First Battle With Beavers on Their Home Grounds Is Scheduled This Afternoon.

MCREDIE TAKES COURAGE

Portland Manager Very Enthusiastic Over Showing of His Players During Past Two Weeks.

Ham Patterson and his band of Pacific Coast League leaders will be the opponents of Boss Walter McCredie's Beavers in a six game series here this week. The first battle is scheduled for this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

The Beavers have topped two series in a row and it would not be surprising to see them give the Vernonites a hard run for the long end of the series. Allen Sotheron, who has been pitching brilliant ball of late, will face the visitors today, and opposing him will be either Otto Hess or Art Fromme.

Manager McCredie is very enthusiastic over the showing his players have made during the last two weeks and he expects them to push the mark before they go on the road for a three weeks' trip, opening at San Francisco with the Seals July 4.

Following the Vernon series, the Beavers will face the Salt Lake, and Judge McCredie plans to schedule one or two of the postponed games with Cliff Blankenship's team during that week. The Los Angeles team will make its second appearance here after the Salt Lake series.

The Portland twirling staff has been showing up in great style and when Grover Lowdermilk, the American association wonder of a couple of seasons ago, joins the team, Mac believes he will have a staff as strong as any in the league. Great things are expected of Billy Williams, the O. A. A. star. Rodgers' presence in the Beaver infield has added a lot of pep to the squad, which has added materially to the team's spirit. The players are hitting the ball on the nose, even Chuck Ward having climbed up a number of points during the last two series.

According to advices received, Manager Blankenship is not entirely pleased with Billy Larry's playing in the short field and he plans to replace him with a major leaguer. Blankenship has wired an offer to Dolly Stark, the former Sacramento shortstop, who has recently been released as manager of the Memphis team of the Southern league.

Eddie Herr, scout of the St. Louis American, is expected to meet the team in the near future, probably this week end. At present he is seeking in the Northwestern league and is paying particular attention to Gislason, the hard hitting second baseman of the Spokane Indians.

When the Salt Lake team opens here a week from today Frank Guigni, former Portland Out player, will be with the Beavers. He is expected to turn him in a trade with Seattle, turning over Eldred for him.

