Dr. Drake Sworn In As School Director

Official canvass of votes cast in recent election made; Beach succeeds Munly (retired) as chairman.
At a special meeting of the school board at 8 o'clock yesterday afternoon Dr. J. Francis Drake was sworn in as school director to succeed M. G. Munly, who completed his term of five years.

Official canvass of the vote cast at the school election last Saturday showed the following: Dr. Drake, 4570; T. B. MacNaughton, 2476; Mrs. S. M. Blumauer, 932; Fred A. Ballin, 299. A total of 8271 votes were cast.

Director J. V. Beach succeeded Mr. Munly as chairman of the board. The gavel which Judge Munly had used as presiding officer for the last two years was presented to him, upon motion made by O. M. Plummer.

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In the north Kaledines' advance is equally rapid. Dispatches from the Russian general today assert that his forces have advanced 12 miles toward Vladimir in 48 hours. This advance is taken to indicate that the Austrian resistance in that sector is smashing and that the Teutons are retiring rapidly, fighting only rear guard actions.

Sweeping down from the north, the Kaledines army has gained the other point of the nippers clutching at Lemberg and unless its advance suffers serious check, the retreat of the Teutonic forces on Przemysl is certain soon to be forced.

Kaledines' immediate objective is the cutting of the railroad line and other means of communication between Lemberg and Kovel and, if possible, to join with the Russian army moving along the railroad toward Brody. His ability to do this is questionable, for the Austrians, stiffened by German regiments, are putting up a hard fight in the Brody sector.

RUSSIAN ADVANCE IS CHECKED, IS BELIEF EXPRESSED IN BERLIN
Berlin, June 21.—(U. P.)—The left wing of the Russian armies continues to push forward on the heels of the retreating Austrians in Bukovina, but the extreme right wing not only has been halted, but is being pushed back by the combined Austro-German forces.

Official statement from the Austrian war office received here admits that the Russians have crossed the River Sereth, fighting Austrian rear-guards. Both the Austrian and German war offices, however, report the repulse of all enemy attacks elsewhere. The German war office announces that a Russian force which crossed the
