National Airs and State Songs to Be Rendered During the Procession.

MULTNOMAH FIELD CENTER

River Spectacle to Be One of Main Features; Donations to Fund Are Being Made Now.

Every singing organization and every state society in Portland is to be asked to participate in the monster Fourth of July celebration to be held here this year.

It is proposed to have these various organizations march in the big parade on the morning of the Fourth, singing national airs and state songs as they march, and assist in leading the singing by the crowds assembled in the Multnomah field.

The suggestions made by Mrs. C. B. Simmons, a member of the Fourth of July committee, last night, and met with immediate approval. Mrs. Simmons is to have charge of this feature. It was decided to hold patriotic exercises only at the Multnomah field instead of in two or three communities. These exercises will consist of the reading of the Declaration of Independence, a short patriotic address, the singing of patriotic songs and a short ceremony to the American flag.

Military Program Planned.—While plans for the participation in the parade by the Oregon National guard are being held in abeyance owing to the organization of the troops, it is thought that the general program of the day will not be interfered with. It is still proposed to have the guard stage a big military tournament on Multnomah field immediately following the patriotic exercises.

In the afternoon the old fashioned contests begin and these will consist of everything from greased pig and pole contests to pig eating contests. All kinds of races are on the program. A. M. Griley, chairman of the committee on sports, has an enthusiastic committee which is accomplishing results.

Later in the afternoon firemen from the city and nearby towns are to participate in competitive races and drills, including a water fight. These will be followed by a drill with modern apparatus, including ladder work on the big aerial ladder truck. These contests will be held on the streets.

Night Spectacle Feature.—The night spectacle planned to be held on the river is arousing much interest especially with the announcement that the big dirigible balloon is to be used in the battle to be staged by the Oregon naval militia.

The committee arranging for this, consisting of H. W. Pieroni, C. M. Bristol, Frank J. Toomey, Fire Chief Dowell, Assistant Chief Landenklos, Fire Marshal Stevens, Battalion Chiefs Young and Holden, Inspector of Customs F. H. McGrath, Harbormaster Speier and Lieutenant Commander George E. Blair of the naval militia, held a meeting last night at which they agreed on once to stage the enormous spectacle.

A boat to represent a warship nearly 150 feet long is to be constructed at once and this will be used in an attack on the cruiser Boston. Thousands of shots will be fired. The battle will be followed with the burning of the aircraft, and then Portland's two fire boats will be called to extinguish the blaze. Huge searchlights will light up the harbor during this spectacle.

This will be followed with fireworks and the day's program will be concluded.

Cheese Makers Feel Shortage of Rennet

Substitutes Are Being Sought; Conditions in Canada Are Worse Than They Are Here.

Shortage of rennet is threatening to paralyze the Oregon cheese-making industry. Cheese factories in Canada have already been closed down for lack of this ingredient, according to information received by Department of Commerce Representative Clark. Rennet is a product from the lining of the stomach of calves. Farmers have been killing their calves without saving the stomachs. The war is given as an indirect reason for this, being sought. One is scale peeps, found in the stomachs of hogs. The Union Meat company is saving a large quantity of this, but it is said that scale peeps is not suitable for all grades of cheese.

Laughter is a product of a buoyant, happy spirit that rests upon good health; but, while it generally originates in this way, it operates in an opposite direction also. The laugh that aids digestion and drives worry from the brain promotes health and physical strength. Life seems long to those who worry, but measured in months and years it is usually short. People who are always depressed in spirit court illness. Indeed, some of the people who worry seem to enjoy ill health because it gives them additional reason to worry. Laughter is the antithesis of worry. It continually opposes dull care and bores the heaviest heart. Normal people are prone to laugh. Laughter ripples from the lips of every woman and girl who is physically and mentally normal. The world is full of joy. People who go about with scowls on their faces seldom recognize joy and happiness when they meet them.

Very few people have been able to worry their way into old age. Worry subtracts from life and adds to the length of life. People who laugh most worry the least. Therefore they stand the best chance to live to ripe old age. The health depends in a large measure upon the action of the organs of digestion. Anything that promotes the digestion and assimilation of food elevates the health. People who laugh have little need for tablets to aid digestion.

Laughter takes the place of medicine. It is a tonic. No meal should pass without a hearty laugh. Laughter buoy's your own spirits and cheers those about you. So every laugh serves a different purpose. Do not be stingy with your laughter. There is no necessity for loud guffaws, but there is plenty of reason for the musical laughter that cheers the soul.

If you need a tonic, try laughing. It will tone up your health and appearance. If it fails to prolong life, it will at least make living a sweeter proposition.

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Sundry Civil Bill Taken Up by House

Congressmen Begin Consideration of \$127,237,221 Appropriations Asked for and Will Reach the Measure.

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For fortification of the Panama canal, the bill carried \$4,535,000, an increase of \$1,895,951.70. The federal

trade commission is allowed \$448,050, an increase of \$91,080. For the Alaska railroad \$6,247,620, an increase of \$2,248,860.
