson and approved the candidacy of Justice Hughes?"

"Which is his sincere attitude? His silence when these elements were begging him for the nomination or his approval of complete patriotism now that the nomination has been achieved?"

"What does he imply or charge when he says that he stands for 'An Americanism that knows no ulterior purpose'?"

"Whom does he accuse of ulterior purpose?"

"Is he sitting at President Wilson or ex-President Roosevelt? What would Mr. Hughes do to maintain the rights of American citizens that the president has not done?"

"Would he declare war on Germany or England or both?"

"Would he intervene in Mexico?"

Ash Swale Resident Near Century Mark

Nathan Burson Is Linn County's Oldest Citizen and Next Thursday Will Celebrate One Hundredth Birthday.

Albany, Or., June 12.—Nathan Burson, of Ash Swale, Linn county's oldest citizen, next Thursday, June 15, he will be 100 years old. He resides with his son, Nathan Jr. He has a son residing in Arkansas who is practicing dentistry at the age of 80, by 19 years old when married the first time. His last wife died three years ago at the age of 83 years.

DAMAGE SUIT AGAINST SOUTHERN PACIFIC IS ON TRIAL AT EUGENE

F. W. Treanor Wants \$7500
for Death of Daughter in
an Accident at Creswell,

Eugene, Or., June 12.—The trial of one of the four cases against the Southern Pacific company for damages growing out of the accident that occurred a year ago last April at Creswell, in which four children and one man, Frank Sly, were killed when the Shasta limited train of the Southern Pacific collided with an automobile, started in circuit here Saturday.

This is the case brought by F. W. Treanor, who seeks \$7500 damages on account of the death of his little daughter, Doris. Each of the other plaintiffs seek \$7500 damages.

New Jail Recommended.

Eugene, Or., June 12.—The Lane county circuit court, after having examined the county buildings, fore adjourning yesterday afternoon recommended to the circuit court that slight alterations be made in the county jail, but aside from that, advised no changes in the building, recommending that a new and modern jail be erected as soon as the finances of the county are in better condition.

School Election June 19.

Eugene, Or., June 12.—The school election in Eugene will be held June 19, H. O. Bowen, manager of the Eugene branch of the wholesale firm of Allen & Lewis of Portland is a candidate to succeed E. U. Lee, whose term will expire and who says he will not seek reelection. Duane Campbell may be another candidate.

**Starting Fund for
Davenport Memorial**

Silverton, Or., Commercial Organizations Will Undertake to Put Up Suitable Monument for Noted Cartoonist.

Salem, Or., June 12.—An effort to raise a fund to erect a suitable monument to Homer Davenport, the great cartoonist, who is buried at Silverton, is being launched by a number of commercial organizations of Silverton.

Plans have not been definitely formed as to the methods to be followed in raising \$2000 necessary to secure the monument desired, but the people of Oregon and friends of the cartoonist from outside the state will probably be asked to contribute. The grave is marked by only a wooden board bearing the name and dates of birth and death.

A previous effort of friends of Davenport to secure a suitable monument by popular subscription, was not successful.

Big Property Trade Is Made at Roseburg

W. A. Taylor Gives City Block, Five Dwellings and Interest Bearing Securities for Ranch of A. J. Warnock.

Roseburg, Or., June 12.—One of the largest realty deals in Douglas county for some time was made Saturday, when W. A. Taylor of Roseburg traded his building, known as the Taylor and Wilson block, together with five dwellings in Roseburg and some interest bearing securities, for the Warnock ranch belonging to A. J. Warnock, near Norton, in Lincoln county. Mr. Taylor secured 135 head of cattle, 400 head of sheep and 500 head of horses, which consists of about 1400 acres. The consideration in each case was about \$60,000. Mr. Taylor, who has been a resident of Douglas county for many years, will remove to his new ranch, while Mr. Warnock will make Roseburg his future home.

Man Drowns When Launch Is Capsized

Unable to Swim, Portland Resident Loses Life in Willamette Near Foot of Falls at Oregon City.

Oregon City, Or., June 12.—Unable to swim, Harold Gladden, a clerk residing at 607 Belmont street, Portland, drowned here last night when a launch in which he and three friends from Portland, a young man and two girls, were riding capsized, in the Willamette river near the foot of the falls. The other three managed to reach shore safely.

SENATE TO CONSIDER BILL TO PLACE LIMIT ON CAMPAIGN COSTS

Provides Only \$50,000 Can Be Spent in Nominating a Presidential Candidate.

