

CLACKAMAS COUNTY IS A DISTRICT OF NOTABLE EXTREMES

County Seat Next to the Oldest Municipality in State of Oregon.

TIMBER AREAS ARE VAST

Section Rich in Agricultural Resources; Big Mills at Oregon City Employ Hundreds of Workers.

Oregon City, Or., June 15.—Clackamas county is a county of paradoxes and extremes. It has for its county seat the oldest municipality in the state excepting Astoria, which was founded as a trading post by John Jacob Astor 25 years or more before Dr. John McLoughlin started Oregon City, in 1827. The altitude of Oregon City is only 152 feet above sea level while the altitude at the highest point of its eastern boundary line—the summit of Mt. Hood—is 11,225 feet, which is the highest point in Oregon. Though it was the first county to be settled and though it is the home of the first Masonic lodge in the west, Multnomah lodge No. 1, A. F. and A. M., which was founded in 1846, though it was the first capital of Oregon territory and at one time metropolis of Oregon, though the first church built in Oregon was built here, yet today it has some of the most inaccessible, most untraveled and most unexplored territory in the state. From Siskiyou on up through the Tule, the past, the future, the lake and the swamp to Bull Run lake, the hunter, camper, packer, prospector or fisherman will find country wild enough and rough enough to satisfy the most exacting lover of the rugged and picturesque.

Forest District Extensive.
The western third of the county is a district of great fertility and productivity, while the eastern two-thirds of the county is a district of rugged peaks, deep ravines, heavy forests, a district traversed by forest trails and a land that is the out-of-doors man's delight.

Nearly one half of Clackamas county's 1864 square miles of area is embraced within the national forest. The lands along the Clackamas, Molalla, Tualatin, Sandy, Pudding rivers and the Willamette are as rich as any lands in the state. Of the county's total area of 1,192,360 acres less than 100,000 acres are farmed. The remaining fact that less than 10 per cent of the county's area is in cultivation the county outranks every other county in the state in the production of several important crops. It ranks first in strawberries, grapes, quinces, clover, potatoes and mountain peaks. Only one county in the state outranks it in cherries. It ranks third of all the counties in blackberries, fourth in apples, pears, pines and raspberries and fifth in hunes and walnuts.

Manufacturing Future Great.
Eventually Oregon City will be a great manufacturing city. We will have mills here to utilize the waste of the sawmill industry and to convert what is now wasted into clothes, pins, chopping bowls, wooden spoons and a hundred other smaller wooden articles. He will have flour mills and shipyards. We will have shoe factories to turn over Oregon hides into the finished product of belts, shoes, etc. We will have scores of factories here at the falls of the Willamette. The reason why the ultimate destiny of Oregon City is to be a manufacturing city is obvious. It has an abundance of undeveloped water power.

It has already developed the falls of the Willamette and on the Clackamas river 36,995 horsepower. At Oregon City, Estacada and Cazadero we are turning the Willamette and the Clackamas rivers into one end of an iron pipe and are turning out light and power at the other end to light Portland and to run its factories and elevators and the Willamette and Clackamas rivers have plenty more power undeveloped and unused.

Clackamas county has sixteen billion feet of timber, most one half of which is in private ownership. Most of this is a fine grade of fir though there is considerable larch and cedar on the western slopes of the mountains.

Oak, ash and maple are abundant on the lowlands so that this one resource means the employment of a large force of workmen for many years to convert the timber into lumber.

Hundreds Are Employed.
Stand at the eastern approach of the bridge at Oregon City at quitting time of an evening and you will see a solid stream of workmen coming across the bridge from the paper mills on the western bank of the Willamette. One of these mills has the distinction of being one of the largest paper mills in the west. The paper mills and the woolen mill make Oregon City a "lunch pail" town and a lunch pail brigade means much toward the permanent stability of a community.

Clackamas county spends approximately a quarter of a million dollars a year on its roads and highways. Its assessed valuation is \$28,228,689. It is almost easier to say what it does not produce than what it does. Its principal products are power, paper, potatoes, pioneers, poets, lumber, woolen goods, clover, butter, flour and fish. The annual value of the output of its paper mills is about \$1,000,000. Clover, grain and hay brings in about \$1,500,000 a year. Potatoes, \$500,000; butter, \$300,000; wool, \$50,000; chickens and eggs, \$30,000; oats, \$150,000; vetch seed, \$50,000; and on down the line through barley, fruit, clover, alfalfa, honey and all the other products of the county.

Clackamas county is a county with a great future.

