WHAT LABOR IS DOING

Delegates to Chamber of Commerce Withdrawn by Council.

Withdraws From Chamber.—The Central Labor Council last night met with a good attendance and discussed a wide sweep of questions. The most important action was the withdrawal of that body from the Chamber of Commerce because of the chambers having declared through its board of directors in favor of the open shop. Charles Hanson of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, chuckled in glee, as he has always been opposed to having the Central Labor Council participate in the Chamber of Commerce. The fight of the open shop versus the closed shop will be carried on in Portland, as all along the coast. "Real preparedness is being prepared to do business with the boss," declared one delegate, who was loudly applauded. "Organized labor must fight to the finish on this challenge given it by the employers everywhere on the coast," said President Smith.

Old Time Fourth Indorsed.—The indorsement of the Old Time Fourth of July celebration was given after some discussion of the possibility of the unions participating in a parade. Otto Hartwig, president of the State Federation of Labor, as a delegate from the painters, rather opposed the indorsement, but as E. E. Smith, president of the council, was on the citizen's committee by invitation of Mayor Albee, and as no parading of unions is implied by the indorsement, the resolution went through without opposition. Delegate Tucker, however, pointed out that with Oregon dry an old time Fourth of July was an impossibility.

To Propose Consolidations.—Secretary Stack reported at length on the investigations of himself and a committee of the Taxpayers' league into the state offices and the possibility of reducing and consolidating them. He recommended that the State Federation of Labor draft the sections of the proposed law to be introduced in the next legislature providing for the consolidation of the different offices in the state government pertaining to labor. This was affirmed by the council and will undoubtedly be carried out.

Joint Committee With Farmers.—Otto Hartwig, president of the State Federation of Labor, reported that a junction had been effected through a joint committee between the S. F. of A., the railroad unions and the Grange. Efforts through this committee will be made to unite on legislative demands.

Bates Refused Indorsement.—A communication of Labor draft the sections of the proposed elimination of the clause in the compensation law providing for part of the compensation being paid by the state was refused concurrence, and it was declared that the Central

BAKER GIRL SECURES SWEETHEART'S RELEASE FROM JAIL, WEDS HIM

Pays for License to Marry Man Accused of Poisoning Her Father's Cow.

Baker, Or., June 15.—Cupid opened the doors of Baker county's Jail Thursday for William Scholdt, indicted last week on a charge of poisoning a valuable cow belonging to Robert George. Angered at George because he forbade his attention to his daughter, Leona George, Scholdt admitted planning to kill the cow but denied actual crime. Listening to the pleas of his daughter and her protestations of love for the prisoner, George sought the district attorney, asking clemency for Scholdt and that he be released to marry his daughter.

Scholdt said he would be married and leave here at once if the charges were dismissed. District Attorney Godwin finally agreed. The marriage license was paid for by Miss George. The party went at once to the office of County Judge Kessick, who tied the knot. The couple left last night, presumably for California, where Scholdt said he was sure of employment.

Robert George, father of the girl, is a prominent rancher. He feared that Scholdt, who is half Mexican, would avenge himself if sent to the penitentiary. This, combined with his daughter's plea, won him over.

McCracken Answers Wife's Allegations

Husband Admits \$10,000 Note Remains Unpaid, But Claims It Was Given Without Valuable Consideration.

Answer was filed yesterday afternoon by Peter B. McCracken in the suit brought against him by his wife, Emma McCracken, to collect a \$10,000 note and recover \$2500 she alleged she advanced to him for incidentals.

The answer admits that the note remains unpaid, but McCracken denies that he owes anything on the note, as he says it was given without valuable consideration and was no part of a business transaction. He denies owing any part of the \$2500.

Ex-Congressman Is Arrested at Tacoma

Stanton Warburton Accused of Bringing Trunk Full of Liquor Back From Progressive Convention in Chicago. Tacoma, Wash., June 15.—(U. P.)—Because one of a number of bottles of whiskey in a trunk, broke, and a baggage handler at the Union station here had a keen sense of smell, Stanton Warburton, attorney and former congressman, today faces a charge of illegally transporting liquor into Washington. Warburton was arrested last night on his arrival from Chicago, where he attended the Progressive convention as delegate and released today on \$500 bond, pending trial in Justice Graham's court.

The trunk contained, the police say, a 15-gallon tank of whiskey and 18 quart bottles of bonded liquor.