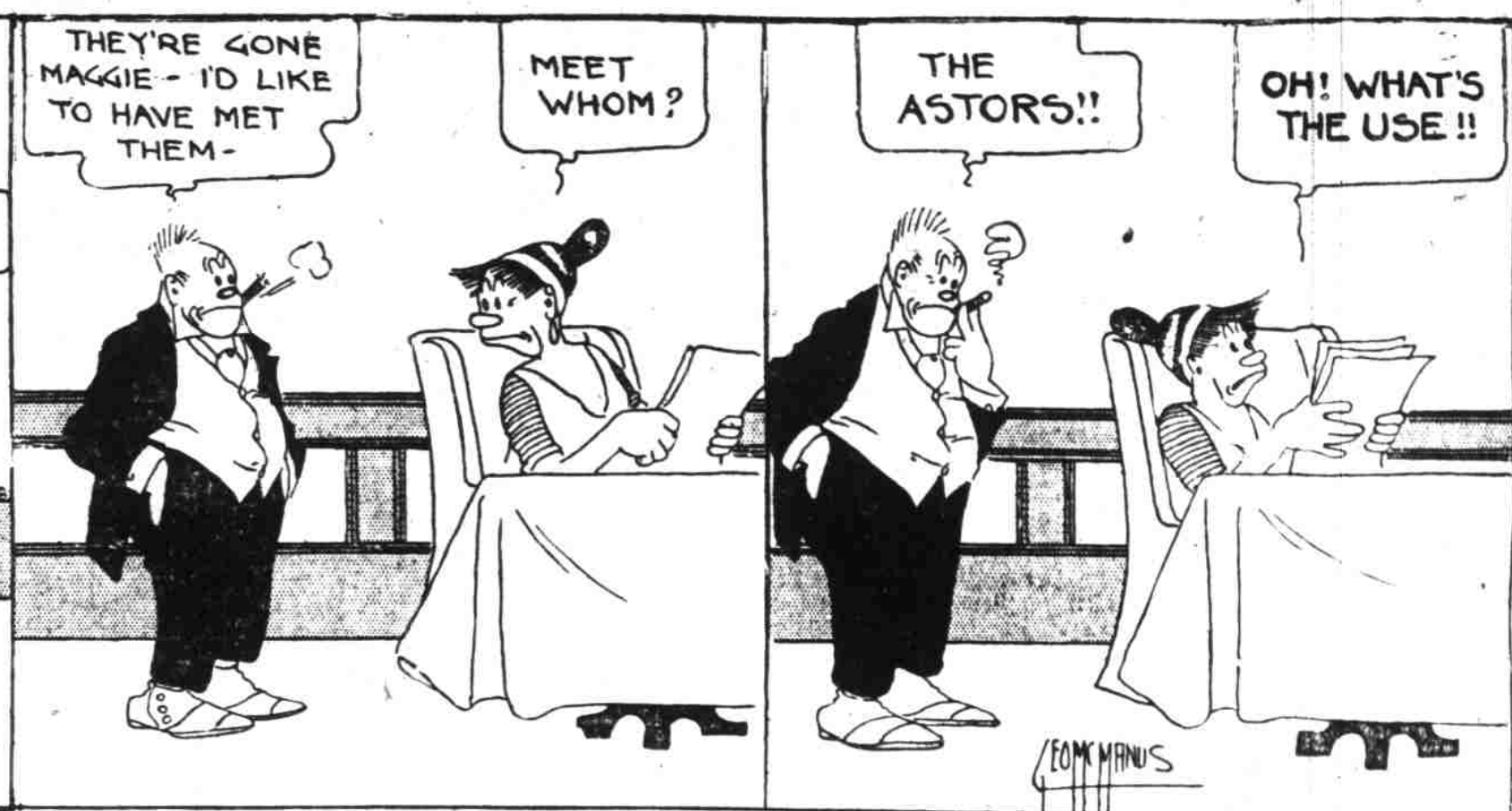
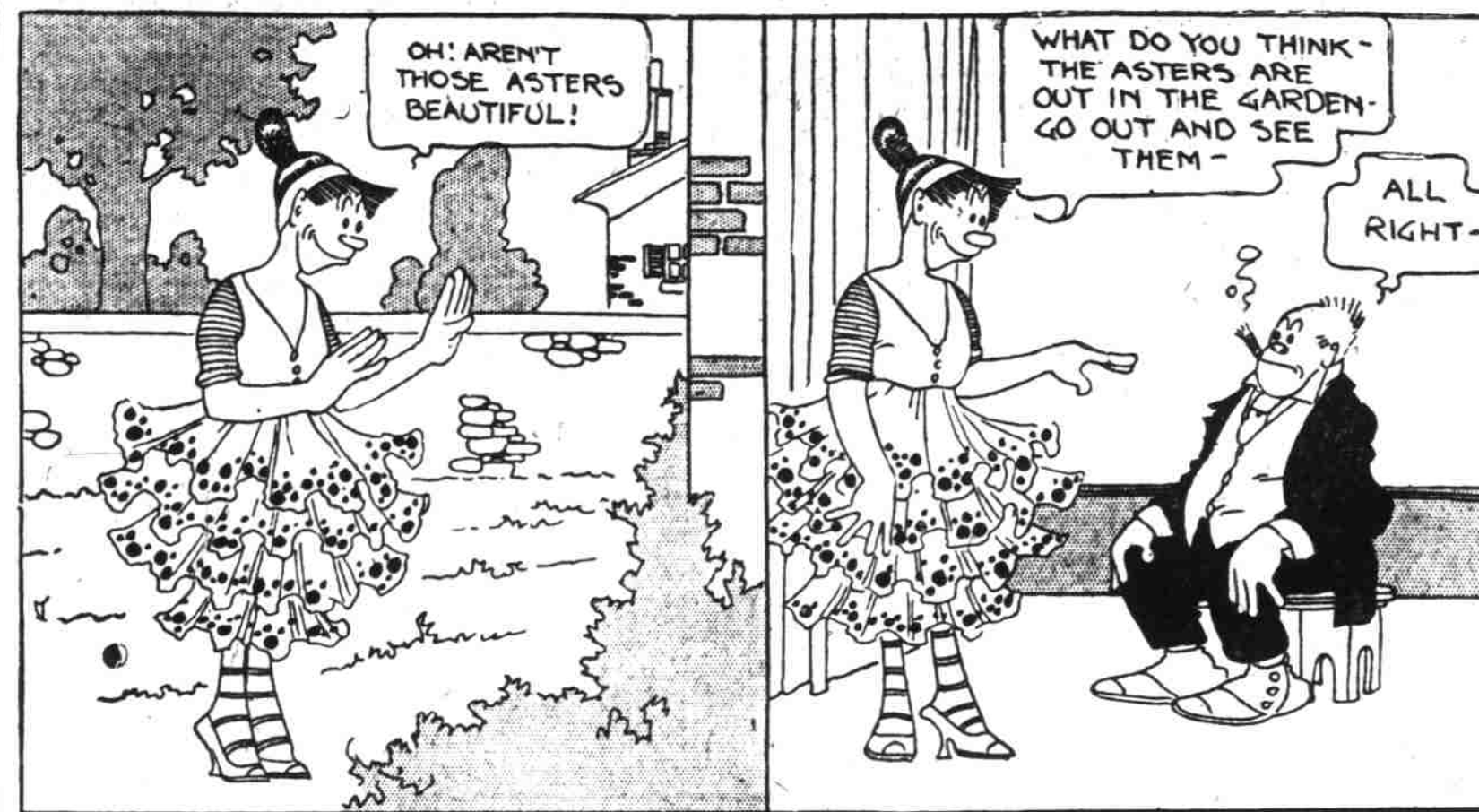
