

BISHOP HUGHES IS MAN OF BENEVOLENT, UNIFYING QUALITIES

New Methodist Leader of Oregon District Called Competent Organizer.

BELIEVES IN THE WEST

He Believes in Solving Difficult Church Problems Through the Medium of Prayer as Policy.

The city of Portland will soon have as one of its citizens a man noted for his benevolent and unifying qualities. This person is Rev. Matthew Simpson Hughes, newly elected bishop of northwestern Methodism.

In his work as a pastor Bishop Hughes carried the reputation of being a competent worker with people and a great organizer. Owing to the past difficulties in local Methodism, which were recently settled by the general conference, it is considered by local church goers especially fortunate for the church to have a man of such ability appointed to this district.

Ideas are definite among the people as to what the bishop will do, but not so with the bishop. He believes in working out all church problems through prayer, and so far that is the only policy which he has publicly announced. The bishop has many new ideas which he intends putting into use as soon as the opportunity offers itself, but he is going to perform this work quietly and let the results do the talking. He is opposed to the policy of a man coming into a strange place with a fixed program and announcing a hard and fast policy. He favors coming in with a charitable spirit and after acquainting himself with the conditions he will then set about to uplift and improve.

Believes in the West

The bishop is a man who also believes in the western country and sees in it a great future for the right kind of men, both in and out of the church.

Personally the bishop is a man of medium build with snapping blue eyes that bespeak energy and alertness. He has a congenial spirit that is very pleasing and wears a smile "that won't come off."

The bishop will leave Portland tonight for the south and probably will not return until the 25th of July, at which time he expects to bring his family along with him. It is reported that Mrs. Hughes and the children are looking forward to the time when they will come to Portland.

Noted German Flyer Is Brought to Earth

Boelcke Is Downed by Ribbles; Message From Front Does Not Say Whether Teuton Is Injured.

Paris, June 17.—(U. P.)—Boelcke, the German flyer, who since the start of the war has taken part in many German aeroplane attacks on the allied flyers, was shot down in the fighting on the Verdun front yesterday by Ribbles, one of the French stars. The message from the front does not say whether he was injured. Boelcke had brought down 15 allied flyers.

British Advance Is Repulsed by Turks

English Attempt to Cross Euphrates Near Korna, but Are Repulsed; 180 Killed, Many Wounded.

Constantinople, June 17.—(U. P.)—After a six-hour battle on the banks of the Euphrates the British forces which had attempted to cross near Korna were forced to retreat, says the official statement of the war office here. The British suffered 180 killed and many wounded.

Fly Caused Egyptian Plague

Philadelphia, June 17.—The plagues of the Egyptians during the time of Moses were diseases transmitted through insanitary streets by the house fly, James F. McCrudden, chief of the bureau of housing and sanitation maintains.

BOY SCOUTS WILL SPEND TWO WEEKS IN SUMMER CAMP

Lads of First Presbyterian Church to Make the Trip Planned This Year.

PROGRAM IS OUTLINED

Points Will Be Given for Cleanliness, Health, Etc.—Various Kinds of Sports Will Be Staged.

Forty-one boys have registered to go for the two weeks' camp of the Boy Scouts of the First Presbyterian church under the command and leadership of Scoutmaster George F. Mackenzie and Richard E. Randall, the pastor's assistant. Mr. Randall, with an escort of five, left yesterday morning with an automobile truck load of provisions and equipment to choose the location and set up the camp.

Tomorrow morning at 8 o'clock Mr. Mackenzie, with his assistants, will pilot the main troop out to Dr. Boyd's ranch, 34 miles east of Portland, Walla Leshia (The Roar of the River), where camp will be pitched and where the scouts will have their headquarters for the two weeks' outing.

Walla Leshia is a beauty spot overlooking the Sandy river and under the brow of Mount Hood, in the depths of

the forests below the mountain ridges. Every provision has been made for the comfort of the boys, and prizes will be awarded for the best record made at the end of each week.

Points will be given for health and cleanliness, neatness, promptness, cheerfulness, manners, moral, trustworthiness, achievement, industry and service. A regular program of duties and pastimes will be carried out, including Bible study, Sunday services, baseball, swimming and regular scout experience and study.

It is planned to crowd the two weeks full of practical instruction and healthy enjoyment for all, and to make the outing an epoch-making event in the history of boys' work in the First Presbyterian church.

The scout movement has only been inaugurated in the First church since last fall, and already 70 scouts have been enlisted, interest is high and plans for a future of increasing growth and activity is looked forward to by both boys and leaders. Mr. Randall will send in reports to the papers from Camp Walla Leshia from time to time, with the story of the week's experiences.