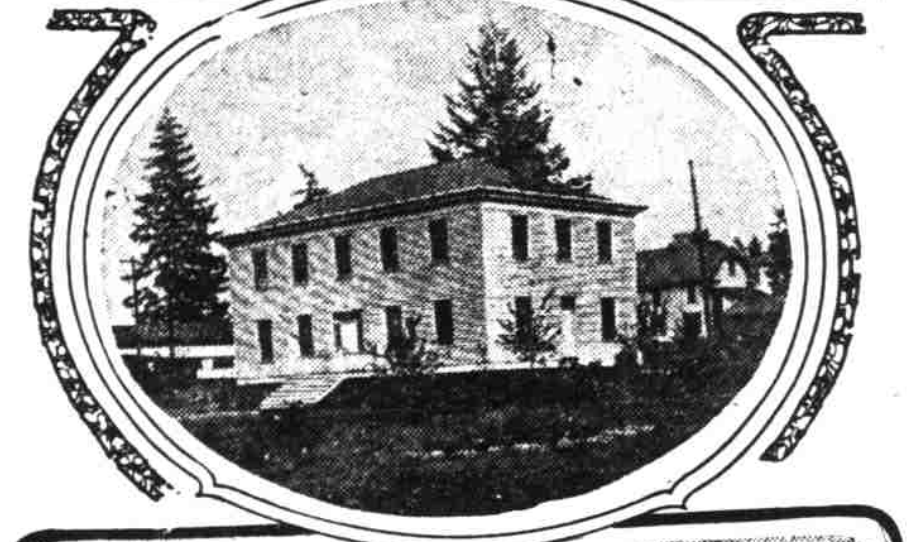
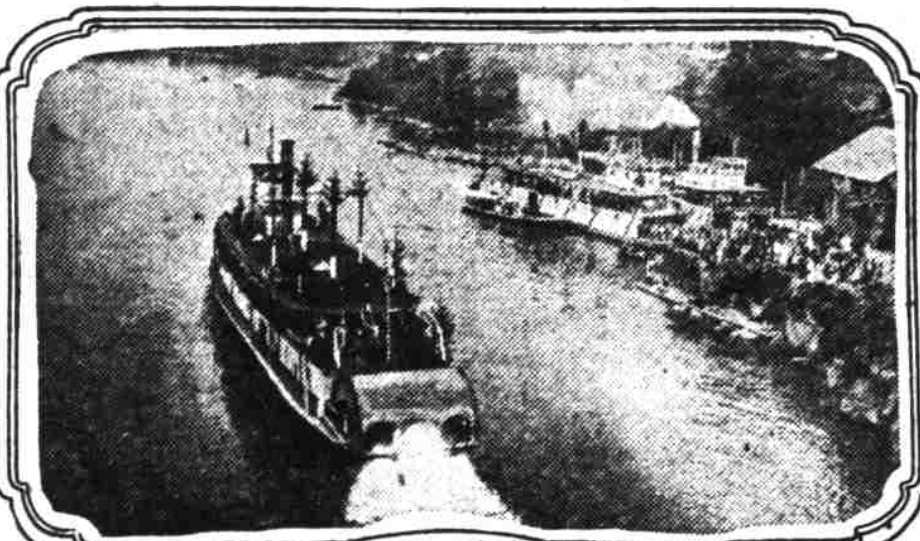
Mazama Exhibit Will Open Tonight

Aviator Art Smith Breaks Leg by Fall

Engine Stops During Exhibition Flight at Sapporo, Japan, and Machine Drops 500 Feet, Smashing to Bits.

Sapporo, Japan, June 16.—(U. P.)—Art Smith, the American aviator, was seriously injured the right leg today, when his airplane fell while he was making a flight.

Smith was making an exhibition flight when his engine stopped and the plane fell 500 feet. The machine fell and was smashed to bits. Smith's right leg was broken.

Art Smith, "the boy aviator," thrilled crowds at the Panama-Pacific exposition in San Francisco last year when he made daily flights over the bay and performed a series of sensational loops and twists. After the exposition Smith sailed for Japan, immediately after announcing that he would file suit for divorce from his wife.

He electrified the Japanese by his aerial performances. A few weeks ago, when a large crowd had gathered to watch a flight by him, his engine developed trouble and he was unable to ascend. The crowd, angered because it had been disappointed, attacked and stoned the aviator, who was rescued by the police. Later the Japanese government formally apologized to Smith.

Highway to Close; Plan Paving Work

Action Taken Because of Paving Work That Remains to Be Done on Part of the Road.

In order to facilitate the work of paving the upper end of the Columbia river highway, between Warrendale and the Hood River county line, Roadmaster Yeon has decided to close that portion of the highway to traffic during working hours and will soon issue a formal order to that effect.

The road will be open to through travel only between the hours of 6 o'clock in the evening and 8 o'clock in the morning, and on Sundays. While this will cause some inconvenience, it is felt that tourists can accommodate their time schedules to it, thus saving loss to the paving contractors and time in the completion of the work.

If weather conditions are normal it is expected to have the pavement finished by August 1, at which time there will be a hard-surfaced road from Portland to the Hood River county boundary.
