Appointments Made Tuesday by Governor Withycombe to Represent the State.

Salem, Or., June 21.—The following five delegates were named by Governor Withycombe Tuesday to represent Oregon at the third annual convention of the Association of Governmental Labor Officials to be held in Buffalo, N. Y., July 17.

Articles of Incorporation. Salem, Or., June 21.—Articles of incorporation were filed with Corporation Commissioner Schulderman Tuesday by Willowcraft Furniture Company, Portland, \$25,000, Carl E. Brown, L. M. Earl and M. B. Meacham, incorporators.

Have \$137.67 Balance. Salem, Or., June 21.—At the annual taxpayers' meeting here, attended by only members of the school board, it was shown that receipts for the year in the Salem district totaled \$192,291.08, while expenditures were \$192,264.41, leaving a balance of \$137.67.

S. P. Would Change Rates. Salem, Or., June 21.—The Southern Pacific railroad applied to the state public service commission Tuesday for order to establish "greater rates for longer distances" between Portland and points on its Willamette-Pacific and Coos Bay, Roseburg & Eastern branches.

Three Petitions Approved. Salem, Or., June 21.—Three initiative petitions, one providing for a statewide tax limitation, another for a state normal school at Pendleton, and a third for a rural credits amendment, were approved as to form by Secretary of State Olcott Tuesday.

Provide for Grade Crossings. Salem, Or., June 21.—The state public service commission Tuesday made an order providing for a grade crossing over the O. & C. railroad at Mrs. Creek, under restrictions such as the installation of "pockets" and gates and the strengthening of a bridge.

One Killed in Auto Crash in California. Machine Crashes Into Telegraph Pole on State Highway Near Los Angeles, One Occupant Escaping Death.

Los Angeles, June 21.—(P. N. S.)—Donald Rayburn, an employee of the American Film company at Santa Barbara, aged 35, a former Los Angeles newspaper reporter, was killed on the state highway near here yesterday when an automobile in which he was riding with George L. Sargeant, a film director of the same firm, crashed against a telegraph pole. Sargeant was thrown clear of the wreckage and escaped with slight injuries. The men had been attending a show here and had started back to Santa Barbara.

Training Camp Plan Now Being Delayed

Local Enlistments Await Definite Information From the Department of War on the Subject.

Pending definite information on what the war department proposes to do in regard to the military training camp at American lake, the local committee, appointed by E. L. Thompson, president of the members council of the Chamber of Commerce, is making an effort to obtain enlistments of Portland business men.

It develops that the bill authorizing government support of the camp carries no appropriation and consequently the men who take advantage of the camp opportunity will have to do so at their own expense, including transportation, uniforms and subsistence.

A telegram was sent Monday to Senator Chamberlain, chairman of the senate committee on military affairs, asking definite information on the status of the situation, inasmuch as communications from the officer in charge of training camps at San Francisco headquarters developed little satisfaction.

Giant Cap Injures Children. Baker, Or., June 21.—Clarence Hatfield, a 10 years old lad, lost part of the fingers of his right hand by the explosion of a giant powder cap. This little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. A. Grimms and the two little sons of Mr. and Mrs. N. H. Hostwick, who were standing close by, were badly cut about the face and body by portions of the flying cap, and some of the other children were less seriously hurt.

Address Delivered To Mormon Society

Mrs. Emmeline Wells, Who is 88 Years Old, Makes Forceful Speech at Conference Yesterday.

Mrs. Emmeline B. Wells, 88, yesterday addressed the conference of the Mormon General Relief society of the Church of Jesus Christ of the Latter Day Saints in session in the Portland church, East Twenty-fifth and Madison streets. With a vigor and force seldom excelled by much younger people, Mrs. Wells made the resolutions of the society during its many years of existence.

The Mormon Relief society does work all over the United States, or wherever needed. One of its purposes is to store wheat in granaries and distribute it in case of emergency. If there be a shortage in one section the wheat is sent there and used as seed. When the San Francisco earthquake occurred the Mormon society was one of the first to respond with wheat and bread.

The receipts of the society for 1915 amounted to \$24,971. Its principal resources are now \$38,046, including 210,000 bushels of wheat. The present membership of the society is placed at 41,274. It has 1094 relief organizations which help sick and destitute families.

Rotarians Join in Home Guard Plan

Number of Members Volunteer and Patriotic Sentiment of Club Reaches High Mark.

So carried away with patriotic fervor were members of the Rotary club yesterday that they began volunteering enlistments for service in a home guard regiment that it is expected will number ultimately 1000 men. Among those who volunteered were Nelson G. Pike, president of the club, W. G. Harrington, R. S. Farrell, G. W. Herron, George D. Lee, E. O'Neal, Joe Sandvall, G. S. Costello, R. M. Davison, J. L. Howman, F. C. Griffith, J. C. English and S. B. Cooke.

The idea rapidly grew into a plan for a Rotary company for home guard. The action followed an address by General Charles F. Beebe and a suggestion by Ralph R. Dunaway. The program was closed by remarks from Lieutenant Blackburn of the United States navy.

The luncheon room was decorated with flags, and at an appropriate moment small balloons carrying flags were released, and the club men sang "America" and "Columbia." A facsimile of the national flag was printed on the program and President Pike said that so unusual was the act that the printer had admitted not using the cut of the flag for a similar purpose since nine years ago.

Big Movie Company Deal Is Announced

President of McClure Publications Represents Important Interest in Transaction, Involving Millions of Dollars.

New York, June 21.—(P. N. S.)—An announcement was sent from the offices of Frederick L. Collins, president of the McClure publications, today, which stated that the Paramount Pictures corporation, the distributing organization which handles the product of the Famous Players, Lasky, Morosco and Palms companies, has been sold, "or is about to be sold," to Collins, acting for important financial and publishing interests.

