

STOCKYARDS VISITED BY GROWERS FROM CLACKAMAS COUNTY

Excursion Proves of Great Benefit to Men Interested in Industry.

LUNCHEON IS FEATURE

President Daugherty Welcomes Delegation; C. C. Colt and Grant Dimick Among Speakers.

Another pillar was added to the foundation of the livestock industry in Oregon yesterday by the visit of 250 excursionists of Clackamas county to the Union stockyards. The Willamette Valley Southern granted a one and one-third fare rate and representative livestock growers from its territory took that means of visiting the stockyards and inspecting the methods employed there. The result was to cement a closer relation between the grower and the packer through a mutual understanding.

In the past the growers have not been able to understand why one car load from their territory would bring a higher price than another. They did not understand the method of classifications and weighing.

Plant Is Inspected.

The morning was spent in inspecting the plant of the Union stockyards and studying its methods of classification. They were shown the reason why tops bring a higher price than skips and studied the methods used in making their products bring a higher price.

After the inspection of the plant a luncheon was served in honor of the excursionists, at which informal talks were given by business men and those interested in the livestock industry.

President Daugherty, of the Union stock yards welcomed the visitors and was followed by E. E. Paville, of the Western Farmer. Mr. Paville congratulated the visitors on coming to learn more about their business and said that a new era had been opened by their visit. He advised those gathered to apply the knowledge gained to their own uses after their return.

Benefits Are Shown.

Professor Cogan, of Washington State college, next responded to the call of the tourmaster by saying that there were two ends to be gained by the visit of the growers. In the first place they would gain information and use it to better themselves and the industry. In the second place, confidence would be established in the packers and both would work to a mutual end.

C. C. Colt, president of the Union Meat company and the Chamber of Commerce, gave a brief review of the livestock industry in Oregon and stated that Portland was now one of the large markets of the country. Its output has increased over 300 per cent in the last few years and its products now go to nearly all the markets of the world. The end toward which both grower and packer must work is to create a large market and a heavy demand.

Mr. Colt told the visitors that the packers could not do business without them and the growers need the packers. Therefore both should work for a mutual understanding and co-operation.

P. C. Maris advised a closer relation between the grower and packer. He said it would result in benefits to both. Mr. Maris characterized Judge Dimick, of the Willamette Valley Southern, as "the Jim Hill of Oregon." He said that Mr. Dimick had made the excursion possible and in this way had promoted the interests of all concerned.

Judge Dimick Speaks.

Judge Dimick spoke in behalf of better stock through better feeding processes and better soil. He called attention to the livestock show to be held from December 4th to 9th, and asked all to be present at that gathering.

Other speakers who responded with short addresses were: O. M. Plummer and C. M. McAllister, of the stock yards; and C. E. Spence. The visitors returned to their homes at 3:45 o'clock, voting their appreciation of their chance to visit the yards and looking into their business with a new enthusiasm.

Section Hands Sue Railroad for \$455

The result was the bunk car was demolished and the laborers lost their effects.

Demurrer Entered in Public Market Suit

City Raises Three Points in Action Brought by the I. O. G. T. Hall Association to Clear Yamhill Street.

A demurrer has been filed by the city attorney to the suit brought by the I. O. G. T. Hall association against the city for the removal of the public market of Yamhill street between Third and Second on the ground that it is a nuisance and interferes with the property leased by the association.

Three points are raised in the demurrer, namely: That the court has no jurisdiction of the person of the defendant or of the subject of the suit; that the complaint does not state facts sufficient to constitute a cause of suit; that the complaint has a defect of parties defendant in that the property owners, lessees and tenants of property abutting upon Yamhill street are not made defendants.