VICE PRESIDENT, \$25,000

Senators Limited to \$5000 and Representatives \$2500; Corporation Contributions Are Also Prohibited.

Washington, June 12.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Fifty thousand dollars is enough to be spent in trying to nominate a candidate for president, and half that sum is plenty for an aspirant for a vice-presidential nomination. Thus thinks the senate committee on privileges and elections, which has reported a bill amending the federal campaign publicity act.

It is provided that no expenditure shall be made by a political committee or personal campaign committee or by any member thereof, except "under the direction and with the consent of such candidate, and every such candidate shall be charged with the responsibility of keeping all such disbursements within the aggregate fixed by law."

When Candidate Denies Candidacy.

If this bill were a law, how would it affect such campaigns as the one

waged in behalf of Justice Hughes? This is a question the bill seemingly does not answer. Would the friends of a candidate who declares he is not a candidate be outside the restrictions imposed upon those who frankly avow themselves as candidates?

Would such a candidate, declaring himself not a candidate, but made a candidate under state law, as in Oregon, be thus brought under the act, so that no expenditure could be made by his supporters except "under the direction and with the consent of such candidate"? These are questions the future will be left to answer, if the present bill becomes a law.

Drinks and Cigars Taboo.

Under this bill no money can be spent for hiring speakers or "workers," and such things as cigars, drinks and dinners are tabooed in connection with a campaign for choosing a president, vice-president or a member of either house of congress. Money may be spent only for the following purposes:

Traveling expenses and subsistence of the candidate and of members of political committees and their bona fide officers and assistants; fees for placing names upon the ballot; hire of clerks and stenographers; addressing, preparing and mailing literature; telephone and telegraph tolls; postage, freight and express charges; printing and stationery; procuring and formulating lists of voters; headquarters of office rent; newspaper and other advertising; renting of halls and expenses incident to such meetings.

The Limit of Expenditures.

The limit of expenditure by an individual in aid of a candidate is placed at \$5000, corporation contributions being forbidden. Candidates for the senate are limited to \$2500 and for representative in congress to \$2500, but this limitation is largely on paper, since the candidate is not required to include in this expense the cost of travel, subsistence, telegraph and telephone tolls, postage, freight, advertising and circulars. He is, however, required to file a memorandum showing how much he has spent for advertising

MEETING CALLED TO CONSIDER RECALL OF POLK COMMISSIONER

C. W. Beckett Held by Some to Be Partly Responsible for Road Contracts.

COUNTY JUDGE WAS ILL

Proposed \$30,000 Improvement Was Cause of Recent Injunction Action Which Was Not Sustained.

Dallas, Or., June 12.—A joint meeting of the recently organized Taxpayers' league and the Polk County Farmers' union has been called for this city on June 15 to take action looking to the recall of County Commissioner C. W. Beckett. Commissioners Beckett and Wells are held responsible by the advocates of the recall for letting contracts for road and bridge improvements at Independence aggregating \$30,000, which was recently the object of an injunction suit in the circuit court.

Judge Belt having refused to grant an injunction to restrain the work, it is now proposed to attempt the recall of Beckett. Mr. Wells is not included in the movement, as he was defeated for re-nomination at the recent primaries. County Judge J. B. Teal was ill at the time the Independence contracts were let, consequently he is not included in the recall.

Portland Man Given Contract for Mains

C. E. Bado to Lay Four and Half Miles Connecting Winchester With Roseburg; 16-inch Mains to Replace Old.

Roseburg, Or., June 12.—The Douglas County Light & Water company has awarded the contract for four and one-half miles of new water mains from Roseburg to Winchester, to C. E. Bado, a Portland contractor. The new mains will be 16 inch and will replace the present 12-inch mains from the Winchester plant to Roseburg, which were installed a number of years ago.

Auto Line Replaces Train.

Roseburg, Or., June 12.—With the discontinuance of train No. 63 of the S. P. lines, there is no train service south of Roseburg in the afternoon, and in consequence the demand for some service has caused the Grant-Riddle garage at Riddle to put on an automobile line, which will leave Roseburg at 6 o'clock each evening, and carry passengers to points as far south as Riddle.

Alleged Bootlegger Arrested.

Roseburg, Or., June 12.—Deputy Sheriff Holland arrived in Roseburg on Saturday with Jack Elsbay of Reedsport, who was arrested on a charge of violating the prohibition law. He was indicted on two charges by the grand jury recently, but the indictments were not made public until the arrest of Elsbay.
