

PIONEERS TO MEET IN ANNUAL REUNION ON NEXT THURSDAY

Trail Blazers Will Gather Once More Around the Campfire in Portland.

ADDRESSES ARE PLANNED

Woman's Auxiliary Will Have Charge of the Big Banquet to Be Given the Members.

"Ah-kut-ti ti-lil-kums klosh-wa-wa." The word has gone forth to the men and women who came to Oregon perhaps as children, during or before 1850.

And it means, "Good friends will talk together." The forty-fourth annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer association will take place in Portland next Thursday.

The addresses will be given in the Masonic temple and there the business session also will be held. "Hill-you muck-muck,"—good eat and plenty of it—the annual banquet is to be served in the Armory at 4:30 p. m.

Friends to Meet Again. Friends who have not met for 62 years have been invited to renew acquaintance through the medium of the annual pioneer reunions.

Veterans of the Indian wars will fight again, in reminiscence, the thrilling battles of their youth. And again the wild and untamed lands of the Oregon country will be repossessed.

There will be many less than when the annual reunions first were planned. There will be silence when names are called whose owners were present and enjoyed the reunion last year. But it will not be a mournful occasion.

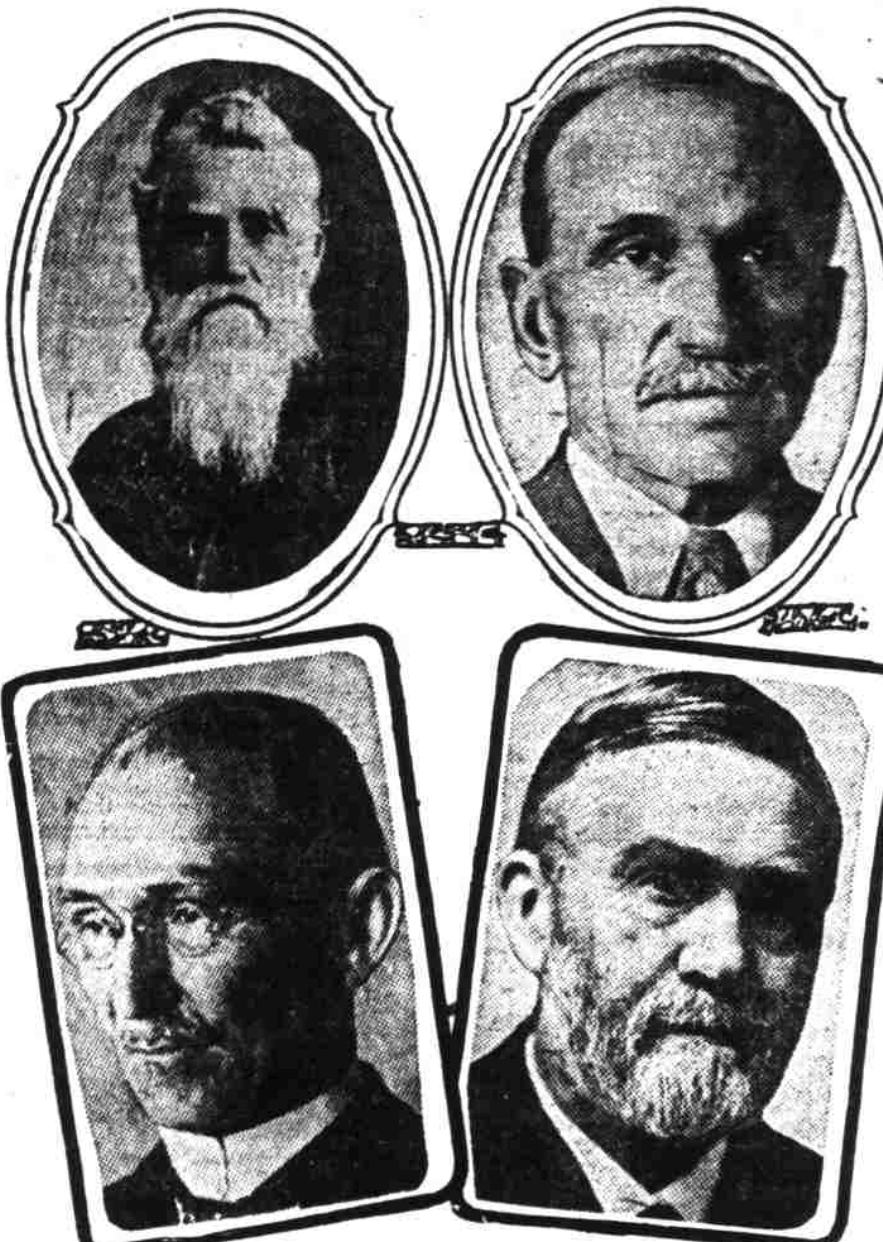

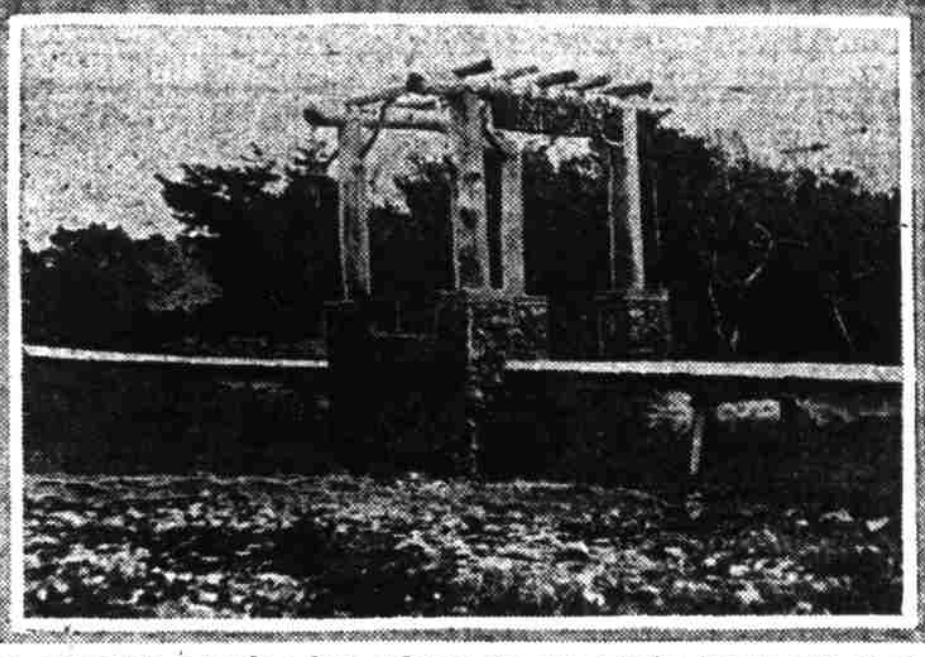
Union Official Wins Verdict for \$7000