The purchase price in the reported deal is to involve several million dollars in cash and securities in a corporation to be formed by the buyer for the purpose of taking over Paramount and other film corporations.

Carranza Calls for Mexican Volunteers

All Males Between 15 and 30 Years Subject to Conscription If They Fail to Respond to the Call.

San Antonio, June 21.—(P. N. S.)—In Laredo it is reported from sources in Nuevo Laredo regarded as reliable that Carranza Tuesday issued a decree calling upon all able-bodied men of the ages of 15 and 30 years to volunteer for army service. Failure to volunteer, the decree states, will subject the individual to conscription, with death the penalty of an effort to evade conscription.

It is stated, also, that Carranza has instructed General de la Garza, commanding at Nuevo Laredo, to make every effort to prevent burials from crossing into the United States.

C. O. I. Water Users Will Have Hearing

Matters Relating to Upkeep of Lands and Water Distribution Will Come Before Public Service Commission.

Bend, Or., June 21.—A hearing before the public service commission upon the complaint of the Central Oregon Irrigation Water Users' association vs. the Central Oregon Irrigation company will be held in Bend on July 11 at which time the difficulties alleged upon the part of the water users on the C. O. I. project will be given consideration.

Matters which probably come up for consideration, relate to upkeep of lands and dispensation of water. The case has been long standing.

The recent decision by the supreme court held that the C. O. I. company had no right to come into the supreme court to enjoin the proceedings.

Davis Appointment May Start Inquiry

New United States Commissioner for Southern Oregon District Alleged to Hold Office Despite the Constitution.

Medford, Or., June 21.—The appointment of Roy Davis, United States commissioner for this district, occasioned surprise here. Mr. Davis, in addition to being official stenographer of the circuit court, is deputy clerk of the federal court of the southern Oregon district. His appointment as commissioner, it is cited, is in contravention of article 2, section 10, Oregon constitution. Others had made application for the commissionership and the matter may be the subject of official inquiry.

Wedding Bells Ring, Despite War Clouds

Sympathetic Officers of Salem National Guard Company Grant Bridgroom Temporary Leave of Absence.

Salem, Or., June 21.—A. Lynner Woolpert, druggist, member of company M, and Miss Edith Fugate, who had about decided to indefinitely postpone their wedding, scheduled for Wednesday evening, because of the call to arms, were married Tuesday, the bridegroom being granted a temporary leave of absence from his regiment by the sympathetic officers.

Early Whistles Are Held Objectionable

Others Among Baker, Or., Citizens Declare in Favor of As Many Whistle-makers as Possible.

Baker, Or., June 21.—Residents of the South Baker lumber mill district are preparing to appeal to the city commissioners to abolish what they call the whistle nuisance, claiming that the city fathers have authority to act under the anti-noise ordinance. Several complaints have been made by residents that whistles sounded by the mills at 5:30 disturb the slumbers of many residents, not employees of the mills, who are not obliged to arise at an early hour.

Roseburg Man's Car Plunges Down Bank

Seven Passenger Studebaker, Property of A. C. Marsters, Hit by Passing Machine—No One Injured.

Roseburg, Or., June 21.—The seven-passenger Studebaker automobile of A. C. Marsters, a Roseburg banker, was badly damaged near Riddle on Sunday, when a car passing from the rear struck the front wheel of the car, sending it down an embankment for a distance of 40 feet, the car landing against a fence. The occupants fortunately escaped without serious injury.

Another accident was that of James Wayland, of Roseburg, when his car backed off an embankment on Roberts mountain south of Roseburg, and damaged it to the extent of about \$100. Mr. Wayland's family escaped from the car before it left the road.

EMPLOYERS SHOW THEIR PATRIOTISM IN MEXICAN CRISIS

Number of Big Houses Offer Employees Half Pay While in Actual Service.

BANK IS AIDING THE PLAN

Some of Firms Are Willing to Make it Full Pay to Their Men While in the Field.

Portland employers as a whole are showing marked patriotism and liberality in dealing with their employees who are members of the National Guard.

Most employers are promising that places will be open for their men at the expiration of their service and others are making full or half pay arrangements.

The Western Union Telegraph company announced yesterday that it would pay all employees in the guard one-half pay during their absence where half pay and pay as a soldier together did not exceed the company salary.

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company has suspended vacation in its operating department pending the outcome of the guard movement and has promised to restore its men to service with their present seniority on return from duty. Sixteen car men of the company and nine or 10 employees in the office are members of the guard.

All the department stores are affected. Meier & Frank leading with 35. The Portland Gas & Coke company will send seven.

The United States National bank, through R. W. Schmeer, cashier, has offered to give all its employees going to the front half pay.

The Crane company, wholesale plumbers, has announced that it will pay all employees members of the guard their full salaries for a period of six months.

Improper Bottling of Cream Alleged

W. C. Reed Fined \$10 but Payment Is Suspended; Conviction Is the First of Its Kind Under New Ordinance.

For bottling cream in his place of business at 151 Broadway, W. C. Reed, proprietor of a delicatessen and restaurant, was fined \$10 in the municipal court yesterday. The payment of the fine was suspended.

This is the first conviction of the kind since the new milk ordinance went into effect, and Judge Languth requested that other grocers and restaurateurs in the city take notice of the case.

The arrest was made on the complaint of Dr. D. W. Mack, chief milk inspector, who said that Reed bottled the cream for customers from a can under the counter. Dr. Mack emphasized the danger lying in this practice, which he declared was anything but sanitary. The ordinance provides that milk must be bottled in milk depots.