President of Kansas Miners Sued Operators Charging They Spread Reports He Had Betrayed His Trust. Kansas City, Mo. June 17.—(U. P.)—President Alexander Howatt, of the Kansas Miners' union, was today vindicated of the charge that he had betrayed the miners in wage conferences, when a jury returned a verdict in his favor against Joseph H. Hazen, alleged go-between, for \$7000. However, the jury also returned a verdict in favor of Charles Keith and the Central Coal & Coke company. Howatt had sued Hazen and several other operators for slander, asking \$50,000 damages. He charged that Keith and other members of the Southwestern Interstate Coal Operators' association had spread reports that he and Fred Holt, former secretary of the Arkansas and Oklahoma miners, had been given \$21,000 to arrange the 1910 and 1912 wage contracts favorable to the operators.

Seaside, Or., June 17.—The salt cairn used by Lewis and Clark in 1805-6 has been fenced off with a rustic effect, made by the gabled and twisted beach wood. Completely enclosing it is a seat. Within a few steps is a cove, formed by interlocking pine trees overhead; while thick soft moss forms a carpet for the feet. Here the visitor can rest or picnic on the tables made for the purpose with the money raised last year by Mrs. Dan Moore in an outdoor concert. An artistic pergola has been erected with stone steps leading down to the cairn; also a stone fence containing a hedge of growing ferns. This work was done by George Otten of Portland. To complete the work as desired, another concert will be given this summer at the Moore hotel.

Many new varieties of roses, some unnamed and never shown in Portland before, will be on display at the Portland Heights Flower and Rose show, which opens Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock in the Portland Heights club.
